Public update: April 18, 2024

### **Executive summary**

This report shares data and activities directed by Unified Command for the Incident Management Team (IMT). The information in this report comes from a joint effort among the City, State and County. Please note that not all requested data is included yet, but we expect to add it as soon as it becomes available.

### **Objectives**

- Leverage the city, state and county's resources to improve livability in Portland's city center.
- Enhance coordination and accessibility of housing, treatment, and recovery services in Portland.
- Combine health, law enforcement, and other data into a countywide dashboard for better response and monitoring.
- Identify housing, health and law enforcement gaps and obstacles, then make specific policy recommendations to leaders and lawmakers for better coordination.
- Develop a transition plan to expand and improve response efforts, with focus on both short-term and long-term needs.

## Key activities/highlights (4/4/24 to 4/10/24)

This includes work happening at Unified Command's direction and actions taken by partner agencies participating in the emergency declarations.

- Law enforcement, first responders and outreach workers continued to disrupt drug dealing, offer outreach to people using fentanyl in public, and respond to emerging issues in the Central City.
- Daily "Rapid Needs Assessment" coordination calls continued.
  - o Outcomes of this meeting so far include increased access to naloxone, housing, treatment, transportation and recovery services, increased communication and coordination on trash and graffiti cleanup, site cleaning and restoration.
  - o These calls have been effective in coordinating services, data collection and sharing key operational information focusing on "hotspot" areas in the downtown area (approximately SW 10th and 11th between Jefferson and Yamhill, NW 3rd and 4th between Couch and Everett).
  - o There are currently 80+ designated invitees from organizations representing the city, state, and county, including law enforcement, health and medical services, outreach and shelter services, substance use treatment, and livability.
- The City, State and County announced a \$683,000 expansion of a pilot program that pairs
   Portland Police Bureau law enforcement with Mental Health & Addiction Association of Oregon
   peer outreach workers in the Central City.
  - o People using fentanyl in public will be offered the opportunity to connect with an outreach worker for immediate access to detox, treatment, sheltering, and/or medical.
- The Joint Office of Homeless Services (JOHS), in partnership with the city, is developing a Shelter Availability tool intended to be ready by June 2024. The current list of shelters and the associated map is available at: <u>List of shelters - JOHS</u>
- Operations is drafting a proposal for a long-term coordination body ("task force") to strategically
  plan and coordinate efforts to implement the rapid needs assessment task force project in
  multiple neighborhoods across the county.
- The overdose epidemiology dashboard is available on the Multnomah County fentanyl emergency website. A map dashboard of overdose fatalities has been finalized.
- Significant work is underway, developing the content of the 90-day report. Staff are coordinating with the report lead and report editor.
- Unified Command is meeting with the Multnomah County Department of Community Justice (DCJ) to discuss gaining access to Measure 110 citation information and the associated demographics for both Multnomah County and the operational area footprint.
- The data team is drafting recommendations around how the data collection and reporting process could be improved in the future, both in this endeavor and in other similar incidents.
- A team of policy experts is compiling a list of legislative and policy solutions for existing gaps and barriers.

## Reportable preliminary data since emergency declaration (1/30/2024)



## **Appendix: Situation Overview Maps**

The following map shows the number of confirmed /or suspected deaths within and outside of the 90-day fentanyl emergency response operational area according to Medical Examiner data (January 1, 2024-February 25, 2024; n=59 deaths). Data are preliminary and will change as investigations are finalized. Although there were a total of 68 suspected or confirmed fentanyl overdose deaths to date in 2024 in Multnomah County, complete address information is not yet available for all decedents. Because the number of fentanyl-specific deaths is small for this time period, it is not possible to show fentanyl-specific deaths in smaller geographic regions within the operational area at this time.


