

Overview of Changes to the SUN Service System Service Delivery Model

Our vision is a community that effectively engages and supports all children and families so they are healthy, educated and prosperous.

Our mission is to collaborate to create an efficient system of supports that provides equitable opportunities for every child and family to thrive.

Our theory of change is that we will improve the wellbeing of our entire community by collaborating and integrating strategies and services that have been shown to improve educational and economic outcomes for people of color and those living in poverty.

The SUN Service System is a unique city-county-school-nonprofit partnership designed to align and integrate key social and support services for children, youth and their families toward two long-term outcomes: increased academic success for all youth, and an overall reduction in poverty in our community.


The System model, released in fall 2015, puts forth important changes to the System's structure, service delivery approaches and allocation of resources. These changes signal a significant shift in approach and resource allocation, using a social justice and racial equity lens.



Culturally Specific Services -

Multnomah County believes that culturally specific services eliminate structural barriers and provide a sense of safety and belonging that will lead to better outcomes for people experiencing racism and discrimination.

In support of these values, the SUN System has increased the percentage of dollars that will fund culturally specific services. This means a systemwide allocation of 60% of resources for culturally specific services, up from the current allocation of 33%.

SUN Community Schools

SUN Community Schools are a place-based, collective impact strategy to improve children's educational success and family stability. The strategy develops full-service neighborhood hubs where the school and partners from across the community come together to make sure children and families have what they need to be successful—in school and in life.

SUN Parent-Child Development Services

SUN Parent-Child Development Services (PCDS) are an important component in the SUN Service System. The focus of PCDS is on providing services to parents and their children from birth through kindergarten entry (through age 6) to promote healthy development, positive parenting and school readiness.

SUN Youth Advocacy Program

SUN Youth Advocacy Program (SYA) fosters youth development and academic achievement by providing a variety of year-round, school-linked, age-appropriate supports to children and youth who are at risk of academic failure and dropping out of school. SYA contractors are expected to engage parents and family members of SYA participants to the greatest extent possible to support the participant's success. Two areas of focus for SYA support are the transitions from elementary school to middle school and from middle school to high school, as these are key points at which students disengage and/or drop out of school.
