Summary of how levy funds are helping your organization "protect the collection of Oregon history documents and artifacts, and public access to those." (taken from ballot language for Measure 26-118	The last seven years, our Society in Corbett has focused on designing and building a museum here in East county. With the popularity of the Columbia Gorge National Scenic Area, over one million visitors driving by each year creates a lack of parking at the Vista House and Multnomah Falls. Being two miles west of those scenic destinations, it has become apparent that they can not handle all of the visitors. We feel that the museum will fill that void and we have designed our museum complex to meet this demand. The museum will be 5000 square feet with approximately 70% displays, 25% archival storage and 5% office space. The outside exhibits are designed to utilize the 2.69 acres creating a destination point, allowing the tourists, a chance to stretch their legs while walking our Pioneer Trail which will highlight our area and regional history.
Summary of how levy funds are being spent in a manner reflective of Multnomah County's diverse cultures.	This year one of our projects is to update our area's Pioneer Home inventory. We will be adding Native American sites and the Chinese Labor Camps at Rooster Rock on the Columbia River. Work is also being done on the Pioneer Journal book. Through this book we can track where the early settlers migrated from. With our membership growing, we have also reached out to the new members to assist in the oral interviews of our early pioneers. They have such interesting stories that can be captured of their life and times. Plans are to continue to work with the local school children to learn of their heritage.

We will continue to work with the Oregon Historical Society, the Levy Oversight Committee, the Multnomah County Commissioners and the Tax Supervising Conservation Commission. With the broad support of the community and partnership with community organizations, we are all working hard work to preserve and share the history of this area for many future generations.
