What is a KN95?

7 KN33 13 a close membringmask
It does not meet the US standard set by NIOSH (National
Institute for Occupational Safety and Health) to be
considered a respirator for healthcare workers.

☐ KN95s usually have ear loops rather than head straps. NIOSH approved N95 respirators always have head straps.



History of KN95 use in the US

A KN95 is a close-fitting mask

During national personal protective equipment (PPE) shortages in 2020-2021, KN95s
were allowed to be used as respirators in the United States to meet the demand created
by the pandemic. This was considered emergency use authorization.

☐ In July 2021, the FDA removed emergency use authorization of KN95 masks as approved respirators.

KN95 masks should NOT be used when caring for quarantining, suspected or confirmed COVID-19 residents on Aerosol Contact Isolation Precautions!

KN95s Can be Used Safely When

Source control in the general population – this means wearing a mask to protect other
people from your germs

- ☐ For visitors entering a long-term care facility
- ☐ Follow policy and regulations regarding KN95 source control use in your facility
