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FDA Warning Issued for 27 Eye Drops

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has issued a warning related to lubricant eye drops. These products may lead to a bacterial infection that can cause partial vision loss or blindness. The warning is associated with approximately 27 products.

The FDA's recommendation is to discontinue use of these eye drops and dispose of them immediately. Patients who have used these eye drops should be monitored for signs of an eye infection. If an eye infection is developing, seek medical care immediately.

Be sure to contact the resident's doctor to get a new eye drop approved, obtain an updated physician's order, and update the MAR.

Time to Renew CPR? Remember, You Must Take In-Person Course

If you or a staff member are getting your CPR and First Aid Certification, you must take an in-person course. This is required for first time certification and renewals. **Courses that are online only are not allowed** (MCAR 023-070-630).

If a portion of the course is provided online, there must be an in-person skills test conducted by a qualified instructor.

Approved in-person courses include:

- American Heart Association (aka Heartsaver)
- American Red Cross
- American Safety and Health Institute
- Medic First Aid

If you want to take a CPR and first aid course from a company that is not on this list, you should call the ACHP and check to make sure it will be accepted.

Just Ask: Where Should My Home Office be Located?

Answer: It's best to arrange your home office in a space where you can do your record keeping in private to protect residents' confidential information. Common shared spaces are not the best places for your office.

Operators are required to ensure protected health information is not used or disclosed improperly. In order to protect residents' confidentiality, the rules require all resident records be stored in a locked location (MCAR 023-090-215 and 023-090-210).

It is important that HIPAA-protected health information is not visible to other residents or visitors in the home. Remember not to leave faxes sitting on the fax machine where anyone could view them. This can be a challenge if the home office is located in the living room or other shared space.

Although there is no rule against it, doing your record keeping in the living room, dining room or kitchen distracts from a home-like environment and does not offer protection to residents' confidentiality. Your licenser may ask for you to relocate your records to a place that allows for privacy and protection of residents' confidential information.

Having a separate and quiet space may also help you focus while updating your home records or taking those highly private phone calls with healthcare professionals.
