Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure – primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

School Population: 604 students; Grades K-5; 100% Eligible for Free Meals; 43% Students of Color (African American 5%, American Indian/AK Native 2%, Asian 9%, Hispanic 20%, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander 1%, Multiple Race 6%, White 57%)

SUN Spotlight

This year the SUN Manager started a new partnership with BoyStrength. This is a program sponsored by the Portland Police Bureau. This program's mission is fostering awareness, promoting healthy choices and empowering boys to be leaders in nonviolence. The goals include boosting knowledge and awareness of equity, diversity, and cultural differences, support boys capacity to express and regulate emotions and understand components of healthy relationships, encourage boys to explore healthier and safer choices to prevent violence, and increase boys' capacity to be allies in ending violence against girls and women.

The SUN manager worked with the student management specialist to put together a list of 5th grade boys to invite to this opportunity. The students invited were boys that struggled in several areas and the majority did not have a positive male role model in their lives. The Site Manager also felt that it was important opportunity for 5th grade boys as they transitioned into middle school. There were seven boys that participated in this program. The students really looked forward to spending time with the group's facilitator. He was a young man who also had struggles in his life that manifested in angry outbursts, behavior issues and ultimately dropping out of school.

Despite all of these challenges this young man worked hard to turn his life around. That is why he wanted to volunteer for BoyStrength. He wanted to share some of his experiences along with steps that he took to gain control of his life, emphasize the importance of education and graduating, and encourage students to not let their past define their future. Kelly SUN students had a graduation ceremony in which they had a meet in greet with Mayor Charlie Hales. He also addressed the group during the ceremony. Several parents expressed noticing a change/difference in their child's attitude and behavior. They even signed their child up for the BoyStrength summer camp.
