Service Area & Target Groups/Focus

Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure – primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

SUN Spotlight

The 2015-16 school year was the first full year that Harrison Park ran a mobile food pantry. Run in partnership with the Oregon Food Bank, the food pantry was a very big undertaking that could easily have become a disaster were it not for the yearlong dedication of the Harrison Park community in helping it run smoothly. Only counting volunteer hours for the winter and spring terms, the numbers are pretty amazing. More than twenty teachers contributed over one hundred total hours, many of them volunteering at the end of a challenging work week to help feed our community. Community partners gave extra hours, above and beyond their commitments to our students and families. School principal John Walden made it a priority to help with the food pantry, in addition to his many other responsibilities. And, perhaps most importantly, each of the sixteen pantries operated over the winter and spring terms was set up and run with the help of more than fifteen dedicated Harrison Park students. The mobile food pantry at Harrison Park has become a model for how a community can come together on a regular basis in service and in support of one another.
