Measure 26-253 would strip away an important protection for Portland homeowners and renters. It <u>removes our right to vote</u> on costly weatherization mandates for older homes and buildings.

In 1980, Portlanders wisely added this safeguard to our City Charter. They recognized that **forcing expensive upgrades** on pre-1979 structures could create **financial hardship** for many residents. That's why any such mandate requires voter approval.

Proponents claim removing this protection will make Portland more "efficient." But efficient for whom? ... Not for the homeowner suddenly facing <u>thousands of dollars in mandatory upgrades</u>. Not for the renter whose landlord <u>passes on the costs</u> of weatherization through higher rent.

This measure gives too much power to city officials. They could impose sweeping mandates affecting most Portland homes without any input from voters. There's no guarantee these mandates would be reasonable or take into account people's ability to pay.

Energy efficiency is important, but so is protecting residents from overreach. Existing incentive programs and building codes already promote weatherization. **We don't need heavy-handed mandates forced on us without a vote**.

Remember, newer homes aren't affected by this change. It only targets older structures – including many affordable housing options for working families and seniors on fixed incomes.

Portland faces urgent challenges like homelessness, public safety, and crumbling infrastructure. City leaders should focus on those priorities instead of forcing costly home improvement mandates.

<u>Don't give up your right to vote</u> on issues affecting your home and wallet. Keep this important check on government power in place. Preserve affordability and resident input.

If Measure 26-253 passes, important protections for homeowners and property owners will be removed from our City Charter, and city government would have the authority to mandate costly requirements to retrofit homes — and all other buildings built before 1979 — to meet modern energy efficiency standards.

MEASURE 26-253 WILL COST HOMEOWNERS, RENTERS, AND SMALL BUSINESSES

If Measure 26-253 passes, city government could <u>require</u> all homeowners and property owners to install solar panels, to replace appliances or windows, to add insulation, or change the way you heat and cool your home.

These costly mandates could apply to more than 140,000 Portland houses, apartment buildings, stores and offices — approximately 71% of homes and buildings in Portland.

And it's on the ballot at the request of a few city bureaucrats, who have already signaled their intent, telling the Portland Charter Commission that "deep decarbonization – can't be achieved without strong mandates."

MEASURE 26-253 WILL INCREASE THE COST OF HOUSING

But those expensive new mandates will make housing less affordable for renters, by increasing landlords' costs. And costly mandates will **unfairly burden homeowners, including lower-income homeowners and seniors on fixed incomes**, putting them all at risk of losing their homes.

PORTLAND SHOULD INCENTIVIZE, NOT MANDATE COSTLY RETROFITS

Let's be clear: Increasing the energy efficiency of our homes and workplaces is important in the fight against climate change. And the City can and should support **Incentives and tools** to reduce costs for everyday Portlanders, like **Iow-interest loans** or by using the **millions of dollars in the Portland Clean Energy Fund**, paid for by a tax on billion-dollar companies.

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PORTLAND HAS A HOUSING CRISIS MEASURE 26-253 WOULD MAKE IT WORSE

MEASURE 26-253 IS COSTLY FOR HOMEOWNERS

New energy efficiency mandates would be costly for homeowners, who could be required to make expensive upgrades to their homes on a short timeline — like the City originally proposed before voters stepped in to add protections to our City Charter. Imagine if the City required homeowners to replace older appliances or windows, to add insulation or solar panels, or change the way you heat and cool your home. If Measure 26-253 passes, that's exactly what the City could do — even to lower-income homeowners, seniors on fixed incomes, and people trying to sell their home.

MEASURE 26-253 IS COSTLY FOR RENTERS

New energy efficiency mandates would be costly for renters. These expensive mandates would increase landlords' costs, forcing them to raise rent to cover the bill. Apartments would be off the market while landlords make required updates, increasing competition for housing when we already face a shortage. And some small landlords may choose to stop renting their property altogether because they can no longer keep up with Portland's long list of requirements or cover their costs—making it even harder for Portlanders to find an affordable place to rent.

This isn't the first time the City has tried to mandate costly energy efficiency projects on homeowners and other property owners. It's time to say NO again, to Measure 26-253.

Years ago, City Council adopted an aggressive mandate, requiring:

- ALL residential and commercial building owners (including homeowners) to
- Weatherize and retrofit their properties for energy efficiency
- Within five years or before the building could be sold, whichever came first.

Portland voters stood up then, and added smart protections to our City Charter: Costly energy efficiency mandates now require Portland voters' approval.

But un-elected city officials are trying to overturn those protections. A few city bureaucrats convinced 16 members of the Portland Charter Commission to put this issue on the ballot, hoping to overturn those voter-approved protections against costly mandates.

On November 5, voters should reject costly mandates AGAIN, by voting NO on Measure 26-253.

Bureaucrats' intent was clear: They want Measure 26-253 to pass so they can implement "strong mandates around energy efficiency" without giving voters a chance to weigh in, no matter how much it might cost you.

This isn't a popular idea. The Charter Commission held listening sessions on climate issues, and heard from community members who supported incentives that would help community members make energy efficiency upgrades. But the community's list of ideas and recommendations said nothing about mandatory energy efficiency retrofits.

Then, when the Charter Commission asked for feedback on this proposed measure, only a handful of Portlanders commented. But the Charter Commission sent Measure 26-253 to the ballot anyway.

It's your turn to weigh in.

We can't afford to give the city a blank check for costly retrofits.
