
## Multnomah County: Reported Index Offenses






## Multnomah County: Arrests (PPB only\*)



## Sheriff: Bookings





## Sheriff: Custody- Adult Jail Beds



**Notes:** Average Daily Reported Offenses declined slightly, due to decreases in burglary and larceny from autos. The decline in the Average Daily Arrests 'Other' category was due mainly in reductions in arrests for DFZ violations and, to a lesser degree, PFZ violations. The Average Daily Bookings trend chart is now reported by various booking types—'in-transit' bookings are not reported and typically count for about 4%. Matrix releases declined by 150, averaging 8.6 per day.



### Disposition Type by Primary Conviction\*: Feb 2005




### Adult Community Supervision: Caseloads



### Juvenile Community Supervision: Caseloads

Average caseload per counselor was 23 cases for January.

**Notes.** The DA Adult Caseloads declined more than 200 received cases, due to declines in all but Behavioral and Local offense categories. Adult Supervision and Juvenile caseloads remained relatively consistent. The average Juvenile Justice caseload per counselor (23) was consistent with the previous month.
