




**Notes.** The average daily arrests (Dec 2003) decreased to the lowest in the last three years; declines were seen in fugitive warrant arrests and drug/prostitution free zones. PPB anticipates eliminating the backlog of cases by the end of May 2004. The average daily bookings returned to the multi-year level; all categories saw slight increases, except for drug bookings. The average daily custody population decreased from 1668 to 1621, as capacity was reduced to 1636. ## District Attorney: Adult Caseload Court Processes: Sentencing Outcomes







**Notes**. The DA data back to 10/03 has been revised due to data inconsistencies. The DA caseload rebounded to the multiyear average. The proportion of issued to received cases is 13% above average (typically 72% of cases were issued). Adult supervision caseload was consistent with February (+12 cases); specialized caseload saw little change. The juvenile caseloads increased from 569 to 593 due to increases in high and medium-risk caseloads. These caseloads have increased for the past four months and are now at the highest level since July 2002. Lower risk cases saw no change.
