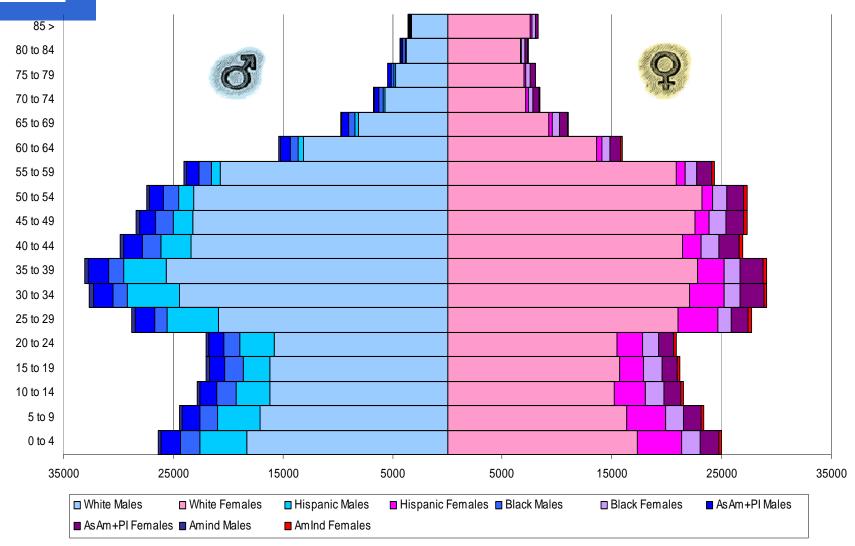
- We can generally predict the Age Wave

Quick Overview

- In 2025, Multnomah County will experience a 44% increase in residents aged 65+
- Number of poor Multnomah County Seniors will increase by about one-third in the same period
- This is a women's issue, mainly



2006 Multnomah County Population Pyramid

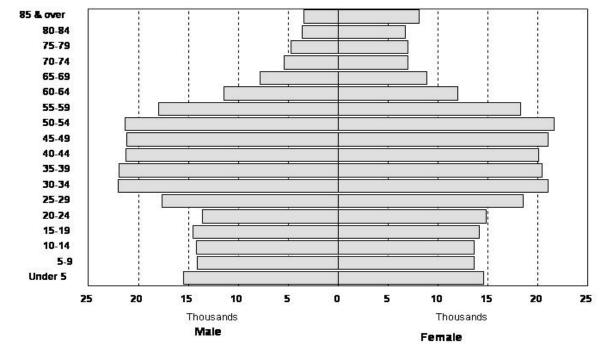

White, non-Hispanic Population Distribution

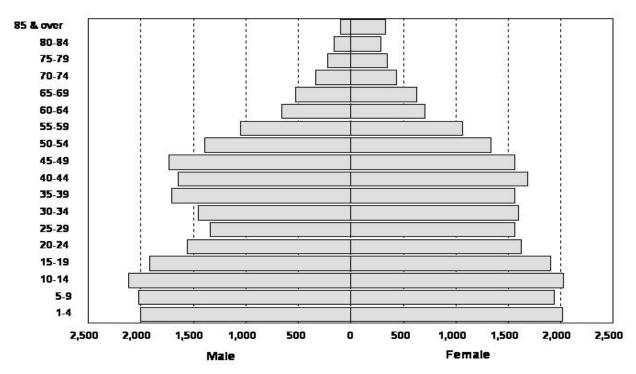
✓ The first

Multnomah County, 2005 African American Population Distribution

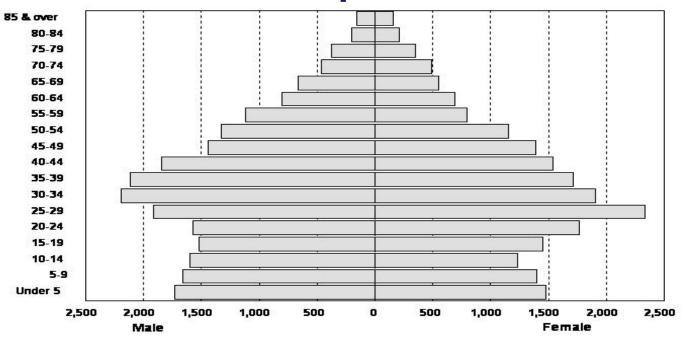

Multnomah County, 2005 Asian/Pacific Population Distribution

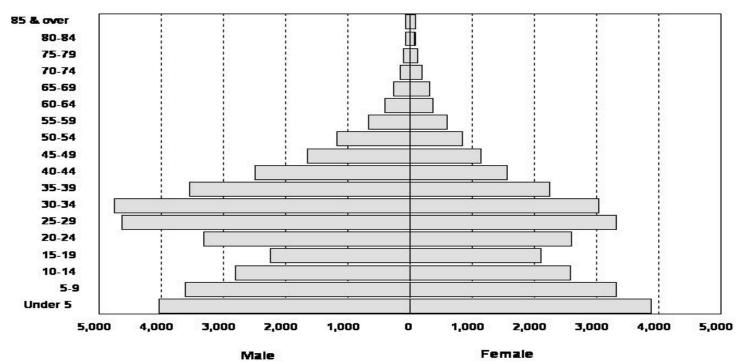

Multnomah County, 2005 Hispanic Population Distribution

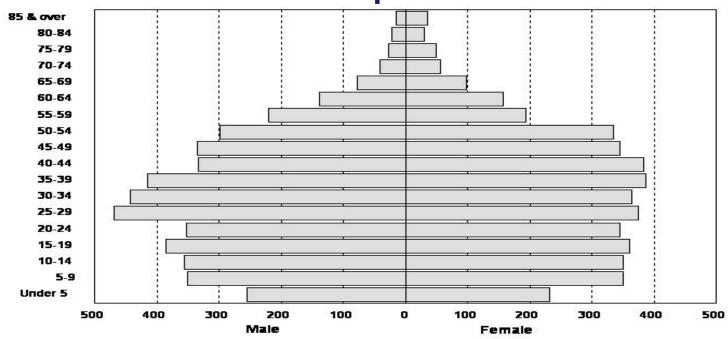

Multnomah County, 2005 American Indian Population Distribution

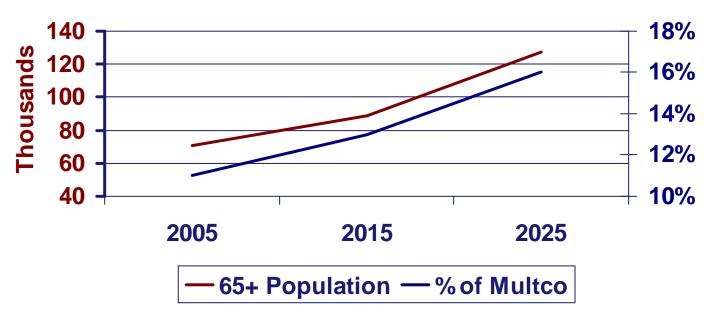

Number and Percent Increase in Multnomah County 65+ Population

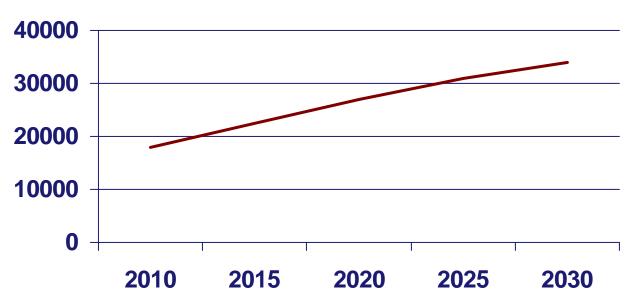

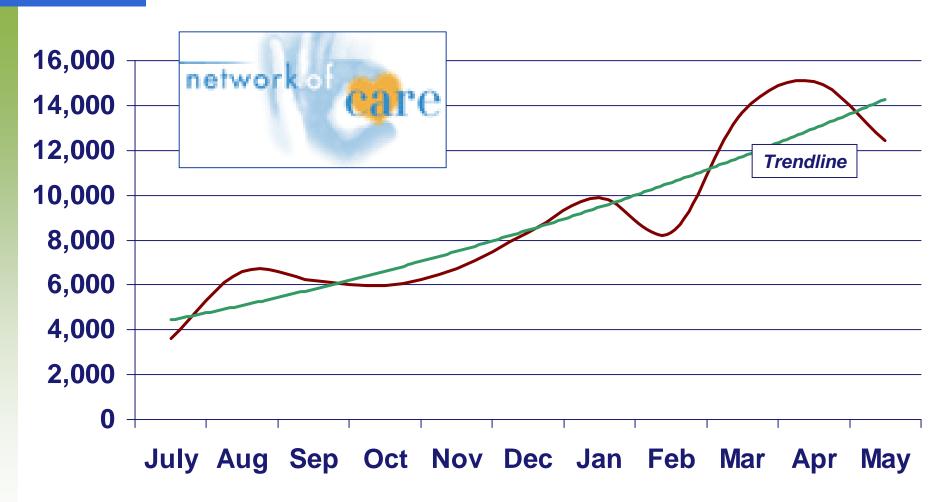


Maturing of America: Selected Best Practices

- ✓ Communities should promote a single point of entry for information and access to all aging services.
- ✓ Communities should create opportunities for the
 effective and purposeful participation of older citizens
 on community boards and commissions.
- ✓ Communities should ensure that public safety personnel
 are trained to deal with the specialized needs of older
 adults.
- ✓ Communities should provide supportive services that older adults need to remain living independently at home and in the community.



Network of Care Website Hits: 2007-08

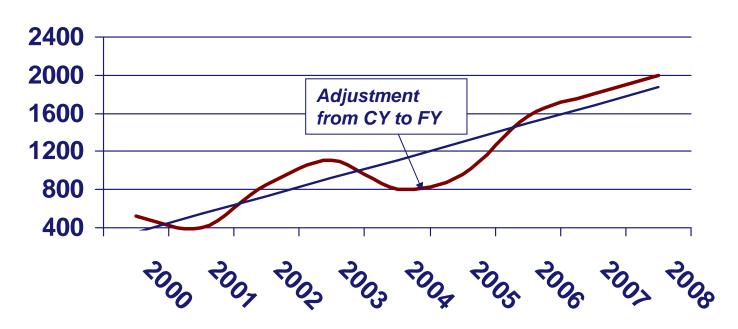


✓ Since July of last year, traffic on the website has increased over 400%.

Individuals Served by Elders in Action Personal Advocates




✓ Elders in Action Personal Advocates help individuals navigate complex systems.

Volunteer Emergency Registry Enrollment

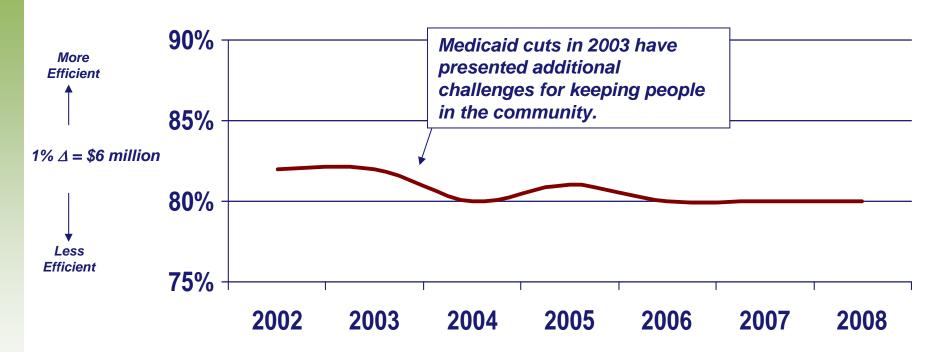


✓ The Volunteer Emergency Registry is a cooperative effort by the city and county.



Aging in Place: Nursing Home Diversion

Percent of Nursing Home Eligible Clients Served in the Community



[✓] Multnomah County remains the national leader in diversion of elderly from more expensive and restrictive placements. The next most efficient entity is Washington State, with 60% served in the community. Nursing home care in Multnomah County averages \$72,000 per year.

- The Older Adults Needs Assessment (Completion: 2009)
 - ADS and the PSU Institute on Aging
- Target Population
 - 55+
 - 200% of Federal Poverty
 - Oversampling of Limited English Proficient
- Areas of Inquiry
 - Housing, access, safety & support, health, financial security, volunteerism and engagement
