Welcome to the Public Safety Trends Summary Report produced by Multnomah County's Local Public Safety Coordinating Council. The purpose of this report is to provide an executive level summary of operational data for many of the decision points in the County's Public Safety System for the Council's Executive Committee, partner agency staff, and members of the public.

The statistics detailed in this report are sourced from the County's Decision Support System – Justice data warehouse (DSSJ). The data contained in DSSJ is sourced from the host agency systems and is regularly audited for accuracy. Additionally, the data presented in this report is regularly reviewed by the owner agency analysts for consistency and clarity.

The Report provides both long term trend data and near term descriptive statistics. The long term trends section provides a description of how certain types of events, case types, and charge levels have changed over time. The short-term trends section provides a more detailed description of the data presented in the long-term trend section. Measures of reported Incidents, Arrest, Disposition, and Sentencing are reported at the case unit level. Measures for Booking and Custody are reported at the person level.



### Average Daily Reported Part 1 Offenses\*




## **Average Daily Reported Part 1 Offenses for November 2012**

There were no reported homicides in November 2012.

Violent crime represented 8.8% of the reported Part 1 offenses in November 2012, a slight increase from the previous month. This was driven by a 29% increase in the number of reported robbery incidents. Robbery was the only Part 1 offenses to have an increase in reported incidents.

Average daily Part 1 offenses in November 2012= 105.2











# **Average Daily Reported Part 1 Property Offenses**




















## Average Daily Bookings by Severity in November 2012\*


