About a year ago, the Regional Arts & Culture Council commissioned Arvie to with Ballot Measure 11 youth currently in detention to create 5 murals.</p> <p>Arvie reported the youth have responded quite well and really look forward to their time spent creating the murals. During downtime when the group is not working on the murals, they are encouraged to create their own personal drawings of such things as family members, etc.</p> <p>Currently, the group is working on the 4th mural in F1 POD. The murals are acrylics on plywood and when the set is completed, there will be an event in Detention to celebrate after which they will be temporarily placed in City/County sites for up to one year before installing them in their final locations in Detention.
