Mike Geiger</b> Portland Police Bureau</p> <p><b>Kevin Donegan</b> Program Director Janus Youth Programs, Inc.</p>	<p>Joslyn talked about the purpose of this three-year project to improve local capacity to address CSEC in Multnomah County and to build upon current collaborative efforts. The current challenge is providing shelter for this population. Currently, 20 stakeholders have convened to address this issue, develop a common language and discuss what needs to change systemically to make it work. They are also looking at ways of being more inclusive and inviting other advocates to the table. There are some beds at Garfield House for residential placement (<u>125 beds are needed</u>) and Child Welfare is developing a unit to serve these youth.</p> <p>Their main goal is to train the trainers as well as more advocates. The Victim Service Team has developed a single integrated plan based on the philosophy that when a youth enters the system they belong to all partners not just one agency.</p> <p>Commissioner McKeel informed the group about current legislation to post the national trafficking phone number on all OLCC license renewal notifications. Senator Wyden requested shelter funding as well as some other bi-partisan pieces.</p> <p>Joslyn mentioned there was a strong community awareness about these issues and was told there were high school students waiting to see how they can help. Sgt. Geiger stated this population has moved from advertising on 82nd Avenue to various internet chat lines. <p><b>New Gun Zone Policy Update</b></p> <p><b>Lt. Hendriet</b> Portland Police Bureau - Gang Enforcement Unit</p> <p><b>Les Taylor</b> Lead Juvenile Justice Counselor</p>	<p>There is a new curfew ordinance taking effect January 20, 2011 with roll out March 30th imposing a 7pm to 6am curfew for youth with gun charges. This ordinance will focus on 3 different areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Hot Spot Enforcement</li> <li>• Endangering a Child with a Firearm (child obtains gun through parental neglect)</li> <li>• Failure to Report a Theft of a Firearm</li> </ul> <p>The 3 Hot Spot zones affected by curfew ordinance:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• North / NE</li> <li>• Entertainment District</li> <li>• East County</li> </ul> <p>Lists of juveniles with current gun crimes will be given to officers by Juvenile Service Division and the Oregon Youth Authority. Les stated there were currently approximately 20-25 probation youth who would be affected. <p><b>Legislative Update</b></p> <p><b>David Koch</b> Deputy Director Juvenile Service Division</p>	<p>Dave talked about where we are currently with LPSCC to complete OJDDP Gang Grant This is a comprehensive model grant of \$750,000 targeted to potentially realign service in regards to gang intervention with focus on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Collaboration between systems</li> <li>• Developing a direct-service steering committee</li> <li>• Survey to gather data</li> <li>• Intervention team (i.e. Project Safe Streets)</li> </ul> <p>We will do agency budget impacts after the chair's budget is released.
