Abbey Stamp Juvenile Court Improvement Coordinator	system. The Crossover Youth Practice Model provides \$50,000 in support and technical assistance and was awarded in the Spring. A national conference has already taken place which facilitated development of Multnomah County specific program and practice enhancements. The target population are youth with concurrent open cases in dependency and delinquency. Currently, we are working to answer the following questions: • How do we identify these youth? • How do we track these youth? • What types of assessments would be the most effective? Can delinquency and dependency system collaborate and have fewer assessments? • How has foster care played into child trafficking and prostitution? The biggest challenge to this project is getting all the relevant stakeholders to the table to begin discussing these issues and assisting with data collection. They really need more child welfare input and Judge Waller strongly encouraged folks to get involved in this very important project. DCJ Strategic Plan Update David Koch Juvenile Service Division Assistant Director	The Department commissioned a gap analysis report last year. This was completed and DCJ was encouraged to develop an internal Steering Committee to assist in development and review of strategic planning activity and ultimately completion of a strategic plan for the department. Five key strategy areas have been identified and associated Activities/Tasks are being developed. These strategies are listed below. • Behavioral change • Accountability • Resource management • Commitment to victims • System change The strategic plan will guide utilization of resources and efforts of staff in key areas. In these challenging fiscal times it will be critical for the juvenile justice system to compare priorities and hopefully reach agreement on alignment of resources such that there is a concerted system effort to focus resources. The Department of Community Justice - Adult Probation & Parole side is currently working with PSU on mapping the adult system entitled "Streams of Offenders". We are hoping to have them do the same for the Juvenile system including the Oregon Youth Authority (OYA) to show how all players relate in the system.
