Greetings,

I am proposing leasing the facility from September 2014 through October 2016, with renewal options in October 2016.

Proposing to use the facility as is without any changes or alterations other than painting some interior walls with murals.

This institutional building is designed and built as a county jail to house 500 adults. The need may not have arisen, this proposal suggests that need might yet arise.

Using the facilities productively without alteration seems prudent.

Host Campus proposes this Bybee Lake property to be its Flag Ship inspiring community college satellite campuses in various urban, suburban, rural or rustic locations. Topical multi-media collaborative elaboration ensues.

Security and surety foster the practice of healthy thinking and interaction, thus, creating an environment of inclusion with intent for personal improvement to purposefully empower people.

SCHEDULE

Contracting eight (8) Three (3) month terms coinciding with Portland Community College terms.

Fall 2014, Winter 2015, Spring 2015, Summer 2015, Fall 2015, Winter 2016, Spring 2016, Summer 2016.

TEAM

Operational procedures employing hundreds of part-time, live-in, student staff members committing to learning and working together. Crews of friends living together in semi-private dormitory-style student housing. Contracting cooperation through clearly defined expectations, terms, and conditions. Guaranteeing freedom of movement by scheduling classes, appointments with reservations for regular meal times. Individual contractual agreements assuring individual responsibility and accountability are held entirely by an individual's own student contract. Individuals identifying by nature, a care-giver, or by necessity, a care-taker, or by personal choice, their supporter.

FINANCE

Support Stream departments of places, spaces, travel, technology, safety, and food services provide interdisciplinary introduction, and contracting crew efforts, with hands-on-the-job training. Cross-training vocational skills with domestic responsibilities through paid apprentice and tutoring positions. Creating a closed-loop economy equitably paying cash for everyone's efforts weekly, while everyone pays weekly rent for their bed and their stay. Accommodations and services provided for, and by students who may be impaired, fragile, frail, aged, and/or medicated.

BENEFITS

Services provided by willing grateful people dedicating mutual comfort through safety and sanctuary by respect for the co-occurring repercussions of catastrophe within any individual life. Individuals and crews graciously providing care for those graciously accepting the care of others. Personal considerations given to individual crises, trauma, post-traumatic stress, addictions, legal issues, education, skills, abilities, supportive family, supportive friends, all impairments, and a person's overall health and comfort.

PROPOSING VISION

Replicable community college satellite program inspiring ourselves through provision for interdisciplinary accreditation by labor intensive dedication in the development or operations of twenty-four hour, site specific, student accommodations and services.

Architecturally customized, community built, and kept to health and safety codes with willing grateful people in support stream apprenticeships operating by contractual agreements with specific groups for specific purposes at specific locations. Dedicating comfort through safety and shelter by respect for the co-occurring repercussions of catastrophe within any individual life.

Program Overview

Contractual agreements assuring cooperation that both the design in everything, and in the everyday support crews' unobtrusive room service and accommodations are for the uninterrupted and uninhibited provision of living services and assisted living services.

Services Stream

To Whom It May Concern:

The Oregon Media Production Association (OMPA) has engaged in conversation with a variety of private and public stakeholders regarding the acquisition or rented use of the Wapato property currently owned and operated by Multnomah County. At this time, these conversations have yielded significant interest but no financial commitments. That reality, combined with the short timeline provided for in the Request for Interest, has left us with a limited ability to submit a formal response to this RFI. It is clear that the Wapato facility has the potential to serve as a location that could foster the growth of the film, video and media production industry, and help contribute to the local and statewide economy in this sector.

There are many factors that influence the growth of the industry in Oregon. We have made significant progress by increasing the amount of projects recruited to Oregon from approximately \$6million in 2003 to over \$120million last year. Infrastructure continues to be developed to meet the needs of the growing industry. More space to affordably locate the production, administration and development of media content is one of the infrastructure pieces that we will benefit from growing.

With that in mind, OMPA would like to see that the film, video, and media production is considered as a possible viable and productive future use of the Wapato property. While at this time, we are not able to provide details regarding the potential acquisition or specific potential uses of this property, OMPA feels that Multnomah County should consider the future use of Wapato – either in whole or part – for film, video and media production purposes.

OMPA submits this response to see that the film, video and media production sector is considered as a potential future use of the Wapato facility. We will continue to seek out and work with financiers and other private stakeholders as well as state and local government agencies to explore the use of Wapato as an incubator, maker space, and administrative hub for this growing and creative industry in Oregon.

Round-op Alpha Acquisition and Repurposing: Multnomah County Wapato Facility

I. General Repurposing Concept and Specific Program for the Property

In response to the Request for Interest by the Multnomah County in relation to the Wapato Facility, Round-op Alpha hereby confirms its interest for the offered and available correctional facility and submits its general repurposing and its specific program for the Wapato Facility that is in line with Multnomah County's RFI goal and objectives to maximize the use of the property.

I.I. General Repurposing Concept

With the Wapato Facility under Round-op Alpha's jurisdiction the facility shall serve the exact purpose for which it was originally built and completed in 2004: to incarcerate prisoners.

This with the anticipated arrests and convictions in mind of several hundreds of high-profile and high-level criminals and conspirators in the matters of crimes against humanity; crimes against specific groups of citizens; crimes against citizens individually; crimes against peace; genocide; democide; brigandage; war crimes; government-sponsored, government-supported, government-tolerated conspiracies, terrorism, eco-terrorism; psychological warfare and fraudulent financial operations.

I.II. Specific Program

The Wapato Facility shall serve as a detention facility to house on a long-term basis high-level and high-profile convicts.

The facility shall in addition be allowed by Round-op Alpha to be extensively commercially exploited, to the fullest extent possible, by organizing and facilitating guided tours for the general public - an international audience - in and around the Wapato Facility at very competitive fees and rates; by facilitating other commercial activities including but not limited to the exploitation of a museum and a gift & souvenir shop. Several partnerships with travel agencies, hotels and transportation companies as well as copyright and franchise contracts with the international press and entertainment industries are also anticipated to emerge from this specific use of the property.

A number of concrete options have been worked out already and are on the negotiation table, although this particular information is for now regarded as trade secrets.

The generated profits derived from these commercial activities shall be forwarded to development and educational/pedagogic charitable projects located around the world.

II. Initial Investment Estimate

Considering that the facility cost \$58.4 million to build, Round-op Alpha is willing to find investors for an amount that is not higher than this total cost that was required to build the Wapato Facility, in relation to the facility itself. This amount of investment of course already includes the annual costs of \$300,000 that the Multnomah County has spent in the past 9 to 10 years, amounting to no more than \$3,000,000 of the by us proposed \$58.4 million.

An initial additional investment of \$50,000,000 is envisaged to facilitate the actual commercial exploitation of the facility, including the guided tours for the general public and a museum and a gift & souvenir shop on-site as well as proper transportation docks for arriving and departing travellers, employees and visitors.

Round-op Alpha shall also apply for the Oregon income tax credit that equals to 25% (up to a maximum credit of \$2 million per year for five years) of the investments related to electronic commerce such as facilities, computers, equipment, networks or software.

The total initial investment estimate for the Wapato Facility amounts to \$108.4 million, for which Round-op Alpha is willing to locate investors.

III. Economic Activity and Profits

III.I. Sales

With the Wapato Facility under Round-op Alpha's jurisdiction the property is more than anticipated to be a commercial success and touristic landmark for an international audience and clientele.

The conservatively estimated annual sales deriving from the guided tours in and around the facility amounts to \$3,600,000: i.e. with 1,000 visitors (paying participants) per day or 30,000 per month or 360,000 per year at \$10 per person.

The conservatively estimated annual sales deriving from the museum and gift & souvenir shop amounts to \$675,000: i.e. with 25% of the audience (paying participants of the guided tours) spending money at the museum and gift & souvenir shop, at \$7.5 per person.

The conservatively estimated annual sales deriving from food and beverages at the facility amounts to \$900,000: i.e. with 25% of the audience (paying participants of the guided tours) spending money at the restaurant/outlets, at \$10 per person.

The conservatively estimated annual sales deriving from partnerships with travel agencies, hotels and transportation companies as well as advertising, copyright and franchise contracts with the international press, entertainment industries and other merchants and organizations amounts to \$10,000,000.

Total conservatively estimated annual sales deriving from commercial activities: \$15,175,000.

III.II. Governments Contributions and Convicts Compensations Funds

Due to the exceptional nature of the convicts their crimes and due to the high-profile and high-level status attributed to the convicts, the respective government for each convict is obligated to install a Convicts Compensations Fund that will provide the required funding to operate the Wapato Facility. Each government shall collect these required funds from the convicts themselves based upon the illegal and criminally acquired gains that the convicts have extracted from the economy and their respective government in the course of their crimes and illegal activities. In addition, the governments shall also collect damages from the convicts, caused by/deriving from the convicts their war crimes, terrorism, murder, pollution of the environment and bodily and mental harm brought upon the people through the deployment of harmful vaccination and medical products and services and harmful food products such as GMOs.

The Wapato Facility can house up to 525 convicts. Each convict should pay the respective Convicts Compensations Fund no less than \$5,000,000 during the period of their incarceration which is anticipated to be 30 years per convict.

The combined total of all Convicts Compensations Funds shall therefore be no less than \$2,625,000,000 in the first 30-year period of operating the Wapato Facility.

III.III. Staff and Annual Budget

Estimated total number of employees: 312

Estimated annual operating budget: \$75,000,000

Estimated 30-year operating budget: \$2,250,000,000 (inflation not included)

IV. Repurposing Schedule

In practice, the repurposing shall commence as soon as the first convict arrives. This date shall be not sooner than 12 months after the approval of this repurposing publication and not later than 24 months after the approval of this repurposing publication.

In the first 12 months after the approval of this repurposing publication the Wapato Facility shall be prepared for commercial exploitation, including the construction of the commercial facilities onsite.

The recruitment pool for the exploitation of the Wapato Facility shall be started in the first 12 months after the approval of this repurposing publication.

Additional commercial partnerships shall be negotiated in the first 12 months after the approval of this repurposing publication and in the course of the next 29 years when necessary.

V. Initial Repurposing Team

Project manager: Round-op Alpha S.I.N.G.JA.

Financial partners: Third party investors, national Convicts Compensations Funds (to be

established)

Judicial partner: Special International Tribunal for High-Profile and High-Level Crimes (SITHHC)

VI. Finance

As stated in chapter 2, Round-op Alpha is willing to find the initial investment of \$108.4 million, for the purchase of the Wapato Facility (\$58.4 million) and the initial additional investment of \$50,000,000 that is envisaged to facilitate the actual commercial exploitation of the property.

The funds shall be collected from third party investors and the national Convicts Compensations Funds in the event that this repurposing publication is approved.

VII. Benefits

It is estimated that the Wapato Facility under Round-op Alpha's jurisdiction shall generate at least 312 positions for employees, on-site.

The repurposed property shall contribute greatly to the local economy of Oregon, Portland, due to its positive impact on tourism and commerce because a regular, growing international audience will travel to the Wapato Facility since the incarceration of only high-profile and high-level convicts will continuously draw a lot of attention nationally, in the US, and from around the world. The property will be unique in the world, truly one of a kind, since individuals such as George Bush Jr., David Rockefeller, Hillary Clinton, Bill Clinton, Barack Obama, queen Elizabeth II and Benjamin Netanyahu will be incarcerated at the Wapato Facility.

Aside from the local economic boost and constant growth the world as a whole will also benefit largely from the repurposing of the Wapato Facility. Dozens of nations around the world will be relieved from their high-profile and high-level criminals who currently are in government offices as heads of government or heads of state. The world will finally be relieved from the most notorious band of real terrorists and murderers who already have the blood of more than 1.5 million people on their hands since 2001 alone. The world will be relieved from illegal and fraudulent tax and financial constructions, the carbon tax and accompanying ponzi scheme will finally be ruled out and deconstructed. The world will be relieved from the imperialistic iron fist of the UNEI (US/NATO/EU/Israel) alliance that has been on a deadly crusade since 9/11, 2001, completely destabilizing the international community and sovereign nations. The world will be relieved from criminal financiers that loot the public's wealth in the US, in Europe and the rest of the world. This is a proposal outlining potential uses for Wapato Jail, an empty structure that could serve to benefit those inhabiting the neighborhood as a healthful garden and community rehabilitation site. The reality is that all people need to be rehabilitated in some way, and prison environments, which isolate already alienated people from each other, function more as receptacles for society's ills than places of healing and self betterment. Using the garden--an ecological microcosm in which plant species are grown and nourished together--we propose the project outlined below. This project will transform Wapato, a site intended to oppress and suppress individuals, to a space of communal agency.

The necessities for any type of growth are very parallel. The key components of growth, or 'rehabilitation' include but are not limited to: *time, space, nutritious food, care, sunlight, fresh open air,* and *self-directed knowledge.* We understand that these are elements not traditionally incorporated into sites of incarceration in the United States of America, and that is our basis for change.

In the following letter, we will outline how each element will function in the space and how it will revolutionize the Prison Industrial Complex from this day forward.

The first element of *time* can be linked directly to *space*. Wapato would be a building like any other that provides shelter and community for people. A dedicated space conducive to creating supportive relationships to the land and its people. It would serve as protection against the harsher elements of nature and a resting spot for its inhabitants, who would be the youth of our community who are seeking just that. Each individual would take part in the revolution of the Prison Industrial Complex (PIC) in equal parts, creating a new model of incarceration based on what we learn from the land and how to make things grow.

Nutritious food, like all good things, needs time to grow. A food garden is the most important piece of the land in the new site. Taking a cue from the inmates who are currently incarcerated under the conditions of the PIC, who starve themselves in order to convey their vital messages, we would place nutritious food at the center of this revolutionary site.

The element of *care* can be seen as anti-Prison Industrial Complex. Crime does not involve the element of care, but neither does incarcerating an individual within the current state of the PIC. Neither action is conducive to rehabilitation, which is presumably the goal of the PIC. Every personal relationship struggles to involve this element of care, but it is incorporated into every other element in this plan.

Sunlight and fresh open air will feed the garden and it will feed the people.

The most intuitive element of our proposal is *self-directed knowledge*. This is based on our trust that people know what they need to learn and that they will seek it out. We will provide the resources for people to accomplish this, which will include transportation, the internet, news, and fostering agency. We will provide a space to both speak and listen.

We see this as an opportunity for reparations to be made for the specific communities who have been targeted and affected by the Prison Industrial Complex--which, in our minds, is every person in one form or another. The guidelines provided for the use of this land are simple and straightforward and they begin the process of amending, which *should* be the very first step of a government interested in serving the people.
