1. Introductions/Review Agenda & Minutes

Judge Welch

As of July 1, there is a strong likelihood that all clients will again be assigned legal rep. Additionally the juvenile drug court project will end.

2. OYA Update "Utilization Trends"

Joe Mesteth

The utilization report was unavailable.

3. The updated RAI form: overrides and data collection

Scott Keir

Scott updated the council on the RAI. There will be no changes in scoring the RAI. RAI changes will be limited to the type of holds and the decision point the hold is recommended. Scott's data

analysis of earlier data revealed that most overrides were policy holds, which had been counted incorrectly (i.e. out of state runaways).

Scott also reported that most changes would be confined to page 1 of the RAI, in the special detention categories. Page 2 will remain the same. Page 3 will see a change regarding override reason, to both detain and release. Page 4 will now capture the detained reason at prelims. Data analysis will be available in 6 months. The goal remains to ultimately have the data collected in JJIS.

4. Update regarding RAI Detained Reasons

Thach Nguyen

Thach presented a new data collection model regarding changes to page 1 of the RAI. Current data analysis does not identify problems resulting in Disproportionate Minority Confinement. The new data collection model will focus on analysis of the policy hold definition.

5. Detained youth, April/May 2003, and DMC

James Stegmiller

Jim presented data on hold and release of youth at intake and prelims. The data included information regarding disproportionality. The data suggested that judicial decision at the prelim help mitigate the number of youth of color held in detention. Intake held 72 youth. At prelims, the judiciary held 49. This has lead to a decrease in the number of youth of color held in detention.
