Introductions, Announcements, and Approval of Minutes

Commissioner Judy Shiprack called the meeting to order and introductions were made.

The minutes of the May meeting were approved.

Commissioner Shiprack announced the Justice Reinvestment Victim's Services draft RFPQ will be emailed to executive members Wednesday, June 3rd. Feedback is requested by the end of the week.

The Decision Support System-Justice (DSS-J) data warehouse is an invaluable resource for the county and assists public safety agencies in adopting evidence-based practices and policies. Commissioner Shiprack noted there will be an assessment of the DSS-J. The executive committee will be asked for input.

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Multnomah

Judge Nan Waller requested time to talk about what the community can do to address the high number of shootings that took place in May.

DOJ Settlement Update

Portland Police Bureau's Captain Michael Marshman provided an overview of the DOJ settlement with the City of Portland. This settlement is unique in that it is the first agreement related to mental health. It is also unique in that the model includes the following community oversight:

- The COCL (Compliance Officer Community Liaison), the academic group out of Chicago monitoring compliance;
- The COAB (Community Oversight Advisory Board) consists of 5 non-voting police members and 15 voting community members and advises the COCL.

The seven major areas of focus are: training, community mental health services, crisis intervention, accountability, use of force, EIS (Employment Information System)--acts as an early warning system, and community engagement. The police bureau is adding resources to data analysis.

It was noted the US Attorney's Office appreciates Portland's actions so far, and Commissioner Shiprack said this is a tremendous coordination opportunity.

The MacArthur Safety and Justice Challenge (SJC)

Challenge. 191 jurisdictions applied, and Multnomah County was one of 20 sites selected and awarded \$150,000 to develop a plan to address three focus areas: options for inmates with mental health needs, decreasing the disproportionate incarceration of people of color, and decreasing the number of low-risk inmates in jail. During the first phase, the county will develop a plan for system reform and set measurable outcomes The county will then compete for up to \$2 million per year for at least two years to implement the plan.

Lore Joplin is the county's site coordinator, and Lindsay Stover is the project coordinator. Lore provided an overview of the structure of the SJC. See the SJC presentation
