City of Troutdale Measures		Reynolds School Measure
26-265 Five-year Local Option Levy for Police, Fire & 911 Operations. Question: Shall Troutdale adopt a local option levy at \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value for police, fire & 911 services? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent. Summary: Troutdale provides Police, Fire, and 911 through contracts: Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, City of Gresham Fire Department, and Bureau of Emergency Communications. Costs of essential public safety services continually increase and are projected to rise faster than available funding. Without a sustainable funding source, the gap between revenues and public safety costs will become unsustainable, risking the long-term reliability of Police, Fire, and 911 services. If this measure passes, the current Council will replace the \$25 Public Safety Fee, with a voter-approved local option levy of \$1.60 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The average Troutdale home assessed at approximately \$267,800, would cost about \$428.48 annually. Because the Public Safety Utility Fee would be eliminated, the average homeowner would not pay the current \$300 annual fee, resulting in an estimated net annual cost increase of approximately \$128.48 while providing dedicated funding for Police, Fire, and 911 services. The amount collected is estimated to be \$3,556,392 in 2027-28, \$3,663,084 in 2028-29, \$3,772,977 in 2029-30, \$3,886,166 in 2030-31, and \$4,002,751 in 2031-32. Public safety costs already exceed \$10 million annually and are projected to surpass \$14 million by 2030. This levy ensures stable, reliable public safety funding for Troutdale's future. ☐ Yes ☐ No	26-266 ADVISORY VOTE: Should Troutdale Create a Municipal Police Department? Question: ADVISORY VOTE: Should the City proceed with planning and creation of a Troutdale Police Department? Summary: This is a non-binding advisory vote and does not authorize or impose any tax, fee, or expenditure. This is a non-binding advisory vote and does not authorize or impose any tax, fee, or expenditure. In 2015, the City of Troutdale dissolved its Police Department and contracted with the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office to provide police services. The decision was based, in part, on the expectation that contracting would reduce long-term costs while maintaining public safety services. Since then, the cost of contracted police services has increased, and the City has continued evaluating service levels, operational needs, community expectations, and long-term financial sustainability. As part of that review, the City has developed preliminary plans for the possible re-establishment of a Troutdale Police Department. This advisory vote asks whether the City should continue planning to create a Troutdale Police Department while evaluating the costs, operational considerations, and benefits of both a municipal Police Department and continued contracted police services. The City Council will consider the results of this advisory vote when evaluating future police service options. ☐ Yes ☐ No	26-268 Bonds to Increase Safety, Security; Repair, Construct Schools; Increase Accessibility Question: Shall District issue bonds, projected to maintain 2026 bond rate, to increase safety, repair, replace aging schools and increase accessibility? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution. Summary: This measure is projected to maintain District's 2026 bond levy rate of \$1.62/\$1,000 of assessed value. If passed, District will receive \$8,168,000 in state matching funds. Reynolds School District seeks approval for a principal amount of \$162.5 million in bonds to finance capital costs, including: Replace Aging Glenfair Elementary: Replace the 72-year-old school, which is overcrowded, has building systems beyond repair, contains hazardous materials, and has outdated safety & security measures. Replacement estimated to cost less than renovation. Repair Failing Infrastructure: · Roofing, HVAC, plumbing, electrical systems, water heater replacement districtwide. Safety & Security: · New fire alarm systems, PA systems, perimeter security across the district. Accessibility: · ADA upgrades including accessible parking, sidewalks, ramps districtwide. Additional Projects: · New turf field, bleachers at Reynolds High School. Requires community oversight committee, regular audits.
