**Executive Summary** 

Funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) established a pilot project that provides gun violence intervention programming and supports the development and capacity growth of smaller community organizations and partners to expand the outreach and efficacy of gun violence intervention programs. DCJ seeks continued funding in FY 2024 to keep addressing gun violence in Multhomah County.

## **Program Description**

The goal of this program is to build the capacity of community based organizations with the necessary skills and experience to provide gun violence intervention programming centered around high-intensity life-coaching for individuals at the greatest risk of gun violence. Multnomah County is experiencing a spike in gun violence. Data for the City of Portland alone reflects this alarming trend. In 2020, there were 900 shootings and 41 deaths. In 2021, there were 1315 shootings and 92 deaths. In 2022, there were 1306 shootings and 106 deaths.

The Department of Community Justice is working with Portland Opportunities Industrialization Center (POIC) to build capacity among community-based organizations, so they gain the necessary experience to provide gun violence intervention programming aimed at reducing the number of gun violence incidents in Multnomah County. To date, the partnership has provided technical assistance to 3 smaller community providers who have implemented the following services: Intensive case management and life coaching for individuals 18-25 years of age at a high risk of gun violence provided by trusted community members with relevant lived experience. Positive gun violence intervention activities such as recreation out of school hours, youth grief/loss support groups, and decision making skill- building opportunities.

Another component of this project is to provide training for subcontracted organizations on service delivery, nonprofit management, and staff wellness and resiliency. This is a critical component of program sustainability.

This program offer reflects the ARP investment priority of: Crisis Response & Community Recovery (addressing community violence through prevention, intervention, and healing; and building community connection, assets, and resilience)
