How many people need care?

- An estimated 42,958 individuals below 200% of the federal poverty level have a mental illness.
- The county served 31.2% of these individuals with Medicaid or county general funded treatment in fiscal year 2010 leaving 68.8% in our community with an unmet mental health need.
- Outpatient and residential addiction treatment served 3,501 individual adults in FY12.
- An estimated 3,200 additional individuals in Multnomah County wanted addictions treatment last year but didn't receive it.

Key areas to expand

Prevention & Early Intervention

- Mental Health First Aid

Intensive Community Services

- Forensic Assertive Community Treatment
