## **Sugary Beverage Tax**

- Injury Prevention:
  - Stopped collecting signatures on IP44 or IP43 for firearms
  - Both groups will proceed in 2020
- Is there a similar preemption by the state for increase of purchasing age of firearms to 21 and background checks?
  - Never heard of proposal by County or City
  - o Doesn't prevent support of state law
- County staff will ask about preemption
- Traffic Calming Measures and Complete Streets
  - Could borrow from best practices from Vision Zero
  - Physical activity grants REACH and the city of Gresham
  - Tyra and Becca would be interested in work
- Could set up a group meeting with Vision Zero
- Interest in Vision Zero and Complete Streets
- Could be support of efforts; need to do research on what County can do
  - o Adelle -check on County legislative agenda
- When legislative agenda gets finalized, determine priorities
- Meet with Jeston to determine strategies
- REACH:
  - Focused grant on racial disparities
  - Strategies to address disparities not long enough history
  - Had grant for 4 years
  - Currently has nutrition and tobacco focus
  - Opportunity to apply for the grant again
    - Will stay the course on African American focus
    - New parameters:
      - Focus on nutrition
      - Physical activity
      - Community-clinical linkages
    - Nutrition strategies ACHIEVE
      - Work with food vendors
      - Childcare centers healthy parameters
      - Voucher incentive programs
      - Breastfeeding
    - Physical
      - New improved bicycle public transportation
      - Better land use and design
      - Getting people active and safe
      - Working populations
        - Schools, parks, centers
    - Clinical strategies
      - Food nutrition education programs
      - WIC
      - Connect to economic development programs (systems work)
    - Tameka was not able to attend, but wanted to see if MC-PHAB was willing to support the work
    - Everyone in agreement
    - Is there a place for hygiene?
      - Rachael will check
    - 5 year grant
      - Most the County could get is \$900,000 per year
    - Most resources go to support community organizations and build capacity in community
- Social determinants of health
  - Paid family and medical leave has a lot of support and momentum
- Housing First
  - Don't have a requirement to be sober before getting housing
    - No preconditions
  - o Proven successful in Utah
  - Central City Concern has seen success in programs
  - Suzanne suggested looking into what is being done locally and how to support that
- Affordable Housing/Inclusionary Zoning a big bucket for housing work
