- Policy Options Summaries document is a shorter summary document with main salient points behind policy and high level data taken from the more robust individual policy analyses
  - Created to prep the Chair's staff for this meeting
  - Will share this version with MC-PHAB and can be a reference point
  - o All policy documents are living documents that can be revised and added
- Flavor Ban
  - FDA announced that they would move to ban menthol, ban flavors in cigars and restrict flavors in e-cigarettes
    - Process will be long and will include public hearings
  - FYI Pipe tobacco is not included in the ban, though roll-your-own tobacco is. This is an important loophole since many companies will exploit this by re-labeling roll-your-own as pipe tobacco
- Restricting Locations of Tobacco Retailers
  - Is there County-level data on percentage of kids smoking when parents smoke?
    - Social-level smoking (e.g. sneaking cigarettes from a purse) is a common entry point for smoking
    - REACH driver for change for parents wanting to do best by their kids; used commercials and billboards as way to deliver message
      - Was there an effect?
        - Would have to do a sample size for change behavior
        - Advertisements were effective in terms of population viewing them
      - Parents more likely to feel guilty smoking in front of children
  - Question: Is there increased enforcement tied to TRL?
    - Tiered enforcement
      - Have not reached tier where licenses are revoked
      - Have suspended licenses for up to 30 days
      - Can revisit tiered approach if it isn't effective
    - Severe penalties for selling to minors
    - County, OHA, Dept. of Revenue all involved
    - Make sure BOH is remaining apprised of information so that they can determine if they should revise approach
    - Rebecca as a teenager, there didn't feel like there were any consequences to buying tobacco underage
  - Are the policies we support currently being enforced?
    - Audrey: One category for policy options that would be helpful is what parties would push back (e.g. big tobacco, retailers)
      - Would like to know who are the retailers? Is there equitable treatment towards all retailers? Whose businesses are we threatening?
      - Either enforcement is failing or location is the issue
      - Need more data before determining how we want to pull licenses from brick and mortar businesses located close to schools
    - Currently in the 11th month of data collection on retailers
      - Looking forward to bringing data forward through the years
  - Restricting could suggest area close to schools be an enforcement zone, as opposed to removing licenses
  - Kari McFarlan: The Tobacco Control and Prevention Program always lean on education and outreach on compliance as opposed to using enforcement
    - Identified 109 retailers near schools and focused education efforts on them
    - Recognize that there is more effort that we can do towards retailers on how best to comply
  - Suzanne can go into other documents to pull research that has already been done
    - Where do we add information to Elizabeth's document?
  - Daniel: other ways to limit locations near schools that are less stringent -Stop giving out new licenses as businesses leave area
- Healthy Food Procurement:
  - O How much would the implementation of this cost?
    - Need to collect data on what is currently being spent
