Vaughn Crandall, Reygan Cunningham, and David Muhammad presented *What Works to Reduce Gun Violence: Overview of National Research Evidence and Best Practice*. See the presentation for <u>details</u>.



Highlighted points included:

- Activities should match goals.
- Social networks are a key factor in addressing gun violence.
- A problem analysis is necessary.
- Oakland contracted with California partnership for the problem analysis.
- A homicide costs the system about \$1 million.
