Policy Updates: Oregon, Federal

Oregon:

Student Success Act & Hunger-Free Schools!

- passed, although could be referred to ballot
- Hunger Free Schools graphic attached on next slide from PHFO; \$42 million for school meals programs

Farm to School

 Still working through the legis. session as of 6/26/19 with increased funding

Equal Access to Roads

 Still working through the legis. session as of 6/26/19

WIC to K and WIC expanded benefits: did not continue through legislative process this session

Housing Opportunities: check Oregon Housing Alliance's <u>website</u> for affordable housing legislative updates.

Federal:

Public charge rules updates:

- Awaiting publication of rule that narrows definition of "public charge"; nothing has changed for families at this time
- Possible plans to issue a proposed rule related to public charge & deportation; no updates since May. FAQ document here

Current HUD proposed rule to prohibit "mixed immigration status" from living in public and other subsidized housing:

- Comment period open until July 9 for proposed rule


Possible federal poverty line regulation changes

- Proposed rule was open for comments until June 21

HUNGER-FREE SCHOOLS HB 2760 HOW IT WORKS







335 schools


426 schools

Schools that could offer meals to all students at no charge under HB 2760 under the federal Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

62% of Oregon students attend these schools

761 schools, **345,131** enrolled students

Schools with targeted assistance for school meals up to 300% FPL



484 schools

State-funded meals at no charge to be consistent with eligibility for children's health insurance

38% of students attend these schools

484 schools, 48,362 more students

Programs of note:

School district grant program

- 16 school districts apply for Trimet passes for students who qualify for free/reduced lunch
- Youth pass program in Portland in transition- PPS still funding youth passes, but other districts lost them

Reduced fare program

- Expansion of Honored Citizen pass
- Families who have SNAP, OHP or are free/reduced lunch eligible automatically qualify, or family shows proof of income
- Family members, once signed up, visit downtown Trimet office to pick up cards
- Over 15,000 people registered for reduced fare program so far

Decriminalizing citations

- Working on waiving fees, very low fees, or requesting community service hours to settle fee




