Multnomah County Updates


Media and Announcements

- On April 21, Multnomah County Board of County Commissioners held a board briefing on the [impact of COVID-19 on food access](#) and the [county's role in long-term care facilities](#). See [here](#) for agenda and video recording.
- Regional Health Officers support testing guidelines outlined in the [clinician alert](#) issued by Multnomah County Health Officer, Dr. Jennifer Vines that includes updated criteria for who should be tested for COVID, including residents and staff in congregate settings, essential front line workers, people of color and people with disabilities.
- The CARES Act's Coronavirus Relief Fund was announced that has slated Multnomah County [to receive around \\$28 million](#).
- On April 21, the city-county Joint Office of Homeless Services opened the second of three [temporary Outdoor Emergency Shelters](#) located at SE Main St and SE Water Ave near the first one that opened on April 16. A third shelter located at NW Broadway and NW Hoyt St is likely to open later this week.


Epidemiology Data

This is a dynamic situation. Information and case counts are changing rapidly and the incident is ongoing.

As of April 22, 2020, 8:00 AM, there were a total of **546 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Multnomah County** and 2,059 cases in Oregon. **27% of Oregon's cases are in Multnomah County.** ([click here for source](#))



There has been **1 new death in Multnomah County** since the last Situation Report (now at 29 deaths). Three new deaths occurred statewide (now at 78 deaths). ([click here for source](#))




Regional COVID-19 Data Dashboard


Multnomah County hosts a [Regional COVID-19 data dashboard](#).

The data shown below are questions we asked cases about potential exposure to and spread of COVID-19. We asked cases if they were aware of being around a [lab confirmed case](#) in the 14 days before they became sick. We also asked what public settings they may have exposed others during their contagious period, which includes the 48 hours before their symptoms started. Additional details on congregate settings cases may live or work in are also shown here.


Locations that cases reported having contact to a confirmed COVID-19 case





Public setting cases may have exposed others during contagious period (which includes 48 hours before symptoms started)


Call Center

Mass Care and Shelter

- Four Physical Distancing Shelters (SDS) with a total capacity of 390 are currently serving 205 people.
- Two Medical Motels with a total capacity of 120, are currently providing support for 21 people.

- The US Department of Veterans Affairs released a new app called [COVID Coach](#) meant to help cope with stress, stay well, and access relevant resources. It is currently available through the app store, and it can be accessed by the public even if they are not specifically veterans.

- The Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) [released research](#) indicating students are likely to be behind in education outcomes due to COVID-19 shutdowns particularly in mathematics.
- The Oregon Department of Education [announced](#) that high school students will not receive letter grades for classes taken in the latter half of the year but will receive a pass or incomplete.

Local Updates

Media and Announcements

- Portland International Airport will get [\\$72 million in recovery funds](#) from the federal government.
- Clackamas County is hosting a “Crime and Justice during and after coronavirus: Listening Session” at 1:00 on Thursday, 4/23. The event will be held on Zoom ([link](#) to Zoom or telephone call-in: 669-900-6833; 346-248-7799; or 408-638-0968. Webinar ID: 976 1481 9415).
- On April 21, City Council held a CARES Act [Council Work Session](#) and the Office of Government Relations explained guidelines on the CARES Act and other federal funding in response to COVID-19.
 - The presentation was followed by a [press conference](#) from the Mayor’s office on economic relief and included other local jurisdictions and public agencies on economic relief.
 - The City received \$114 million in federal funds for COVID-19 response this week. The City is still awaiting additional federal guidance on how it can disperse the funds. The money cannot be used to cover lost revenue or unbudgeted expenses between March 1 and December 30.
- The Portland Housing Bureau is reallocating \$1 million from its budget into a [COVID-19 Emergency Household Stabilization Fund](#) for households suffering a loss of income due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - The fund will provide limited direct cash assistance to at least 2,000 households to help cover urgent needs like groceries, rent, utilities, and medical expenses.
 - Households can apply for \$250 in emergency assistance beginning Monday, April 27 at 10 a.m. by contacting 2-1-1 or going to <https://www.211info.org/covid19>.
- The City of Portland has recently been coordinating with a number of community organizations to support food assistance efforts, including:
 - Partnering HAKI Community Organization, which connects newly arrived East African immigrants to community resources. This is especially critical right now as many families they serve are celebrating Ramadan and this helps families receive culturally significant and celebratory food.
 - Expanding the existing Sunshine Division program to include deliveries to keep community members and first responders safe.
 - Providing logistical support to Portland Public Schools while they offer free lunch to students and their families, including providing tents and traffic management plans for pickups.

- Partnering with local organizations such as Blanchet House, Free Hot Soup, the Free Lunch Collective and Portland Rescue Mission to provide food to the temporary Outdoor Emergency Shelters.
- Portland Parks and Recreation created a [video](#) on how to make a face covering that is accessible to all languages.
- Portland Fire & Rescue is now tracking suspected COVID-19 cases that crews respond to using the Fire Information System software platform. The Oregon Health Authority has required agencies providing EMS to track any suspected cases.



New Updates

- All Metro parks/natural areas remain open, except for camping areas which are closed through July 1.
- PBOT has [reduced SmartPark rates](#) to bring relief to residents and visitors who must travel downtown by car. All-day parking rate in the city’s five SmartPark garages is \$5, the same cost as a round-trip TriMet ticket.

- BIKETOWN, the city's bikeshare system, is [offering significantly discounted pricing](#) through April 30 to provide all Portlanders who need to complete essential trips with a convenient and affordable transportation option that allows for physical distancing.
- [Portland Streetcar service](#) is reduced to every 20 minutes on weekdays. OHSU Aerial Tram limited to hospital employees and patients.
- The City of Portland created a [map of public restrooms and hygiene stations](#) to help stop the spread of coronavirus.

State of Oregon Updates

Media and Announcements

- [Oregon Health Authority Guidance for providers regarding COVID-19 testing](#). OHA has [expanded recommendations](#) for testing to new groups of people with symptoms:
 - Residents, staff, children, or others in a care facility or group living setting, including asymptomatic people when clinical laboratories have sufficient testing capacity.
 - Essential front-line service workers (who display symptoms) who have regular contact with large numbers of people.

- People from communities of color and the disability community (who display symptoms), because of higher risk for COVID-19 and associated complications due to longstanding social and health inequities.
- On April 20, [Governor Brown announced](#) that Oregon National Guard will distribute approximately 395,000 pieces of PPE to all long-term care facilities across Oregon including surgical masks, gloves, N95 masks, face shields and gowns. Deliveries began on Saturday, 4/18.
- Oregon officials are [expecting to receive \\$2.45 billion](#) from the federal CARES Act. About \$1.6 billion will be passed to local jurisdictions this week to pay for unbudgeted COVID-19 expenses.
- Oregon's Department of Human Services is issuing emergency extra Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits to many SNAP households to help buy food. Amounts up to the household maximum will be added to EBT cards in April and May (April 10, [English](#) and [Spanish](#)).
- On April 17, Oregon Health Authority shared an update to [Oregon's epidemic modeling report](#) from the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington, which continues to indicate that statewide mitigation efforts are keeping caseload and hospitalizations well below what they would have been with no interventions. The modeling webpage indicates that Oregon reached its peak on April 19, and presents a Containment Strategy that after May 25, it may be possible to relax social distancing with containment strategies that include testing, contact tracing, isolation and limiting gathering size.
- Oregon may soon add [presumed cases of COVID-19](#) to the official death toll to reconcile how different methodologies for counting COVID-19 related deaths. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is expected to release new forthcoming guidance.
- Google is producing [Public Community Mobility Reports](#). The reports chart movement trends over time across the US and the world, so you can see how movement has changed at retail, parks, workplaces, grocery stores and the like in your state during the pandemic. 
*Every hospital in Oregon is asked to submit data twice daily to Oregon's Hospital Capacity Web System (HOSCAP). Hospital staff are asked to enter bed capacity information, by type, as well as the number of patients with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 illness who are currently hospitalized at the time of data entry. These data may conflict with hospitalization status in Orpheus due to case reporting and investigation lags and temporary discrepancies in case classification.

Portland Metro Area HOSCAP Resource Tracking Report

Multnomah County Health Department EMS Program publishes the Portland Metro Area HOSCAP Resource Tracking Report. The purpose of this report is to provide situational awareness as to the number of ventilators and beds available in the Portland Metro Area (Multnomah, Washington, and Clackamas Counties), as documented by hospital supervisors. This report tracks availability on a daily basis using information in HOSCAP and is run between 2-4pm PST daily (Monday - Friday) using information as reported at 1pm daily. The data provided below was updated 4/22/20.

National Updates

Media and Announcements

- On April 20, the [CDC released a new report](#) showing that calls to U.S. poison centers about disinfectant and cleaner exposure have increased by 20 percent.
- On April 17, FEMA launched a [PPE Exchange dashboard](#) that connects private sector sellers and buyers of PPE
- On April 16, New York City Mayor de Blasio [announced](#) they are partnering with Open Society Foundations to create a \$20 million relief fund for immigrant workers who have been excluded from federal relief funds.
- On April 16, the [FDA is asking people](#) who have recovered from COVID-19 to donate their blood plasma for research on blood-related therapies.
- The Federal Reserve has announced that it is establishing a Main Street Lending Program (Program) (<https://www.federalreserve.gov/monetarypolicy/mainstreetlending.htm>) to support lending to small and medium-sized businesses that were in good financial standing before the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- National Business Emergency Operations Center (NBEOC) produces a daily Snapshot on business and industry domestic supply chains. You can find these each morning on the [NBEOC Dashboard](#) in the 'Snapshot' pod.
- In order to ensure the accuracy of the 2020 Census, the [U.S Census Bureau has announced](#) that it has requested an extension of the self-response period to October 31, 2020 and that Congress approve a 120-day extension to deliver final apportionment figures. The extension will allow for apportionment counts to be delivered to the President by April 30, 2021, and redistricting data to be delivered to the states no later than July 31, 2021.
- HHS has a comprehensive [Novel Coronavirus Resources](#) page that highlights technical resources and information for the medical community and emergency responders.
- [COVID-19 Email Phishing Against US Healthcare Providers](#). Following a global increase in malicious cyber activity exploiting fear derived from the COVID-19 pandemic, the FBI was notified of targeted email phishing attempts against US-based medical providers.
- [Online extortion scams are increasing during the COVID-19 crisis](#). The Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) has seen an increase in reports of online extortion scams during the current "stay-at-home" orders due to the COVID-19 crisis. Because large swaths of the population are staying at home and likely using the computer more than usual, scammers may use this opportunity to find new victims and pressure them into sending money.
