## Multnomah County Updates

### Media and Announcements

- The Multnomah County Commission held a board briefing on June 3, to discuss the County's progress toward meeting the criteria for Phase 1 reopening. Among the presenters were Multnomah County Communicable Disease Director Kim Toevs, Integrated Clinical Service Interim Director Tasha Wheatt-Delancey, and Emergency Management Director Chris Voss. Some highlights are:
  - Chris Voss and Kim Toevs reviewed the County's [reopening status report](#) and [reopening data dashboard](#) (both of which are updated on Wednesdays).
  - The County has increased its contact tracing team to 63 people, which is 52% of the way to meeting the state's requirement that counties have 15 contact tracers per 100,000 residents (that would equal 122 contact tracers here in Multnomah County). The County's goal is to have a 133-person contact tracing team, with culturally specific staff who are equipped to connect with people in an array of communities, as well as staff who are fluent in Spanish, Russian and Vietnamese in addition to English.
  - Multnomah County is working on increasing opportunities and lowering barriers for members of the public to get COVID-19 testing in community settings (outside the usual healthcare framework).


- In a [board meeting on June 4](#) Multnomah County Commissioners voted to approve submission of the reopening proposal to the state of Oregon. This proposal will be submitted to the state on Friday, June 5, and outlines Multnomah County's Phase 1 reopening framework. This proposal will also be posted on Multnomah County's [COVID-19 website](#).

This is a dynamic situation. Information and case counts are changing rapidly and the incident is ongoing.


### COVID-19 cases and deaths in Multnomah County and in Oregon

As of June 3, 2020, 12:01 am, there have been a total of **1,224 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Multnomah County** and 4,474 cases in Oregon. Multnomah County cases make up 27% of the state's total. The chart below shows cases over the past week (source: [Oregon Health Authority](#)).



There were **no new COVID-19 deaths in Oregon or Multnomah County** on June 4. A total of 62 people are known to have died of COVID-19 in Multnomah County since the pandemic started, and there have been 159 known COVID-19 deaths in Oregon, statewide. Multnomah County deaths make up 39% of the state's total. The chart below shows deaths over the past week (source: [Oregon Health Authority](#)).

### Race and Ethnicity Impact in Multnomah County



The charts below show **the percentage of total cases, deaths, and hospitalizations by race and ethnicity (in gray)**, as of June 3, 2020. Each chart also shows **the proportion of Multnomah County’s total population by race/ethnicity (in orange)**. Instances where the percentage of cases, deaths, and hospitalizations exceeds the proportion of Multnomah County’s total population by race/ethnicity indicate the communities that are most impacted by health inequity from COVID-19. These differences may reflect the inequitable distribution of the risks of being exposed to COVID-19 and the opportunities to access medical care and COVID-19 testing.

### Cases by race/ethnicity and population proportions


Percent of COVID-19 Cases Compared to Multnomah County Population Proportions

### Deaths by race/ethnicity and population proportions


Percent of COVID-19 Deaths Compared to Multnomah County Population Proportions

The EOC provides a framework that incorporates staff from across all County departments, as well as community volunteers and representatives from partner agencies and organizations to direct the full complement of this combined effort toward accomplishing the County’s objectives.

### EOC Section: [Operations](#)


The Operations section has several operational areas, each of which report on daily metrics. Weekly metrics are reported each Monday.

#### Resource Request Unit

The Resource Request Unit is a group of diverse subject matter experts that represent and advocate for the needs of the communities Multnomah County serves. The team allocates critical supplies and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to health and community organizations in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19. When allocating PPE, the Resource Request Unit prioritizes organizations experiencing an outbreak, organizations that perform life saving operations (hospitals, clinics, etc), and organizations that serve communities of color, people ages 65 and older, and people with underlying health conditions. These priorities are part of Multnomah County’s commitment to dedicate resources to the populations most impacted by COVID-19.

Daily Metrics: The Resource Request Unit tracks how many requests for resources it processes over a 24-hour period ending at 12 pm each day. The chart below shows the number of daily requests processed over the past week.



### Call Center

For the questions that are not answered on the [County's Frequently Asked Questions \(FAQs\) page](#), the County's Call Center serves as a safety net and ensures that everyone who calls or emails with a question receives a timely response.




EOC Section: Mass Care and Shelter ([Emergency Support Function 6](#))

Multnomah County continues to operate four Physical Distancing Shelters and one Physical Distancing Motel, with a total capacity of 440 people; as well as two Isolation Support Motels with a total capacity of 120.

Daily Metrics: The Mass Care and Shelter Unit tracks how many people are housed in Physical Distancing Shelters and Motels, and in Isolation Support Motels each day. The charts below show the number of people housed for each day of the past week.

## EOC Section: [Logistics](#)

The Logistics Section supports the response actions of all other EOC sections. Logistics focuses on procedures for activating, dispatching, distributing, allocating, tracking, and deactivating resources needed for emergency and disaster operations from government, private, or volunteer sources. For Multnomah County's COVID-19 response, important Logistics functions include coordinating the donation of supplies, delivering resources to community partners, and coordinating volunteers.

### Acquisitions

The Logistics Section requested 1 million KN95 respirators (which were recently decertified for medical use, but are still valuable as face coverings in non-medical settings) from the Oregon Health Authority. Approximately 1.2 million KN95s were delivered to Multnomah County on June 4. The County is partnering with the City of Portland's Neighborhood Emergency Team volunteers to mark the KN95s so that it is clear that they are not for medical use. After doing so, they will be distributed to community members and partner organizations. Distribution will focus on Black and Indigenous communities, and other communities of color.

### Donations Unit

Multnomah County and the City of Portland are working to match [donations and offers of service](#) with community needs. Please [fill out this form](#) so we know how you want to help. The donation and volunteer coordination team will contact you if we identify a community need that matches your offer.

### Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and other goods and services

Multnomah County and the City of Portland are seeking specific protective gear, which should be unused and in good condition:

- Home-made face covers or home-made cloth face coverings: Multnomah County's Operations team is dedicated to ensuring that these scarce resources are distributed to our Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities. Across the country, these communities are statistically more likely to suffer grave outcomes of COVID-19 and are, therefore, our donation priority. A multi-jurisdiction, multidisciplinary team is working with community organizations across the county to distribute these, and other supplies.
- Procedural masks
- Surgical masks
- N95 respirators and N95 filters
- Other respirators (P100's, PAPR's, and PAPR supplies or parts)
- Face shields
- Splash shields
- Gowns
- Hand sanitizer
- Disinfecting wipes
- Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) registered disinfectant



Resource Deliveries

Logistics provides transportation for numerous response functions, including delivering supplies to community partners. The chart below shows the number of daily trips delivering resources to community organizations, hospitals, County-run physical distancing shelters and medical motels, and emergency outdoor shelters run by the City of Portland and Multnomah County’s Joint Office of Homeless Services. The chart does not represent the quantity of supplies included in these deliveries, so a single delivery could include small or large quantities of resources.

#### Faith-Based and Community Organizations

- On June 4, the Faith-Based and Community Organizations liaison team held a webinar Responsible Reopening: Contact tracing, preventing outbreaks, and how to support your community's health. Close to 90 people attended! Deputy Unified Commander Jessica Guernsey walked attendees through the contact tracing process and how it is used as a tool for mitigating virus spread. She also spoke to the frequently shifting guidance around gathering size, touched on prevention practices and continued safety measures, spoke about what happens in the event of a localized outbreak, and answered a variety of other questions from the community.
- The fourth episode of the Partnership Centers' [Mental Health in a Time of COVID-19 Webinar Series](#) will take place Wednesday, June 9, at 9:00 am PST (12:00 pm EST). The webinar will focus on why and how mental health professionals can engage the spiritual and religious beliefs of their clients in their treatment protocols. 

# State of Oregon Updates

## Media and Announcements

- Oregon Governor Kate Brown held a [press conference June 3 to announce details of the state's framework for Phase 2 reopening](#). Counties can be approved to enter Phase 2 only if they have been in Phase 1 for at least 21 days and are succeeding in controlling the spread of the virus. Counties approved to enter Phase 2 must continue to meet Phase 1 metrics, including:
  - declining disease prevalence
  - having an adequate number of contact tracers, including people reflective of the communities they serve
  - establishing adequate testing, isolation and quarantine facilities, sufficient hospital surge capacity, and sufficient personal protective equipment supply

Counties must also meet additional prerequisites to enter Phase 2, including:

- demonstrating that they are able to trace new cases within 24 hours
- being able to identify where new cases are coming from at least 70% of the time
- not experiencing a significant increase in cases

At this writing, 29 of the 31 Oregon counties eligible to apply for Phase 2 reopening have applied to do so. On June 4, [Governor Brown approved 26 counties to move to Phase 2](#) of reopening on the following schedule:

- June 5: Benton, Curry, Douglas, Grant, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Linn, Morrow, Union, Wallowa, Wasco, and Wheeler Counties
- June 6: Baker, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Gilliam, Harney, Josephine, Malheur, Sherman, and Yamhill Counties
- June 8: Tillamook County
