Multnomah County Updates

Media and Announcements

- Tri-County Public Health Officer Dr. Jennifer Vines recommends that [people who participate in public demonstrations take precautions to help minimize the spread of COVID-19](#). *OPB*, *Willamette Week* and *KPTV* also reported this story.
- On June 4, the [Multnomah County Board of Commissioners sent an open letter to Governor Kate Brown](#). In the letter, they stated: "We are deeply concerned about morbidity and mortality from COVID-19 for older adults living at nursing homes and other long term care facilities, and we write to ask that you establish a State mandate for preventative, life-saving testing policies in these facilities."


This is a dynamic situation. Information and case counts are changing rapidly and the incident is ongoing.

COVID-19 cases and deaths in Multnomah County and in Oregon

As of June 7, 2020, 12:01 am, there have been a total of **1,286 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Multnomah County** and 4,808 cases in Oregon. Multnomah County cases make up 27% of the state's total.


[The Oregon Health Authority noted that the statewide case count reported on June 7 -- 146 confirmed and presumptive new cases -- was the highest daily count since the onset of the pandemic in Oregon.](#) They stated “The high number is tied to several factors, including more widespread testing, increased contact tracing and active monitoring of close contacts of cases. Workplace outbreaks are another source of the high number.”

There was one **new COVID-19 death in Oregon** reported on June 7, but it was not in Multnomah County. A total of 65 people are known to have died of COVID-19 in Multnomah County since the pandemic started, and there have been 164 known COVID-19 deaths in Oregon, statewide. Multnomah County deaths make up 40% of the state’s total. The chart below shows deaths over the past week (source: [Oregon Health Authority](#)).

Race and Ethnicity Impact in Multnomah County



The charts below show **the percentage of total cases, deaths, and hospitalizations by race and ethnicity (in gray)**, as of June 5, 2020. Each chart also shows **the proportion of Multnomah County’s total population by race/ethnicity (in orange)**. Instances where the percentage of cases, deaths, and hospitalizations exceeds the proportion of Multnomah County’s total population by race/ethnicity indicate the communities that are most impacted by health inequity from COVID-19. These differences may reflect the inequitable distribution of the risks of being exposed to COVID-19 and the opportunities to access medical care and COVID-19 testing.

Cases by race/ethnicity and population proportions


Percent of COVID-19 Cases Compared to Multnomah County Population Proportions

Deaths by race/ethnicity and population proportions


Percent of COVID-19 Deaths Compared to Multnomah County Population Proportions


EOC Section: [Operations](#)

The Operations section has several operational areas, each of which report on daily metrics. Weekly metrics are reported each Monday.

Resource Request Unit

The Resource Request Unit is a group of diverse subject matter experts that represent and advocate for the needs of the communities Multnomah County serves. The team allocates critical supplies and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to health and community organizations in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19. When allocating PPE, the Resource Request Unit prioritizes organizations experiencing an outbreak, organizations that perform life saving operations (hospitals, clinics, etc), and organizations that serve communities of color, people ages 65 and older, and people with underlying health conditions. These priorities are part of Multnomah County's commitment to dedicate resources to the populations most impacted by COVID-19.

Daily Metrics: The Resource Request Unit tracks how many requests for resources it processes over a 24-hour period ending at 12 pm each day. The chart below shows the number of daily requests processed over the past week.




Call Center

For the questions that are not answered on the [County's Frequently Asked Questions \(FAQs\) page](#), the County's Call Center serves as a safety net and ensures that everyone who calls or emails with a question receives a timely response.

open Monday through Friday). The chart below shows the number of calls and emails per day for the past five business days, broken down by three topic categories.





EOC Section: Mass Care and Shelter ([Emergency Support Function 6](#))


Multnomah County continues to operate four Physical Distancing Shelters and one Physical Distancing Motel, with a total capacity of 440 people; as well as two Isolation Support Motels with a total capacity of 120.

Daily Metrics: The Mass Care and Shelter Unit tracks how many people are housed in Physical Distancing Shelters and Motels, and in Isolation Support Motels each day. The charts below show the number of people housed for each day of the past week.

EOC Section: [Logistics](#)

The Logistics Section supports the response actions of all other EOC sections. Logistics focuses on procedures for activating, dispatching, distributing, allocating, tracking, and deactivating resources needed for emergency and disaster operations from government, private, or volunteer sources. For Multnomah County's COVID-19 response, important Logistics functions include coordinating the donation of supplies, delivering resources to community partners, and coordinating volunteers.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and other goods and services

Multnomah County and the City of Portland are seeking specific protective gear, which should be unused and in good condition:

- Home-made face covers or home-made cloth face coverings: Multnomah County's Operations team is dedicated to ensuring that these scarce resources are distributed to our Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities. Across the country, these communities are statistically more likely to suffer grave outcomes of COVID-19 and are, therefore, our donation priority. A multi-jurisdiction, multidisciplinary team is working with community organizations across the county to distribute these, and other supplies.

- Surgical masks
- N95 respirators and N95 filters
- Other respirators (P100's, PAPR's, and PAPR supplies or parts)
- Face shields
- Splash shields
- Gowns
- Hand sanitizer
- Disinfecting wipes
- Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) registered disinfectant



Resource Deliveries

Logistics provides transportation for numerous response functions, including delivering supplies to community partners. The chart below shows the number of daily trips delivering resources to community organizations, hospitals, County-run physical distancing shelters and medical motels, and emergency outdoor shelters run by

Business

- Starting this week, small and midsize businesses will be able to start applying for emergency loans through the Federal Reserve. The \$600 billion [Main Street Lending Program](#) is part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act.
- The Small Business Legal Clinic has assembled [legal resources](#) for pandemic-related issues including video presentations and slides, FAQs, attorney one-on-one meetings based on income (Lower-income

clients can meet with an attorney to discuss specific issues) and an [arts and business legal information portal](#).

- The Portland Water Bureau and the Portland Bureau of Environmental Services have allocated \$1 million to provide financial support to Portland's small businesses. 
News and announcements

- On June 5, Clark County was approved to enter Washington's [Phase 2](#) reopening. Phase 2 eases restrictions on local gatherings and allows some businesses to reopen, including: hair and nail salons, barberships, real estate, pet grooming, and new construction. Retail stores can open for in-store purchases, and restaurants can resume dine-in services with limits on the number of diners. - As of June 7, Oregon Governor Kate Brown has [approved 29 Oregon counties to move to Phase 2 of reopening](#). For more information about reopening requirements and the [reopening status of Oregon counties](#), visit the [Governor's reopening website](#)
- State epidemiologist Dean Sidelinger was interviewed in a June 3 [Oregonian/OregonLive](#) story about reopening. He said that Oregon will remain in Phase 2 through the summer and into the fall, and that the state will only move beyond Phase 2 when there are preventive measures and an effective vaccine in place.
- On June 7, [OPB reported](#) that some local health and community organizations have raised "charges of racial bias in the design of an Oregon study of COVID-19's spread." The study is Oregon Health

Science University’s [Key to Oregon](#) study, which aims to “test, track and map the COVID-19 symptoms, and new infections, of up to 100,000 Oregonians in real time.”

*Every hospital in Oregon is asked to submit data twice daily to Oregon’s Hospital Capacity Web System (HOSCAP). Data are based on the most recent report from the hospitals, available as of 9:00am. Hospital staff are asked to enter bed capacity information, by type, as well as the number of patients with suspected or confirmed COVID-19 illness who are currently hospitalized at the time of data entry. These data may conflict with hospitalization status in Orpheus due to case reporting and investigation lags and temporary discrepancies in case classification.
