


MULTNOMAH COUNTY JUSTICE REINVESTMENT PROGRAM

HB3194 DATA WORKGROUP

PROCESS MEASURES FROM JULY 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2020



Data for the last Quarter (July 1 – Sept. 30, 2020) were significantly influenced by external factors:

- Covid19 restrictions and closures beginning on March 16, 2020 through the present time.
- Downtown street demonstrations beginning on May 29, 2020 through November 2020.
- Interrupted case processing timelines in order to meet social distancing guidelines:
 - Arraignment hearings for out-of-custody defendants are being postponed, which is increasing failure to appear rates and delaying court data tracking systems.
 - o County Jail has restricted non-MCSO personnel from entering for face-to-face meetings.
 - o Risk assessment interviews are occurring virtually, via telephone or video.
 - o JSCs are not being scheduled at arraignment on indictment.
 - o The offices of public defenders have been closed to the public, including defendants.
 - Many trials have been postponed while physical distance accommodations are put in place and courtroom spaces are reconfigured.
 - Time to adjudication has increased: Level 3 court restrictions allowed only in-custody cases to be resolved. Current Level 2 court restrictions (beginning June 22, 2020) allow resolution for out-of-custody cases.


Reduced volume of MCJRP cases filed:

- Law Enforcement is investigating fewer criminal incidents both to decrease the spread of covid19 and to maintain order at demonstrations; therefore, fewer cases are being referred to MCDA.
- MCDA is issuing fewer court cases.
- Cases proceeding to indictment have been affected, although for a multitude of reasons beyond the community environment.
- Simultaneously, a growing backlog of undisposed cases associated with mounting apprehension of practitioners about the impending tsunami of cases that will flood the system once the pandemic restrictions are lifted.

Changes in Community Supervision:

- POs are restricted from having in-person office visits with probationers; fewer potential violations may be observed and addressed.
- POs have increased discretion to use administrative sanctions rather than request a
 Probation Violation (PV) hearing in front of the sentencing judge.
- There are fewer PV hearings resulting in fewer revocations.

MCJRP Case Flow



- 1. The majority of MCJRP Eligible cases commence following an arrest (80%); other MCJRP Eligible cases are initiated at arraignment on indictment warrants (20%).
- 2. MCJRP cases in process include cases involved in pre-adjuciation hearings as well as 457 cases with Active Warrants (Either for FTAs or on Warrants on Indictments) and 29 cases in "Pending Fitness to Proceed" status.
- 3. One assessment per individual; individuals may have mulitiple MCJRP cases. Does not include individuals whose cases were dismissed post-arraignment.
- This symbol denotes numbers that represent people, not cases.
- 4. Includes all cases dismissed post-arraignment. The majority of cases in the "Dismissed" category are the result of cases that were dismissed as part of a plea agreement in the global resolution of multiple cases. Other dismissed cases were initially diverted and later dismissed, were cases with juvenile defendants that were dismissed in favor of a juvenile case resolution, or were cases that were dismissed without prejudice and will likely be reinstated in the future. All subsequent numbers in this report include only those cases that have been convicted and sentenced.
- 5. Sentenced cases are grouped into categories according to the judicial order at <u>initial</u> sentence when the case is convicted. These numbers represent outcomes for the 1st sentence only.
- 6. Future reports will include further distribution breakdowns for these Non-MCJRP sentence categories.
- 7. The use of Historical Reports as a substitute for Assessments was discontinued on 7/24/2020. The practice was changed to Status Reports.
