SUN Community Schools (SUN CS) provide schoolbased educational support, recreation, social and health services, and parent engagement to students and their families. In 11-12, there were 65 community school sites located at 24 elementary schools, 15 middle schools, 8 high schools, and 18 schools serving grades K to 8 across Multnomah County.

- Most of the students ( $84 \%$ were between 7 and 14 years: the average age was 10.9 years
- More females ( $52 \%$ ) than males ( $48 \%$ ) participated in services

[^0]- $71 \%$ of the children were of color or from a culturally-specific community compared to the Districts' average of $46 \%$
- $77 \%$ of the students qualified for Free and Reduced Lunch compared to the Districts' average of $56 \%$
- $24 \%$ of students were English Language Learners compared to the Districts' average of $13 \% 33 \%$ of these students were at the beginning or early intermediate level of language acquisition (as measured by the English Language Proficiency Assessment)
- $33 \%$ of the students' families spoke a language other than English at home; In all, 61 non-English languages were spoken
- $14 \%$ were classified as special education students
- $62 \%$ of students did not meet the reading benchmark during the previous school year; $72 \%$ did not meet the math benchmark
- $63 \%$ of $9^{\text {th }}$ grade students ( $\mathrm{N}=170$ ) were classified by the districts as academic priority because of $8^{\text {th }}$ grade performance (attendance $<=91 \%$ not meeting two or more of the state testing benchmarks or failing one or more core courses)

## Attendance ${ }^{4}$

- Average daily attendance (ADA) for SUNCS students served was $95.0 \%$ compared to the district average of 93.3\%
- This year's ADA also compared well to the student's previous year attendance rate of 88.8\%
- $82 \%$ of SUNCS students met or exceeded Oregon's attendance benchmark of $92 \%$
- $12 \%$ of SUNCS students were absent on more than $10 \%$ of school days compared to the districts average of $22 \%$


## High School Students

- Earned an average of 7.83 credit hours ( $\mathrm{N}=774$ )
- $75 \%$ earned the 6.0 credits expected for the school year
- $95 \%$ of $9^{\text {th }}, 10^{\text {th }}$, and $11^{\text {th }}$ grade students returned for their next year of high school
${ }^{4}$ Attendance was available on 7,289 students
- $74 \%$ of seniors ${ }^{5}$ graduated; $90 \%$ either graduated or returned for a $5^{\text {th }}$ year


## Teacher Surveys ${ }^{6}$

- Teachers reported that $89 \%$ of SUNCS students needed to improve in at least one area
- For students who needed improvement, teachers reported that overall, $85 \%$ improved in at least one area


## Student Surveys ${ }^{7}$

- $90 \%$ of $4^{\text {th }}$ to $12^{\text {th }}$ grade students report knowing at least one adult at school who cares about him/ her
- $86 \%$ of students report that at SUN they learn school subjects in fun ways


## Summary and Conclusions

1. SUN Community Schools are doing a good job of serving at-risk students through targeting recruitment and providing culturally-appropriate and specific services. SUN serves a high percent of students eligible for free and reduced lunch, students of color and English language learners. The male-to-female ratio is equitable and services are spread across the highest need areas of the county.
2. Student academic outcomes were quite positive as measured by OAKS reading and math tests. SUN providers met system targets for improvement: greater than $75 \%$ of students showed improvement in math and reading scores. In the last two years, benchmark cutoffs have been made more rigorous to align with national standards. This means that overall, fewer Oregon students met the state benchmarks. At SUN, almost two thirds ( $63 \%$ ) of SUN students were meeting their benchmarks or on track to meet their benchmark within 3 years in reading. In math, $58 \%$ were on track. Encouragingly, the average differences in reading and math tests from last year to this year were higher than expected indicating that SUN students are making progress toward meeting benchmarks.
3. Students attended an average of $95.0 \%$ of required school days which is well above the state benchmark of $92 \%$ and higher than their

attendance last year. Significantly fewer students ( $12 \%$ ) are classified as chronically absent due to missing more than $10 \%$ of required school days compared to the districts average of $22 \%$ Also student attendance from 2011-12 was substantially higher than their 2010-11 attendance.
4. High school students at SUN made outstanding progress in earning credits, averaging 7.83 credits during the school year. Of $12^{\text {th }}$ graders participating in SUNCS, $74 \%$ graduated.
5. SUNCS high school students were highly likely to re-enter school in the fall: $94 \%$ of $9^{\text {th }}$ to $11^{\text {th }}$ grade students returned and well over half $\left(62 \%\right.$ of the $12^{\text {th }}$ grade students that didn't earn enough credits to graduate, returned for a $5^{\text {th }}$ year of high school.
