Lead Agency: Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO)

Service Area & Target Groups/Focus

Children, adults and families who are homeless, living in poverty and/or at risk of academic failure – primarily from school neighborhood, but services are open to anyone.

School Population: 457 students; Grades K-8; 100% Eligible for Free Meals; 70% Students of Color (African American 18%, American Indian/AK Native 2%, Asian 21%, Hispanic 16%, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander 1%, Multiple Race 12%, White 30%)

Evaluation

Outputs

309 youth served

58% students of color 46% identified as being "at risk of academic failure" 100% qualified for free and reduced lunch

24 adults served

1630 people served in non-enrollment events (Family educational nights, cultural fairs, etc.)

Outcomes

83% of students increased benchmark scores in Reading * 97% of students increased benchmark scores in Math * Average daily attendance of SUN CS students was 90%

SUN Spotlight

IRCO's AmeriCorps academic engagement coordinator worked with our middle school team to recruit and train junior staff and junior volunteers. For their first event, 13 middle school students assisted more than 30 adult volunteers in running the school's 5th annual Harvest Festival. Students welcomed families and assisted with directions and information, helped kids decorate pumpkins and assisted students playing games. Parents of younger students complimented them on their skills and attitudes, a turnaround from previous community views of middle school students.
