


People placed into permanent housing, Q3



Total people newly placed into permanent housing was 10% higher than the third quarter of FY 2016, resulting in 338 additional placements compared to the previous year

The 3,535 people placed represents more than 1,900 households. Beyond those newly placed, around 4,800 additional people received continued permanent housing support during FY 2017 Q3.

Third-quarter placement percentages by race were similar to FY 2016





New prevention clients




Total prevention clients



More people were newly prevented from becoming homeless during the third quarter of this year, compared to the previous year

An additional 500 new prevention clients resulted in 15 percent more new prevention clients than the third quarter of the prior year. Including those newly assisted, around 4,300 people received ongoing assistance to prevent homelessness.

Third-quarter prevention percentages by race and ethnicity were similar to FY 2016

We continue to see a slight decline in those who identify as Hispanic/Latino, compared to FY 2016.



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Retention of permanent housing



Permanent housing retention rates similar to prior year

Among those assisted with permanent housing placement, most remain successfully housed six and 12 months following end of assistance.


People served in emergency shelter



Total number of people served in emergency shelter has increased significantly compared to prior year

The increase of almost 1,500 people served is a 29 percent increase over the third quarter of the prior year. A large expansion of shelter beds has allowed more people to be served by emergency shelter.

Third-quarter percentages of people served in emergency shelter by race were similar to percentages in FY 2016

Percentages add up to more than 100 due to duplication for the Hispanic/Latino category
