By increasing access to safe and timely mental health services, the program aims to have the following impacts on participants:

- Reduce engagement with gun and group violence
- Connect youth to mental health services to improve mental wellness
- Improve family dynamics for healthy and meaningful connections
- Increase use of healthy coping mechanisms to alleviate trauma symptoms
- Increase awareness of cyclical trauma impacts on the community
- Increase pro-social community engagement
- Improve academic achievement

Working With Trusted Partners

A unique and impactful facet of GVIF-BHRT's structure and outreach is the establishment and use of Credible Messengers to reach impacted members of the community through trusted, authentic, and trauma-informed stakeholders.

- Credible Messengers work collaboratively with Mental Health Consultants to establish and implement effective program tactics, including reducing barriers to services
- 57% of the referrals made to the program in 2022 have come directly from Credible Messengers









Emerging Themes

Throughout the first year of operation, the program has been reviewing participant needs, the nature of incidents, and feedback from participants, partners, and staff to identify core themes:

- Generation involvement: unpacking a client's involvement in gun violence opens a complex web of community & family historical ties
- Exposure to violence: video recordings have increased the exposure of viewing traumatic events, creating a normalizing and/or numbing effect on younger generations who are frequent users of social media
- Increase in high capacity and fully automatic guns: Before the pandemic, guns being used typically held 10-15 bullets, but today, we are seeing guns that hold 30-50 bullets





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
