Adult

Unique JIIs on supervision who had charges with key words that include "firearm" in the ORS description of charges

- FY22: 486 (6.45%)
- FY23: 494 (6.96%)
- FY24: 546 (7.73%)
- FY25 (to date): 380 (5.46%)

Juvenile

Unique youth who had referrals to JSD involving firearms charges based on ORS description

- FY22: 60 (11.45%)
- FY23: 87 (19.82%)
- FY24: 73 (12.41%)
- FY25 (to date): 32 (11.47%)

DCJ gun-involved cases

Represented as a percentage of total JIIs on DCJ supervision or referred



Key Initiative Highlight:



- H.E.A.T. Habilitation Empowerment Accountability Therapy
 - Culturally responsive program for African American justice involved youth and adults supporting education, vocational training, access to resources while strengthening family relationships and positive mentorship.
 - Focused on gun violence prevention with high risk youth and adults.
 - Launched in 2020 in the Adult Services Division & in 2024 in the Juvenile Services Division, now with in-house trainers.
- Nearly 100 H.E.A.T. participants through DCJ programming:
 - Adult Services: 75 participants since 2020 virtual & in-person
 - Juvenile Services: Over 20 participants since 2024
 - Active efforts to expand





Key Initiative Highlight:

Ceasefire call-in sessions

- Partnership with Portland and Gresham, Police and Ceasefire teams
- Initiated in 2024 as a strategy to decrease community violence, particularly gun-related violence
- "Call-ins" engage adults on supervision with DCJ's gang unit, with influence in the community
- Majority of individuals on this caseload are high and medium risk levels ~ 3 - 5 year supervision
- 6 call-in sessions held to date with representatives from individual gang units including the Bloods, Crips, Hoover and 18th Street Gang, with over 30 gang members
- Participants in call-in sessions are invited to participate in the H.E.A.T program, with 2 recent graduates participating





Key Initiative Highlight:

CHI Probation

- Launched in 2011 as a partnership between Multnomah
 County and community providers: Latino Network, Portland
 Opportunities Industrialization Center (POIC)
- Focus on youth on probation with recent involvement with high-risk activities and behaviors such as violence/gun violence, gangs.
- Culturally specific support and services are tailored to meet both the needs of individual youth and family needs.
- Works with the entire family system.
- FY 2023 FY 2024 data: 110 youth served 94 JSD youth &
 16 community youth
 - 89% Male, 11% Female
 - 47% Black, 30% Latino(a), 15% Caucasian, 8%
 Unrecorded
 - 77% remained law abiding while in CHI
 - 77% received no new referrals within the 1-year recidivism window
