Funds

The two separate funding streams in the JCP aim to meet the following needs:

- > **JCP Basic Funds** support basic infrastructure for juvenile justice services. The target population is youth ages 10-17 and the goal is to prevent further offenses and reduce recidivism.
- > **JCP Diversion Funds** help divert the highest risk youth from placement in OYA custody. The target population is youth ages 12-19 and the goal is to prevent escalation to OYA close custody placement.

Key Program Outcomes

- **Juvenile Detention:** Juvenile Detention Services protects the community by holding youth in custody who have been determined to be a serious risk to public safety and are awaiting a hearing and/or are at high risk to not appear for court.
 - FY2026 output: Number of nights spent in detention at 23
 - FY2026 outcome: 330 days without incidents involving physical aggression in detention
 - FY2026 outcome: 85% of youth report not fearing for their safety while in detention
- **Juvenile Probation:** Juvenile Court Counselors (JCCs) develop probation case plans, hold young people accountable to court ordered conditions, and address victim restitution and restoration.
 - FY2026 output: 425 youth served on probation
 - FY2026 outcome: 80% of youth do not receive a new adjudication within 1-year



Additional State Funding:

Gang Transition Services

- **Juvenile Probation:** Specialized interventions include DCJ partnership with the Community Healing Initiative (CHI), which provides culturally specific, holistic, family-based, wraparound services to medium and high risk Black, African American, African immigrant/refugee, and Latino/a youth, and their families, intended to reduce youth and gang violence in Multnomah County by addressing its root causes.
 - FY2026 output: 60 youth referred by JSD to CHI
 - FY2026 outcome: 75% of CHI youth do not receive a new adjudication after entering services
- **Shelter Care:** Shelter care services offer at-risk youth who would otherwise be placed in costly detention beds an opportunity to remain safely in the community under a high level of structure and supervision by professional shelter care providers.
 - FY2026 output: 40 youth intakes
 - FY2026 outcome: 80% of youth do not leave the shelter during their placement
- **Community Monitoring Program:** provides supervision and support while reserving the use of detention bed spaces for youth who pose a significant and immediate threat to public safety.
 - FY2026 output: 180 youth referrals
 - FY2026 outcome: 98% of youth attend their court appearances
 - FY2026 outcome: 80% of youth complete program
