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


Online open house and survey closes July 31st. Don't miss your chance to weigh in!

There are only two weeks left to give your input on the future look of the new Burnside Bridge. More than 17,000 people have already weighed in during this important project milestone. Be a part of this historic moment!

After many years of planning, the Earthquake Ready Burnside Bridge project is now in the Design Phase where architects, engineers and contractors are working through key design decisions. The first decision milestone is to determine the bridge type for the east approach. After analysis on a broad range of options, the County refined the list to a range of bridge types for public consideration and input.

After the comment period closes on July 31st, community feedback will be shared with the project's CODAG) to help inform its recommendation on a bridge type. The project team will present the CDAG's recommendation and community input to the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners, who will ultimately make the final decision on the bridge type later this summer.

When the Burnside Bridge was built in 1926, it included rail tracks to support an intercity streetcar system. The tracks are still embedded in the bridge! The new Burnside Bridge will be designed to support a future streetcar line, a full circle moment for this bridge.
