




Organizational Chart






Budget by Fund - \$39.1M (Expenditures)






FTE by Fund






Budget by Funding Source - \$9.0M (Revenues)






Budget by Category - \$39.1M

Continued Racial & Ethnic Disparity Work & Policy



Addressing the disparities in the criminal justice system will continue to take intentionality, time, resources and participation from all parties.



<u>W. Haywood Burns Institute</u> report concluded that in Multnomah County, the likelihood of receiving a prison sentence for people of color decreased substantially from 2014 to 2019.



Contributing to the reduction in disparities are the **post-sentence** diversion programs like the Multnomah County Justice Reinvestment Program (MCJRP), START Court, Mental Health Court and Veterans Court.



W. Haywood Burn Institute report confirms the way we issue cases for prosecution is at or near equity across all demographics.



We intentionally created new policies and collaborated with partners to implement new and innovative diversion programs to reduce disparities for certain crimes.

Data shows that the LEAD® program contributes to reducing disparity within the criminal justice system.



Our *Equity, Dignity and Opportunity Council* continues to host mandatory trainings on disparity and bias.



State Impacts

- U.S. Supreme Court decision in Ramos Unanimous Juries
- Juvenile Ballot Measure 11 Legislative Changes (SB1008)
- Grand Jury Recordation Unfunded in FY21; est. costs \$576K / 2.00FTE*

Local Impacts

- Bodyworn Cameras Gresham / 15012A Funded in FY21; \$235K / 1.50FTE
- Bodyworn Cameras Gresham Expansion Unfunded in FY21; est. costs \$767K / 4.50FTE*

COVID-19 Impacts: Operational



Reduced public access to minimize risk of exposure



Maintained around-theclock Sexual Assault Victim Advocate (SAVA) Program by phone



Established dedicated external phones for public access to reception staff



Increased public messaging about court operations and services



Reduced footprint of in-office staff to about 25%; remaining 75% staff teleworked on rotation



Produced COVID-19 specific resources for DV, child abuse, sexual assaults and bias crimes



Continued to ensure victims' rights were enforced; set up e-court appearances & attended actual appearances



Provided staff with daily then weekly situational updates



COVID-19 Impacts: Policy Issues



Supporting law enforcement to increase the use of cite in lieu authority*



Supporting video conferencing and teleconferencing for court appearances & grand jury



Supporting early release for individuals serving a jail sentence and supporting pretrial release and motions of release



Policy on charging decisions to be reviewed for certain misdemeanor & felony crimes



Supporting and encouraging expedited pretrial resolutions



Will need to address statute of limitation and Constitutional speedy trial issues

Other Revenue Impacts

- FY20 General Fund Revenue
 - April Discovery Revenue decrease 60%
 - FY20 projection = \$50,000 decrease to \$320,000
- FY21 General Fund Revenue
 - Proposed Budget = \$370,000 (<u>Not</u> updated for COVID)
