Budget Approach

 Core services held harmless: protecting and maintaining core health department services

"We provide services that people do not get to choose, and we want to be who they would choose if there were a choice"



Budget Approach

- Maintain the 24/7 services provided by the Division
 - Meet Medical Examiner office capacity needs
 - Maintain the Emergency Medical Services day to day Administration, and Medical Direction
 - Meet the needs and requirements for local Public Health Emergency Preparedness
 - Addressing Health Officer workload
- Deliver high quality services that meet the demands of the communities these programs serve




Budget Approach

- Equity considerations are integrated throughout Health Officer
 Division Work implicitly and explicitly:
 - Implicitly in the populations we serve most
 - Explicitly in established internal processes:
 - Indigent death and remains services
 - Monitoring for disproportionate impacts of disease/injury/death in all surveillance
 - Connecting frequent 911 callers to needed services by Tri-County 911 social workers
 - Buprenorphine pilot for those most vulnerable at their time of greatest need

Health Officer: Significant Program Changes

- Medical Examiner's Office: 2.00 FTE, \$300,000 for Medical Death Investigators to meet increased workload (74% increase in cases requiring in-person investigation from 2019-2022, and another 13% increase from 2022-2023)
- Medical Examiner on call position: \$150,000 to ensure County medical examiner available to sign death certificates (ORS 146)
- Ambulance Service Plan (ASP) Revision procurement process: \$756,768 for an external contractor to perform ASP assessment, recommend revisions, & some associated internal expenses.



Oregon Legislature - Short Session Updates

- HB 4081 EMS Modernization
 - Signed March 2024, effective June 2024
 - Reorganizes state EMS advisory committees tasked with:
 - Working on time-critical EMS responses
 - Developing a fully coordinated, integrated approach to the treatment of time-sensitive medical emergencies.



State/Federal Impacts or Other Policy Issues

- ORS 146: Mandates that a County medical examiner sign death certificates. The State Medical Examiner's Office mandated changes in July of 2023.
- Post-90 Day Fentanyl Emergency Declaration: Advising and consulting on numerous projects and pilots including:
 - Paramedic buprenorphine pilot with Portland Fire & Rescue
 - Overdose data dashboards and visualization
