- Advance equity by centering race, ability, gender identity, socioeconomic status, and other historically marginalized identities
- Decrease the number of houseless community members and address the housing crisis
- Strengthen and promote emergency preparedness
- Improve access to behavioral health services (mental health, addiction, rehabilitation services)
- Mitigate impacts of climate change by reducing emissions and strengthening resilience to extreme climate events



Program Offer Recommendations

- #10012D Countywide Severe Weather Shelter SHS Operating, \$2,300,000
- This directly tackles the priority of strengthening emergency preparedness by providing shelter to houseless community members during severe weather events.

#10017C ADA Digital Accessibility Operating, \$366,000

 By improving digital accessibility, this program promotes equity for people with disabilities, which can indirectly support access to information on housing, emergency preparedness, health services, and climate action.

#10010C Community Budget Advisory Committee Stipends Operating, \$42,000

 By providing stipends to CBAC members, particularly those from historically marginalized communities, this program directly advances equity.

- Host the Charter Review Committee (as needed)



Operating Budget by Category - \$714,150





Community Engagement Guidelines

- •The Values: Articulate the unique individual in community involvement. As we work in the public sphere values assure community members that, in all deliberations, we will utilize these values.
- •The Beliefs: These are thoughtful community centered approaches that OCI recommends for an authentic and credible community involvement system.
- •The Theory of Involvement: The how of bringing community members and partners into dialog with elected officials and agency staff. This is the foundation that helps design the transparent processes, safe spaces, and the valued and meaningful interactions everyone wants.



Standards for Healthy Engagement

A common set of criteria for managing groups; coalesced from community involvement practice based on research of cities and county governments across the U.S. Each section contains basic information, strategic questions and the documents that support an inclusive and comprehensive approach to community involvement.

- Types of involvement and definitions clarify which groups are best suited to the effort.
- Basic requirements for all groups include; bylaws, public meeting notices etc.
- Assistance in planning for and managing, over 50 different examples, samples, and tools to assist staff.
- Levels of community involvement, adapted from IAP2, help everyone to understand how their contributions will be utilized.

Community Involvement Committee (CIC)

CIC serves as Multnomah County's advisory body on community engagement and involvement by:

- Identifying community needs, concerns and opportunities regarding community involvement in county-decision making, and providing information.
- Developing and evaluating community outreach and input plans, and providing recommendations for community members to be involved in input processes.
- Developing countywide community involvement best practices, and advice on reducing barriers to civic participation and engagement.
- Assisting in facilitating communication between county officials, the Board of County Commissioners and the community by informing the community of involvement and input opportunities

Moving Forward & One-Time-Only

#10010B - OCI Policy & Training Coordinator, \$132,500

Year 2 of our P&T Programs which will focus on developing a core curriculum (guidelines & standards) and create training process for staff and volunteers.

#10010C - CBAC Stipends, \$42,000

Funding for the 10 Department CBACs to provide volunteer appreciation for their members.

#10010D - Civic Engagement Leadership Training, \$130,000

Funding to support up to 6 Community Organization who are doing Civic Engagement & Leadership Training. Partners to support recruitment for advisory bodies and teach Engagement Curriculum.
