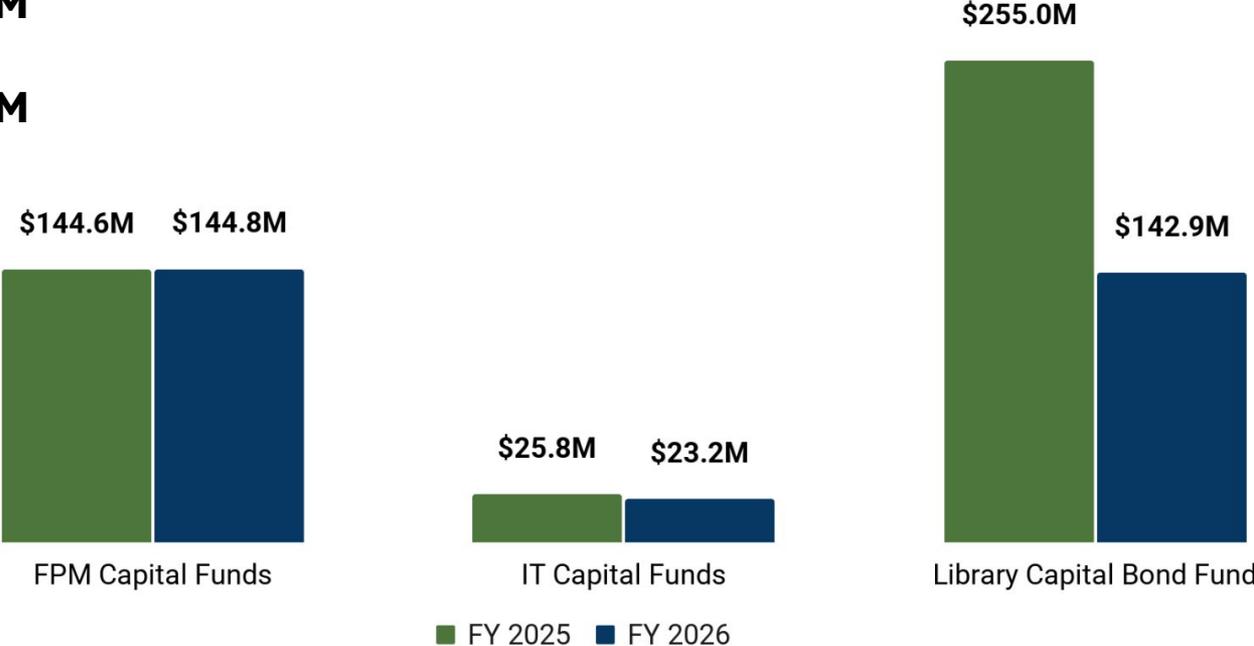

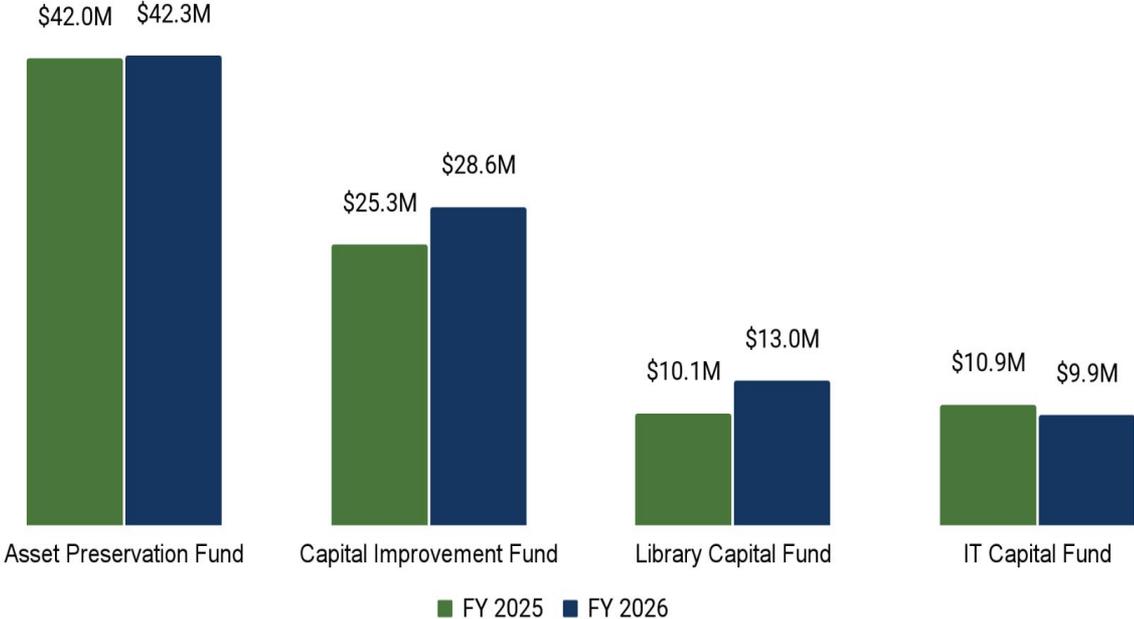


Total DCA Routine Capital Funds FY 2025 and FY 2026

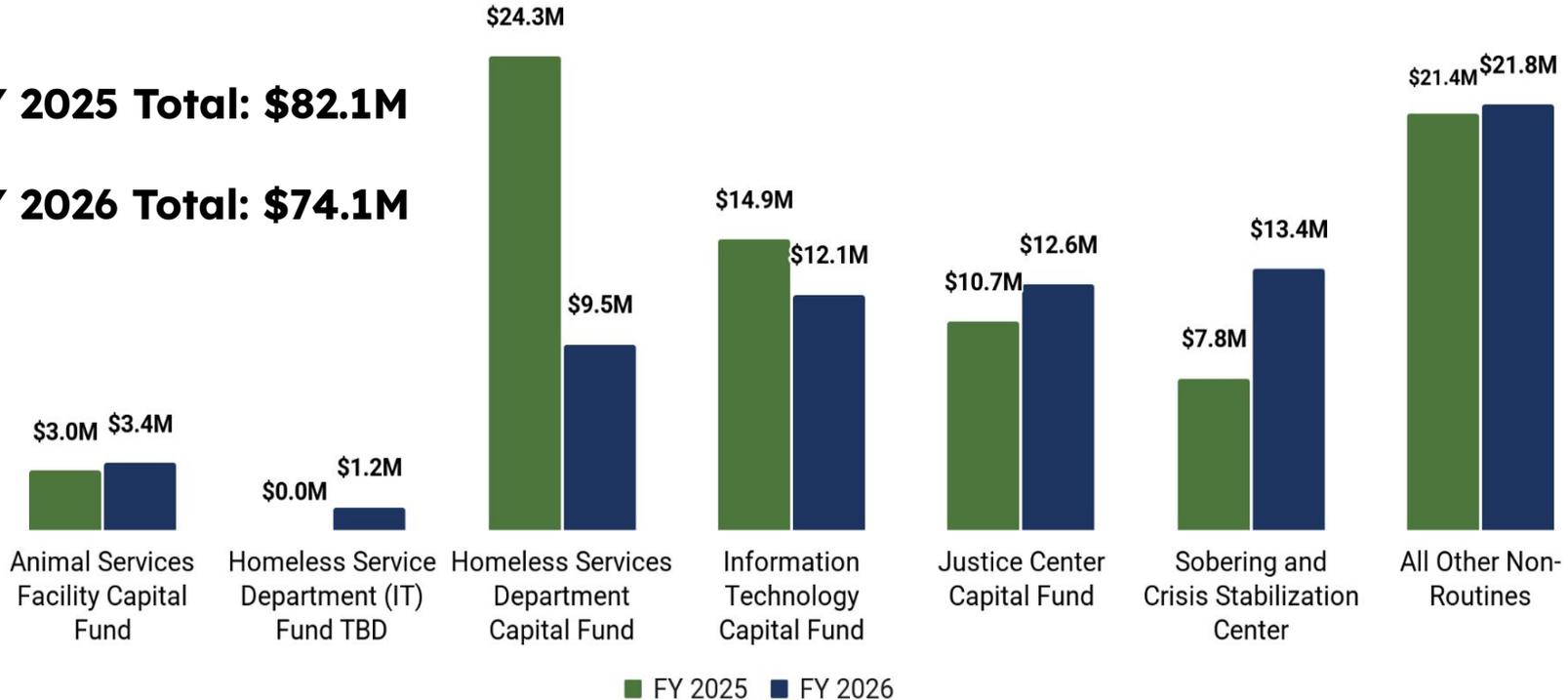


Total DCA Non-Routine Capital Funds FY 2025 and FY 2026

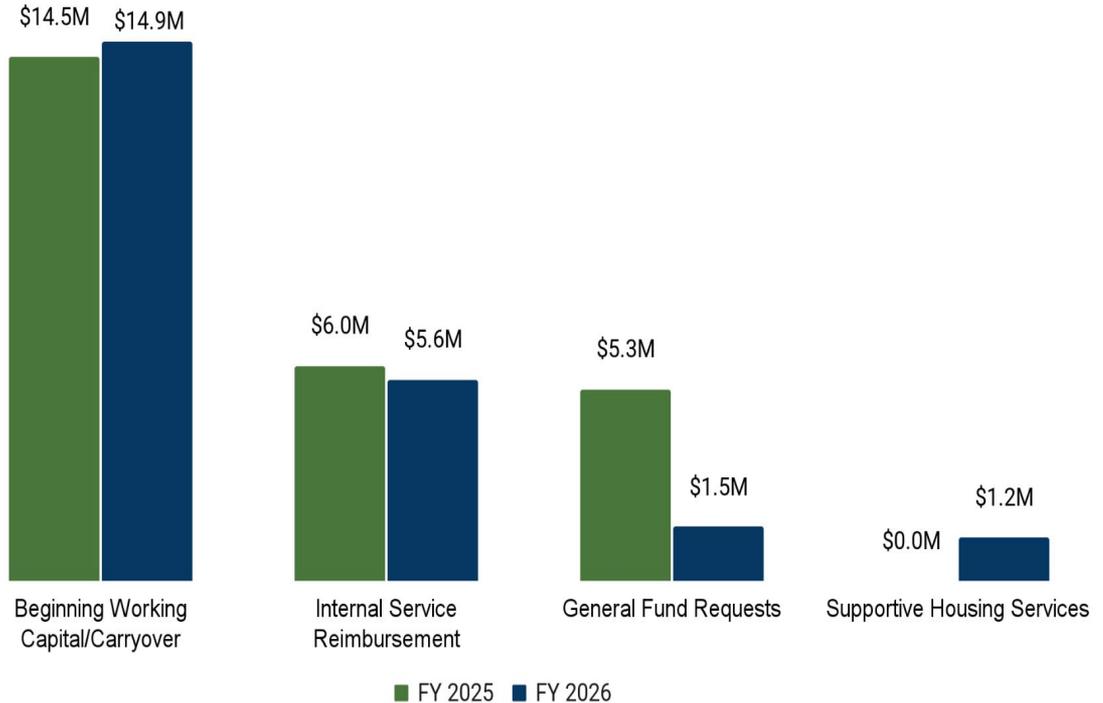

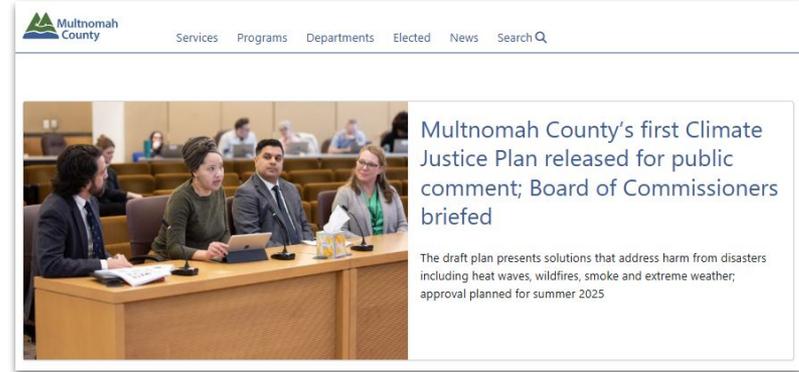

- Project Kick-Off January 2026
- Implementation expected to take 12-18 months

78301 IT Innovation & Investment Projects - TIP



- **The Technology Improvement Program (TIP) is unique in local government!** TIP is part of our Enterprise Architecture program.
- TIP was chartered to identify and address Risks from Obsolescent Technology (ROT) within the County's technology ecosystem in 2016.
- Risks include: security, out of date user functionality, end-of-life, etc.
- TIP has been funded with a variety of funding sources since it was created, primarily OTO. As noted, the current balance is about \$1.9 million.
- A stable funding source is needed.
- A Technology Fitness Assessment assesses County applications to determine areas with the greatest risk. The 2025 assessment identified 34 applications, out of 763, needing immediate updates or elimination.
- Of the 34: 10 have open projects, 3 have OTO funding, 6 will be eliminated, and 13 in Health, DCHS, and DCJ will be addressed with existing TIP funds. Two need a funding source in future years.

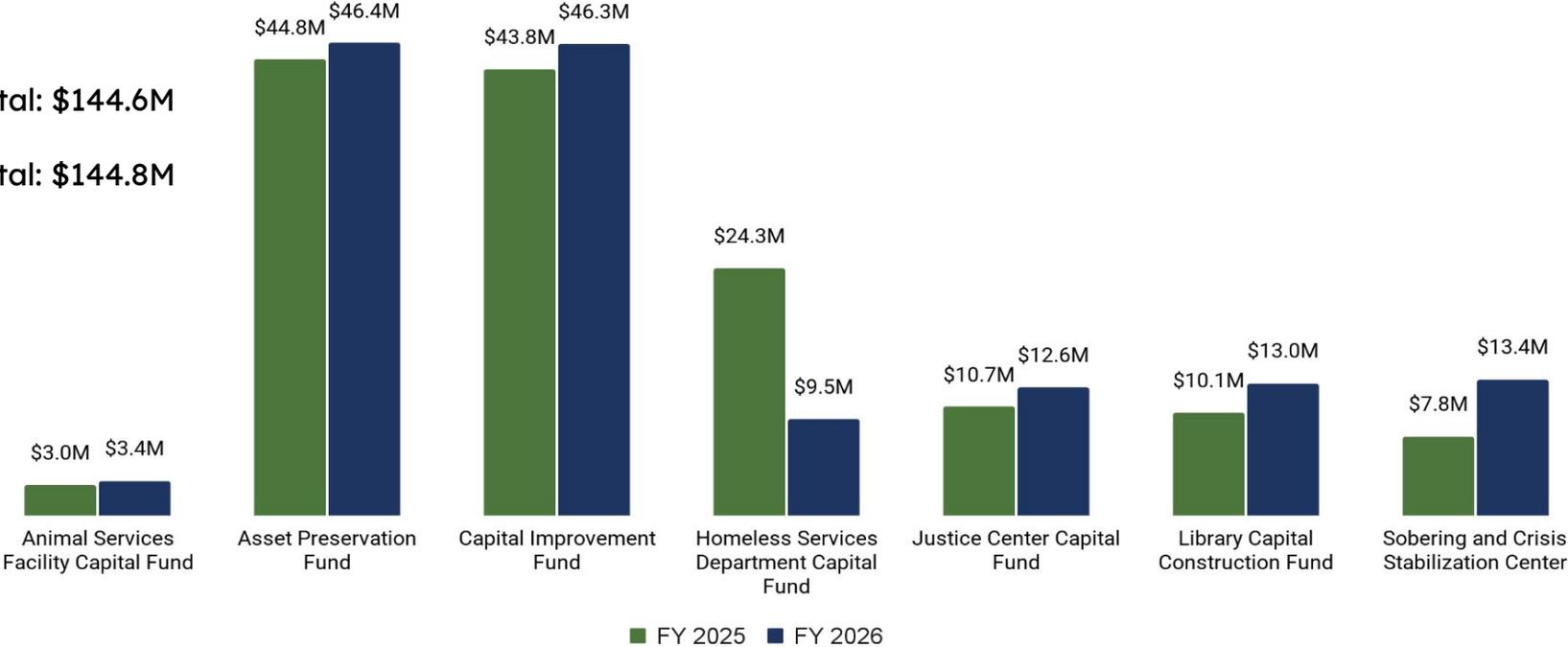

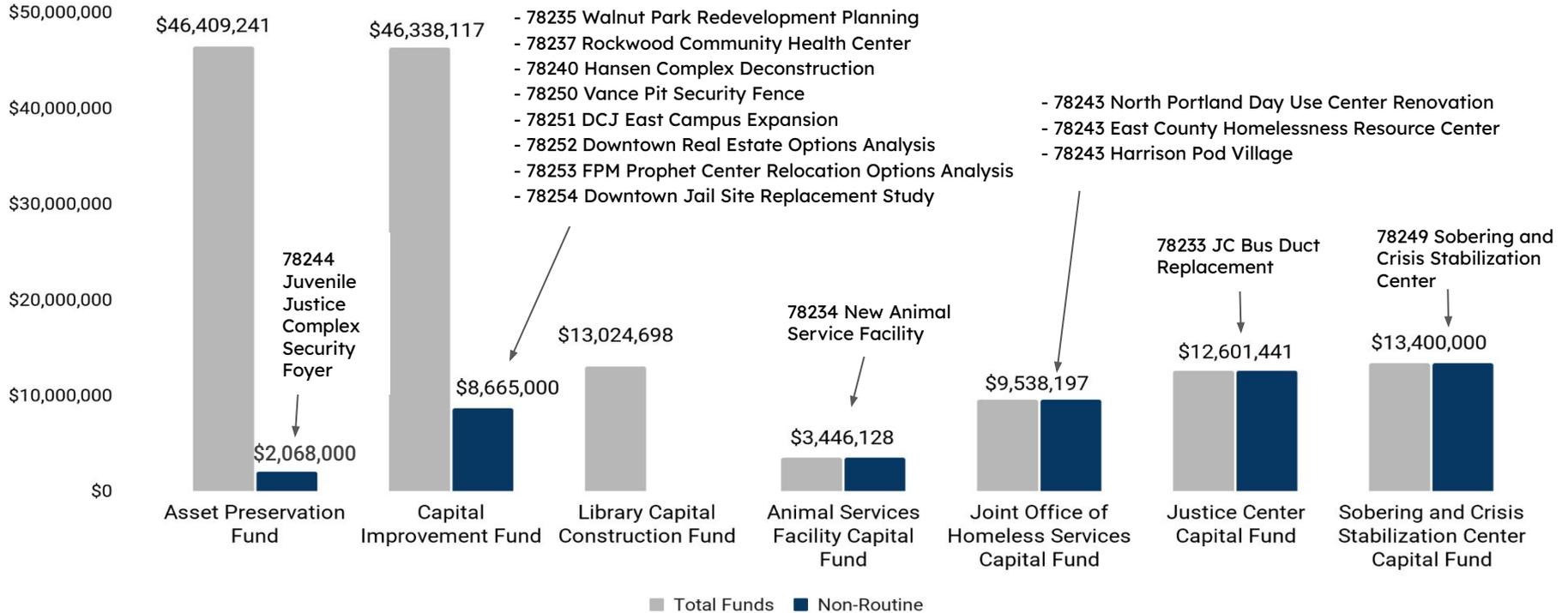

Scope for FY 2026: This funding is for designing and installing a security fence between Vance Park (managed by City of Gresham) and Vance Pit (managed by the County). The fence deters individuals from accessing Vance Pit from the park. There is a substantial drop (30') into the pit once the fence is breached. The County will partner with the City of Gresham on the project.

Scope for FY 2026: Activities include contracting with an architectural and engineering firm for programming, design and estimating for a renovation of the South building at the DCJ East Campus. This project is part of the downtown consolidation plan. A renovation will be considered beginning in FY 2027 to move some DCJ teams currently located downtown to the East Campus. The Board will be asked to approve proceeding with formal design via the FAC-1 procedure in FY 2026, and for construction in FY 2027 (pending the FY 2027 budget approval).

Activities include space planning at the Gladys McCoy building to increase utilization, conceptual design for new space if the County were to vacate the Mead building and the Five Oak lease, and a financial comparison between purchasing an existing building downtown and leasing a building. Any renovation or lease requires Board approval.

This assessment will include a detailed conceptual design and estimate, and cost comparisons between purchasing and leasing a building. Any renovation or lease requires Board approval.

Scope for FY 2026: This proposed project will study replacing the Multnomah County Detention Center (MCDC) within the Justice Center in downtown Portland with a modern facility that meets the needs of the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and those they serve, including individuals in detention. The study will be co-led by the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the Department of County Assets. The study will include options for an assessment for a new facility that replaces MCDC, and a new facility that replaces MCDC and Inverness Jail on one site.

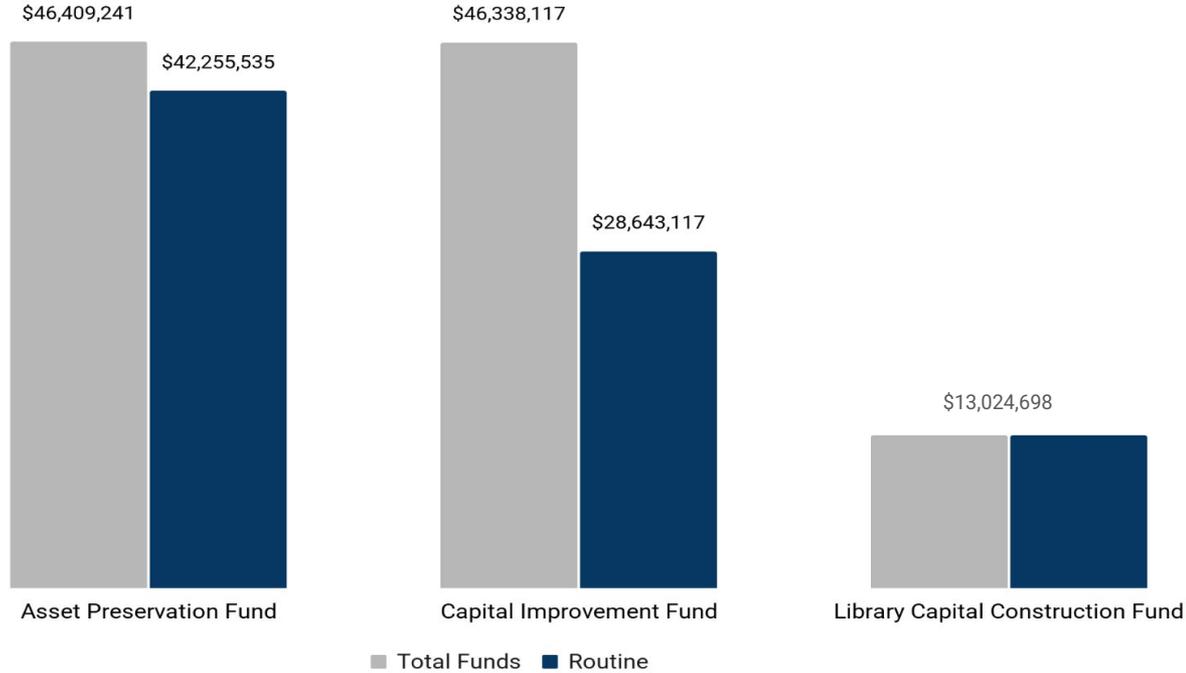

FPM Capital Improvement Plan Purpose

The 5 year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is developed to address capital improvement needs at County owned properties. Most of the improvements are done to ensure building systems and equipment are modernized and replaced at the appropriate time.

Examples of fund usage:

- Replacement or major repair of systems and equipment such as roofs, HVAC (heating, ventilation and cooling), fire, electrical, plumbing, cameras, access control, and detention electronics
- Parking lot repavement and irrigation system replacement
- Physical accessibility improvements
- Interior refresh in common areas





FPM CIP Funding Source

Programs that occupy space in owned buildings, and in a few Library leased spaces, contribute funds for capital improvement projects.

In FY 2026, the amount is \$8.66/square foot of space, totaling \$24,506,175 (includes an additional capital investment of \$1.5M from the Library District).

The annual rate has increased 8% per year since 2005 based on a Board of County Commissioners guidance that year through [Resolution 05-148](#) and the associated 2005 Facilities Strategic Plan.



FPM Capital Improvement Plan Funds

Program contributions to the Capital Improvement Plan funds for space, projected to total \$24,506,175 in FY 2026, are made to one of the following three funds:

- **Library Capital Construction Fund (2506) - \$4,858,735**
 - Library buildings
- **Asset Preservation Fund (2509) - \$12,685,232**
 - Non-Library buildings that are fairly new (often less than 40 years old) or which have undergone significant renovations, referred to as Tier 1 buildings.
- **Capital Improvement Fund (2507) - \$6,962,209**
 - Non-Library buildings that are fairly old, referred to as Tier 2 and Tier 3 buildings.





FPM CIP Development

- Collect new project suggestions through meetings with FPM managers, maintenance team leads, project managers, and property managers, and by reviewing Facility Condition Assessments done on buildings
- Seek project suggestions from other County programs
- Organize project suggestions which includes combining ideas where appropriate, refining budget estimates and clarifying scopes of work.
- Score project suggestions based on a weighted matrix of criteria, including:
 - Fire / Life / Health / Safety
 - Major System
 - Compliance
 - Operational Savings
 - Sustainability
 - Workplace Environment
 - Outside Funding
 - Structural Improvements
- Populate CIP based on project scores and to ensure funds are distributed across programs and buildings
- Publish the full CIP as part of the Capital Budget Book with the FY 2026 Adopted Budget

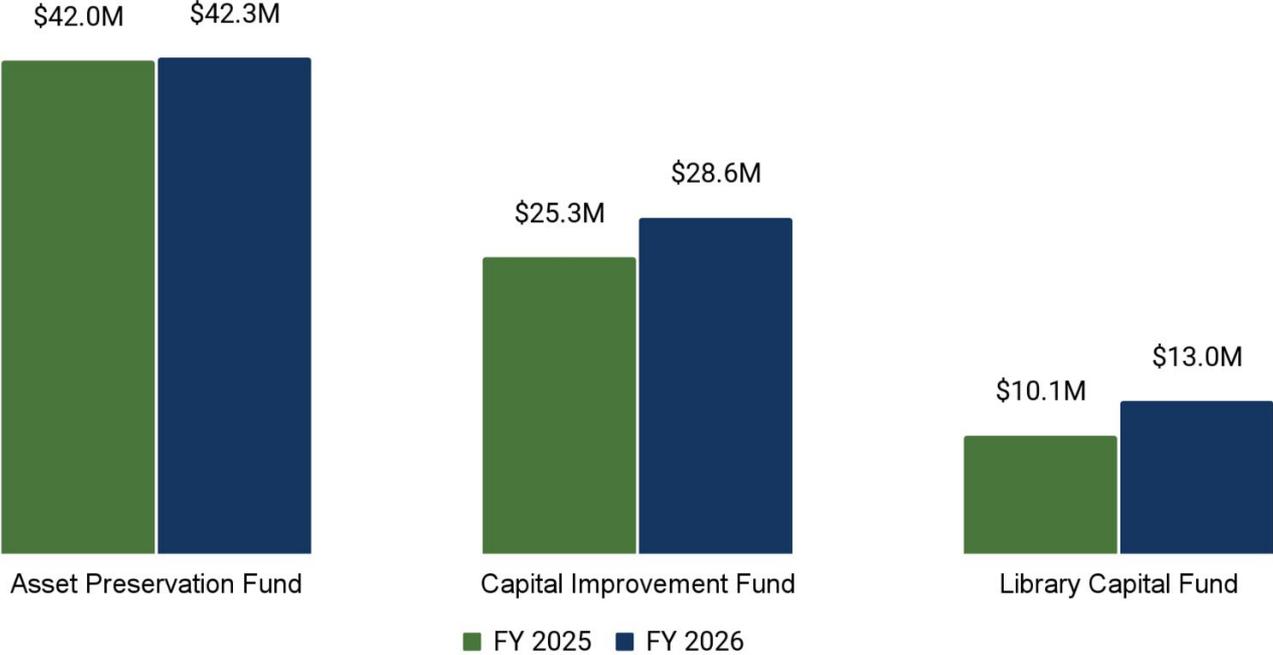


Total DCA Routine Capital Funds FY 2025 and FY 2026



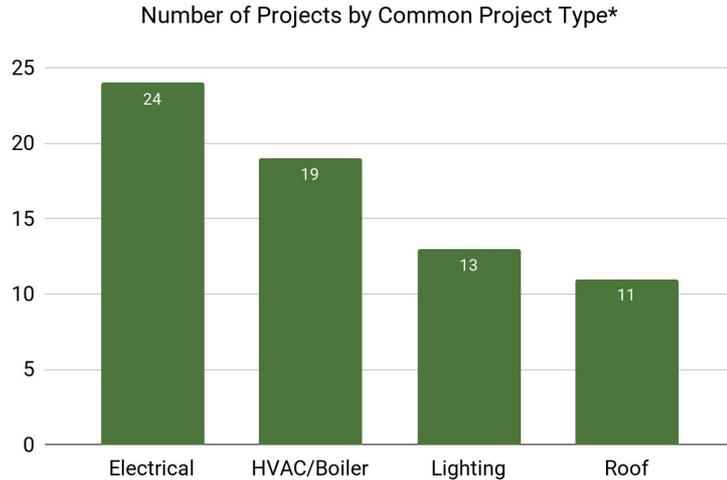

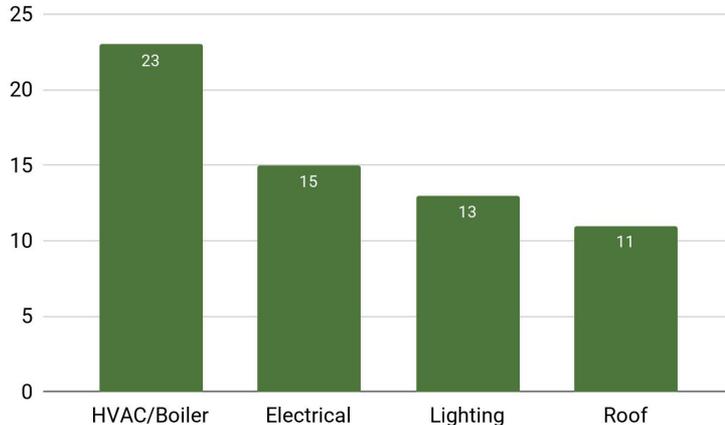

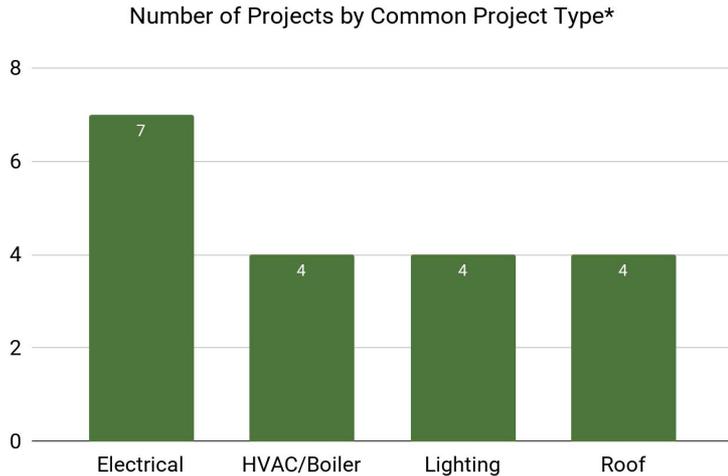

The large detailed sheet summarizes prioritized major capital projects (CAP-1 process) and presents a five year investment needs forecast. Key highlights:

- The Chair's FY 2026 proposed budget dedicates \$10 million in OTO General Funds to both sustain ongoing critical major capital projects and strategically analyze potential future required projects.
- The County is leveraging other funds (e.g., grants) to support capital needs
- Funding on-going capital investments (funded in prior years) continues to be a priority
- 5 Year Capital needs exceed available, secured, and forecasted funding

Capital Plan Projects Scoring Process

Division leadership uses a matrix, focused on safety and security, equity and impact, to score all projects. The questions on the matrix are:

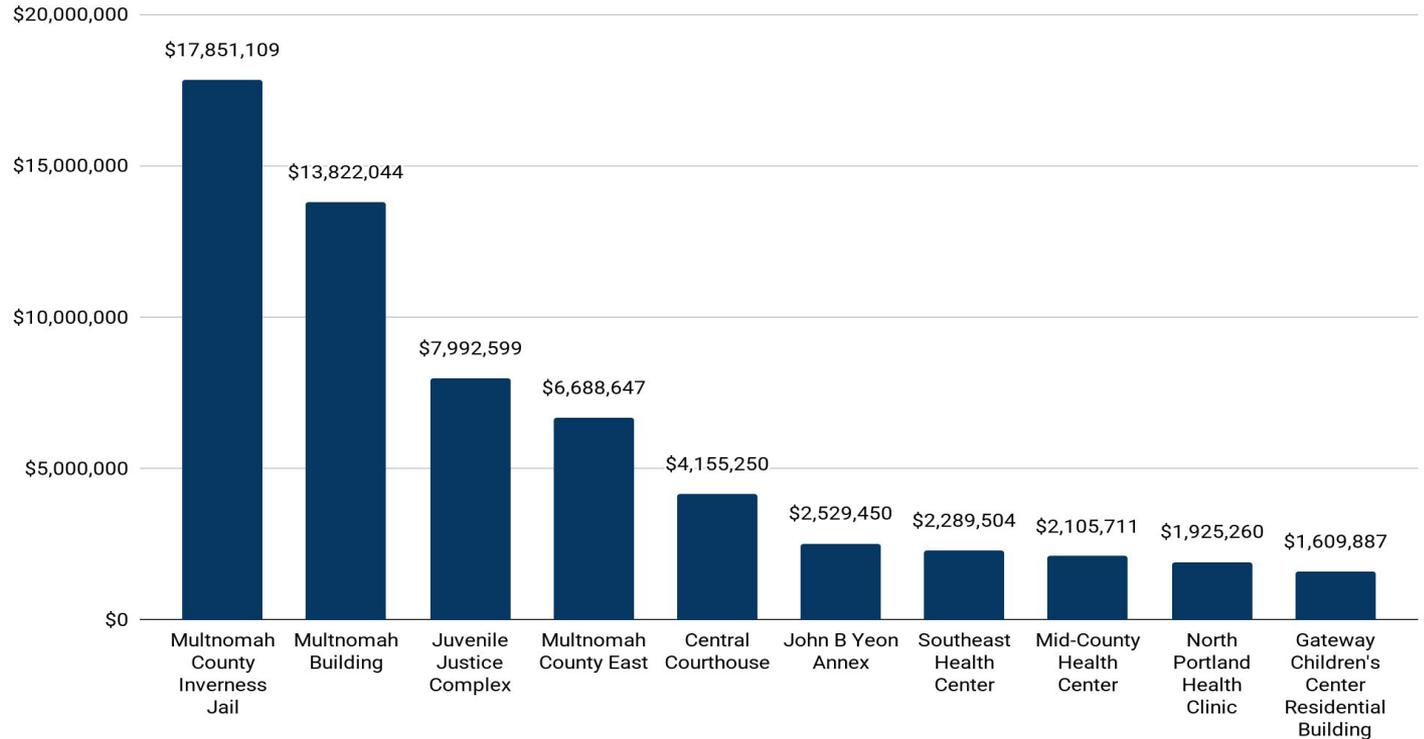
- What effect will adding this item have on security for Multnomah County (physical and digital)?
- What effect will adding this have on safety for Multnomah County employees?
- Will this help build, promote, and retain a high quality and diverse workforce?
- Does this service address racial or other disparities?
- What effect will adding this have on the WESP Plan Focus Areas?
- What effect will adding this have on our current or future customer service/product offering level?
- What will be the long-term effects of this add?
- Will this add have a daily positive impact on the department(s) affected?

Along with the matrix scores, the Capital Planning Steering Committee takes other factors into consideration while prioritizing projects. These include whether or not a project is already underway. If the project is currently underway, what is the amount of funding already invested, and is there a good place to stop or pause the project. Another consideration is current policies or laws that make a project imminent, such as ADA accessibility.
