Emerging Themes

- **Securing Functionality**: Protecting core functions and staff expertise is critical, especially given potential state and federal cuts.
- Maintaining Institutional Knowledge and Expertise: Reductions in staff positions risk the loss of institutional knowledge and expertise.
- Commitment to Equity: Across departments, we emphasized the need to prioritize equity-driven programs, especially those supporting marginalized communities.
- Climate Resilience and Sustainability: Cuts to positions like the Climate Resilience Coordinator could undermine long-term sustainability goals.
- Critical Community Engagement: Engaging community members and residents, particularly marginalized groups, in decision-making remains a top priority.



Non-D CBAC Recommendations

Office of Sustainability:

- We support maintaining funding for programs like the Enterprise Plan, Utility Policy, and Climate Justice by Design, while recommending a shift in resources for the Climate Resilience Coordinator role
- Find ways to ensure this work continues at full capacity through partnerships with the City and State
- Identify potential funding opportunities to support the work of the Climate Resilience Coordinator

Office of Government Relations:

- We support the Chair's decision to cut 1 FTE in the grant-writing position but recommend distributing grant-writing responsibilities across departments to maintain funding streams
- Identify specific staff persons across departments who will take on grant writing responsibilities
- LPSCC and other similar grants are vital for the continuation of community-focused programs



Non-D CBAC Recommendations

Office of Diversity and Equity (ODE):

- We emphasize ODE's critical role in supporting equity and recommend preserving its resources for continued guidance, especially as other departments face increased reliance on equity expertise
- Ensure that equity remains central to the county's response to budget cuts

Auditor's Office:


- We advocate for maintaining community engagement in audits and protecting staff expertise to ensure transparency and accountability
- Pleased to see the program was increased by an FTE Intake Specialist to support the Ombudsperson
- Ensure resources for community engagement, which is key to informing audits

Office of Community Involvement (OCI):

- Pleased to see the temporary position to an FTE and securing resources for internships to support OCI's community engagement efforts.
- Continued investment in OCI will have long-term benefits for the county and the community














FTE Trend FY 2019-2026






Operating Budget by Category - \$606,351




Organizational Chart
