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Department Overview

The Multnomah County District Attorney's (MCDA) Office is driven to make the criminal justice system smarter, safer, and more compassionate. Nathan Vasquez is the elected District Attorney for Multnomah County.

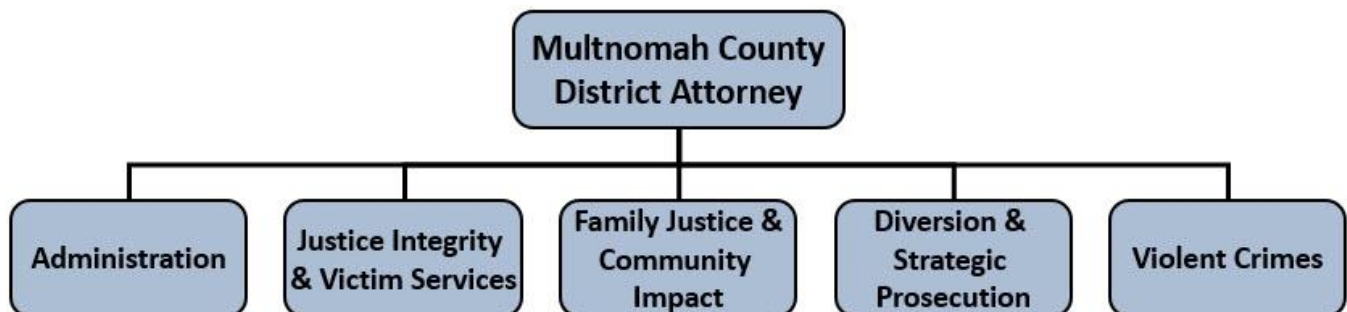
The primary responsibility of the District Attorney's Office is to prosecute violations of criminal law in Multnomah County and to carry out related statutory responsibilities on behalf of the State of Oregon. MCDA reviews and prosecutes thousands of felony and misdemeanor cases each year – more than 5,200 felonies and 8,800 misdemeanors in FY 2025 – working in close coordination with local police agencies, the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, the courts, and the Department of Community Justice across investigation, detention, adjudication, sentencing, and supervision.

When individuals cause harm to the community, MCDA seeks compassionate accountability that is lawful, proportional, and grounded in the fair and equitable administration of justice, while supporting approaches that reduce future harm and prevent reoffending. This work directly advances Multnomah County Strategic Plan outcomes, including Outcome 2: Create a Safe and Just Community, and contributes to Outcome 3: Strengthen Community Vitality and Resilience and Outcome 6: Invest in Our Future. By supporting victim safety, public trust, workforce stability, and an effective public safety system, MCDA plays a central role in maintaining safe, livable communities and the conditions necessary for long-term economic and social well-being. MCDA serves some of the County's most vulnerable residents, including victims of violent crime, children and families, and individuals whose justice system involvement intersects with behavioral health needs, substance use, and economic instability.

Over the past year, Multnomah County and the City of Portland have begun to see meaningful improvements in community safety following several years of elevated violence and system strain. These improvements are not accidental – they reflect coordinated, data-informed investments across the public safety system, including focused prosecution of high-impact crime, strong victim support, strategic use of alternatives to incarceration, and improved system coordination. Sustaining this progress requires maintaining baseline prosecutorial, investigative, and victim service capacity. Reductions in these core functions risk reversing recent gains, undermining public confidence, and eroding the sense of safety and community livability that underpins economic stability, vitality, and the County's broader ability to fund and deliver essential services.

MCDAs long-range goals focus on advancing a safe and just community while aligning with County values of equity, integrity, and measurable results. These goals include:

- Centering victims in the justice process, ensuring timely information, advocacy, and trauma-informed support that promote healing, stability, and safer, more livable communities.
- Prioritizing serious and high-impact crime, including gun violence, homicide, sexual and physical assault, domestic violence, bias crimes, and crimes that directly affect community livability and economic stability.
- Using evidence-based alternatives to incarceration, such as specialty courts, strategic prosecution, and restorative approaches, to promote compassionate accountability, reduce recidivism, and improve long-term public safety outcomes.
- Increasing transparency and accountability, through public-facing data, performance measures, and engagement with community partners.
- Building a skilled, diverse, and equitable workforce, aligned with the County’s Workforce Equity Strategic Plan and reflective of the communities MCDAs serves.



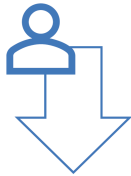

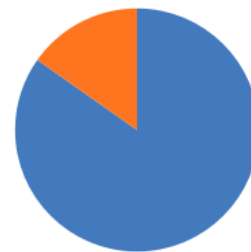

Mission, Vision, and Values

The Multnomah County District Attorney's Office (MCDA) holds individuals accountable for violations of the law, supports victims, and contributes to safe and stable communities. We carry out this responsibility with integrity, sound judgment, and a commitment to fairness and equity, recognizing that harm and access to justice are not experienced equally across communities. Our work is grounded in evidence, focused on results, and centered on maintaining public trust in the justice system.

MCDA's values speak to how we engage with the community and work within our organization. MCDA's values are to:

- Pursue compassionate accountability: Hold individuals accountable while reducing future harm by connecting people to services and supports that promote stability and long-term community safety.
- Center the needs of survivors and families: Ensure victims, especially those from historically underserved communities, have timely access to information, advocacy, and trauma-informed support throughout the legal process.
- Support community livability and economic vitality: Address crimes that impact neighborhoods, small businesses, and community stability, recognizing their role in overall safety and economic well-being.
- Make evidence-based decisions: Use data, research, and proven practices to guide decisions, improve outcomes, and promote fair and consistent case resolution.
- Maintain a modern and efficient justice system: Use technology, data, and improved workflows to increase efficiency, transparency, and accountability across the justice process.
- Be collaborative: Work in partnership with colleagues, system partners, and the community to strengthen outcomes and build trust.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

The Multnomah County District Attorney's Office (MCDA) is committed to a justice system that is fair, effective, and responsive to the communities it serves. This includes centering victims, promoting accountability, and ensuring that decisions are made in ways that are consistent, transparent, and grounded in evidence.

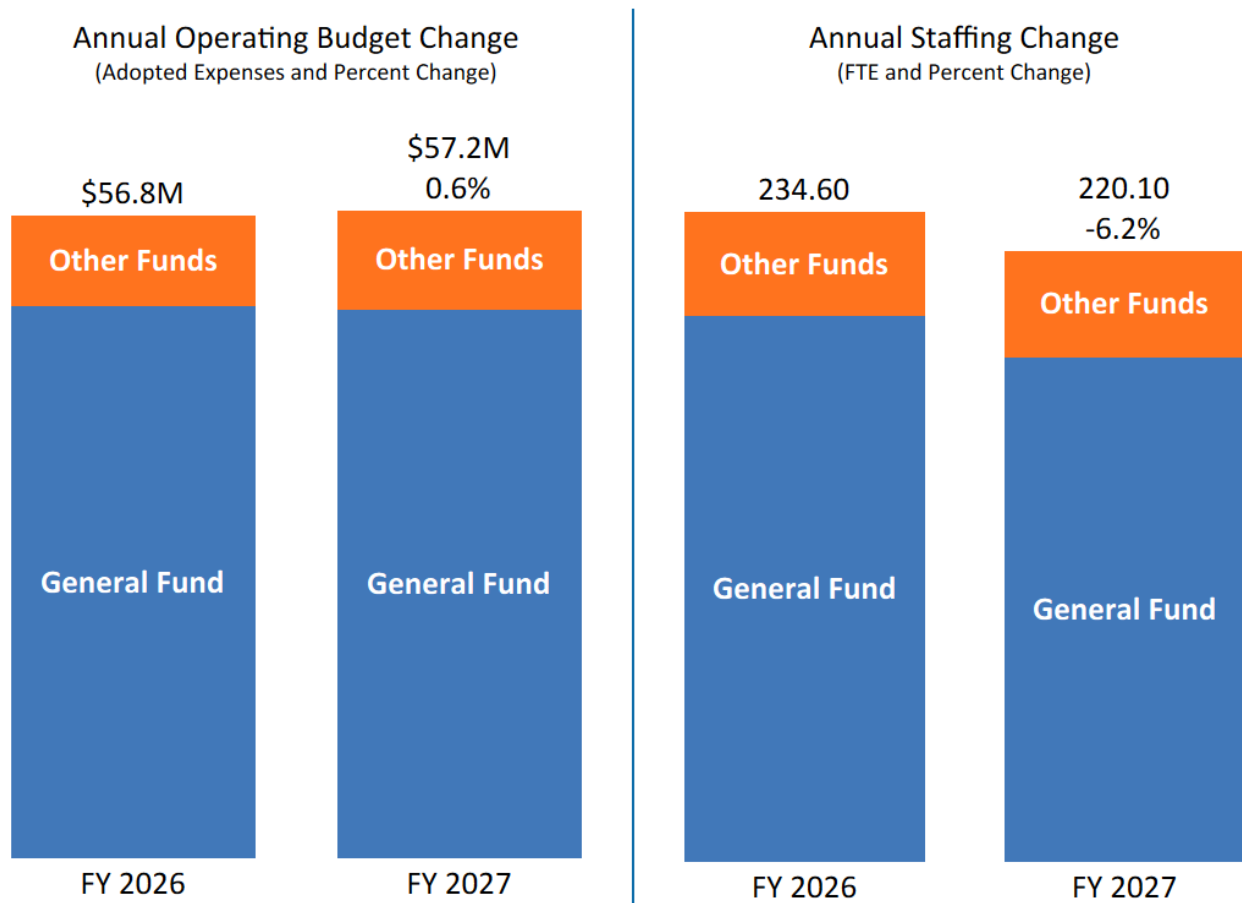
MCDA recognizes that crime is not experienced evenly across communities. Victims from historically underserved communities, including communities of color, low-income households, and small businesses, are disproportionately impacted by both violent and economic crime. In particular, victims of violent crime, including homicide, are disproportionately drawn from communities of color and individuals experiencing homelessness, reflecting broader structural inequities and patterns of vulnerability. Offenses such as auto theft, burglary, retail theft, and fraud can also create cascading effects, including job loss, housing instability, business disruption, and reduced access to essential services. Persistent crime and delayed case resolution can weaken neighborhood livability and undermine economic stability.

MCDA prioritizes improving access to justice and reducing disparities by ensuring that victims have timely information, meaningful engagement, and trauma-informed support throughout the legal process. At the same time, the office is committed to fair and consistent decision-making for defendants, grounded in due process and applied equitably across cases.

This work is supported by ongoing efforts to strengthen organizational capacity, including training, professional development, and internal practices that promote a respectful, inclusive, and high-functioning workplace. Consistent with the County's Workforce Equity Strategic Plan, MCDA is focused on building and sustaining a skilled, diverse workforce that reflects the community it serves, while creating a workplace grounded in safety, trust, and belonging. These efforts help ensure that employees can succeed and contribute at a high level, supporting consistent, high-quality services and maintaining public trust across the communities we serve.

Budget Overview

The FY 2027 operating budget for the Multnomah County District Attorney (MCDA) is \$57.2 million, a \$0.4 million increase from the FY 2026 Adopted budget. The FY 2027 budget is 84.8% General Fund and 15.2% Other Funds. MCDA's FY 2027 budget includes 220.10 FTE, a decrease of 14.50 FTE, or 6.2%, from the FY 2026 Adopted budget.



Personnel costs represent 83.2% of MCDA's General Fund Proposed Budget expenses. Personnel costs increased in FY 2027 due in part to recently settled labor contracts. This resulted in MCDA's General Fund increasing by a net 0.6% from the FY 2026 Adopted budget. This net increase includes General Fund constraint reductions of \$2.3 million and 10.00 FTE. Reductions include 3.00 FTE Legal Assistant Seniors, 6.00 FTE Deputy District Attorneys, and 1.00 FTE Finance Specialist Senior.

MCDA received \$870,000 (2.75 FTE) in new Ongoing General Fund in the Digital Evidence Management Unit - Expansion (15403B) program offer. This funding will continue investigation capacity for body-worn camera footage and other digital evidence.

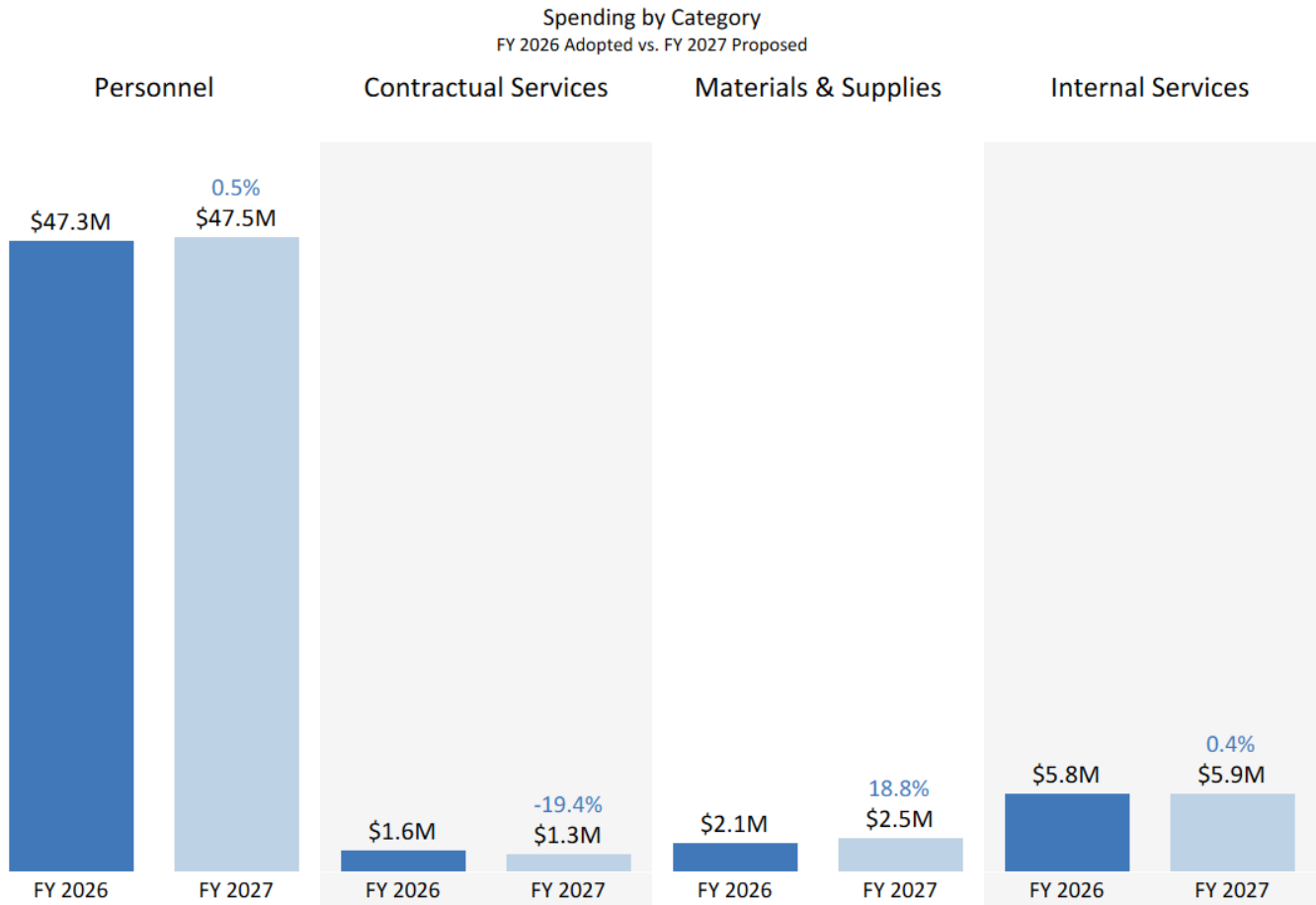

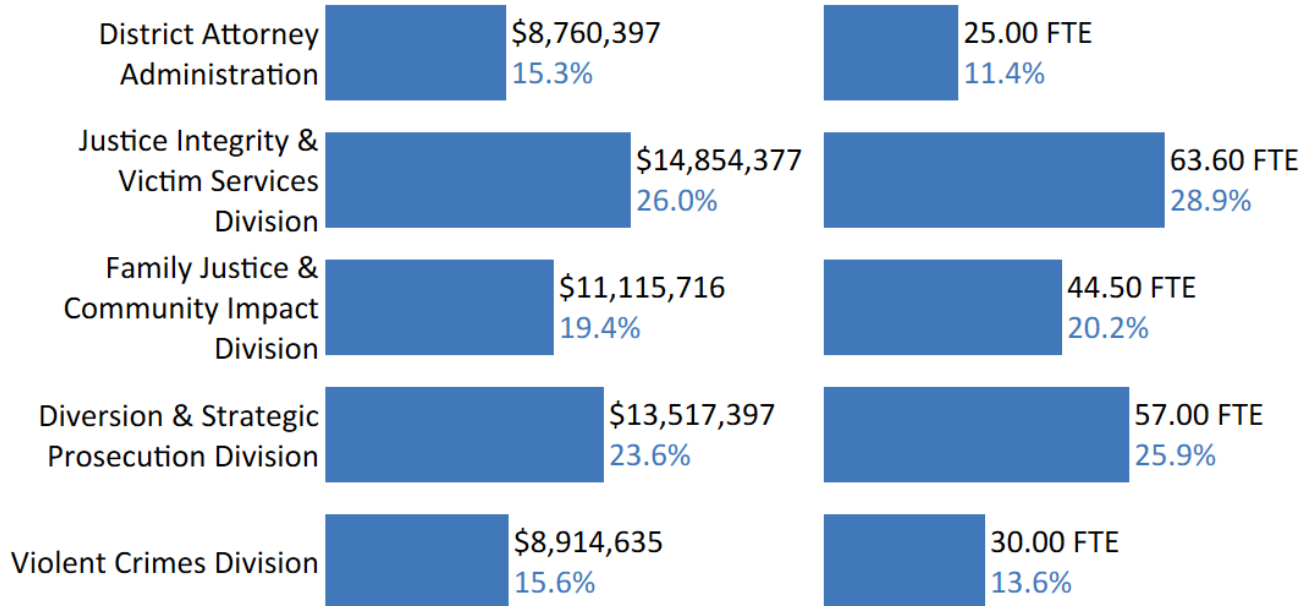

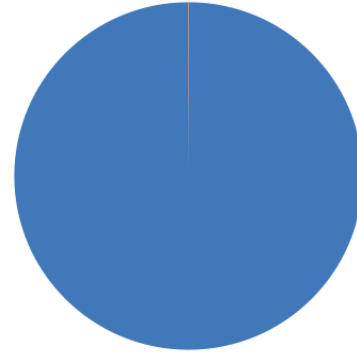

The Administration Division provides leadership, coordination, and operational support across the District Attorney’s Office. It ensures alignment with strategic goals and promotes equity, efficiency, and public trust in the justice system. The division includes the following components:

Office of the District Attorney (15000) provides executive leadership, strategic planning, policy development, and public engagement. It oversees internal and external operations and communications, and facilitates staff training and professional development.

Finance Unit (15003) oversees budgeting, accounts payable/receivable, financial reporting, procurement, and compliance with budget law and internal controls. It develops and monitors MCDA’s annual budget.

Human Resources (15005) leads recruitment, employee relations, performance management, leave administration, and compliance with labor laws, as well as supports a diverse and inclusive workplace.

Equity & Inclusion Unit (15006) leads efforts to foster equity and inclusion, conduct Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) training, facilitates the MCDA DEI Workgroup, and aligns the office with the County’s Workforce Equity Strategic Plan.

Information Technology Unit (15002) maintains MCDA’s IT infrastructure, including case tracking systems, data storage, desktop support, and courtroom technology. It operates a 7-day help desk and manages secure data sharing with justice partners.

Significant Division Changes

The FY 2027 budget establishes the Justice Integrity & Victim Services Division, which consolidates programs previously budgeted within the District Attorney Administration Division and the Investigations Division. This change aligns related functions – Administrative Support Services (15001), Records/Discovery (15004), Research & Planning (15013), Victim Assistance Program (15015), and Justice Integrity Unit (15021) – under a new division. The reorganization does not expand or change scope but is intended to improve clarity in how core functions are organized.

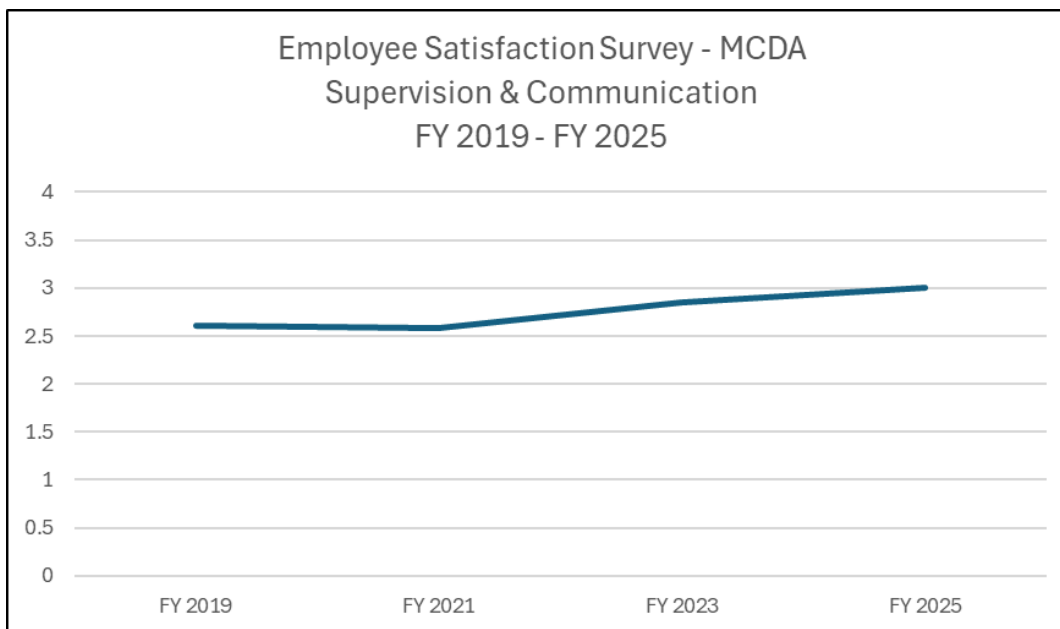
Administration Division Outcomes

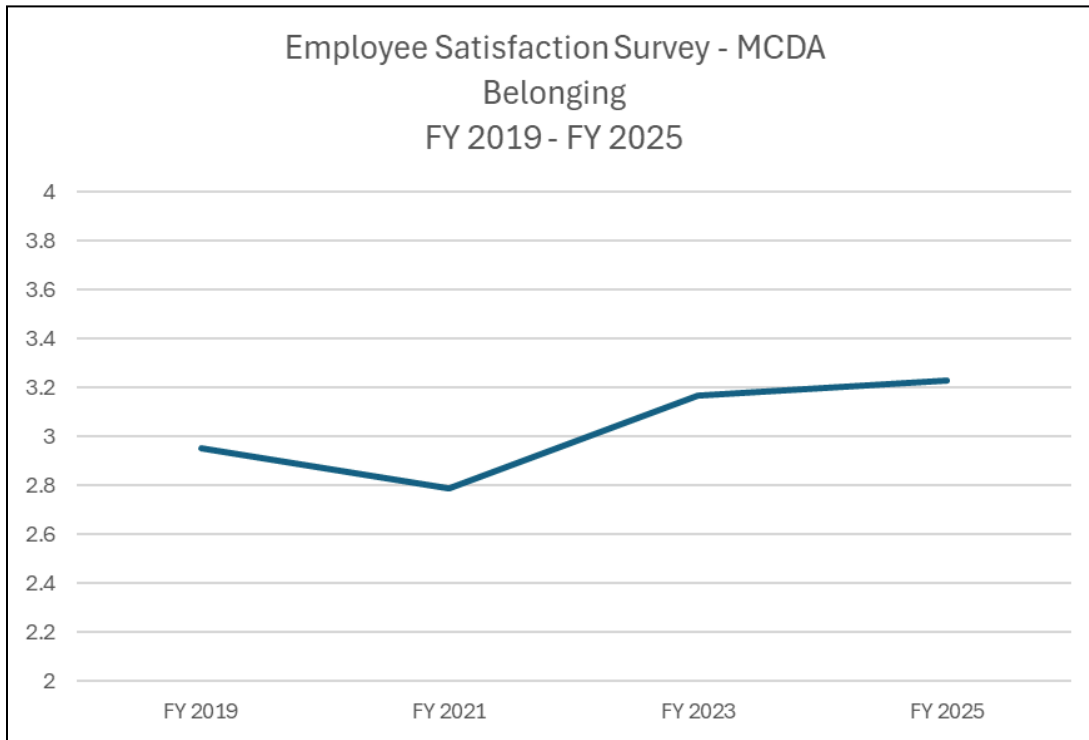

2. Provide MCDA employees with sufficient human resources services to address personnel needs, support staff well-being, and foster a sense of belonging.

Staff from historically marginalized communities, including people of color, women, and LGBTQIA+ employees, are more likely to experience workplaces as unwelcoming, even when policies say otherwise. In a high-stress legal environment, belonging directly affects retention, performance, and the care staff extend to the people they serve.

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Information Technology (IT) Unit provides technology services that support MCDA’s core prosecutorial and administrative operations. The unit manages the office’s technology infrastructure, including hardware, software, servers, mobile devices, and secure data systems that enable staff to work efficiently and reliably.

The IT Unit supports critical systems used for case tracking, digital evidence management, document storage, and secure data exchange with justice partners. The unit also oversees system security, database administration, and web services, including MCDA’s public website and internal intranet, supporting transparency, accessibility, and internal communication.

In addition, the IT Unit supports courtroom and hearing technology, including audio and video systems and the recording platform required for grand jury proceedings under Oregon law. To ensure continuity of operations, the IT Unit operates a Help Desk staffed from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekends, and provides system maintenance, data backup and recovery, and responsive technical support.

Equity Statement

The IT Unit supports equity by ensuring that technology systems are reliable, secure, and accessible for staff, justice partners, and the public. By maintaining data integrity and supporting transparent information sharing, the unit helps promote accountability and a fair, responsive justice process.

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Equity & Inclusion Unit supports a safe, respectful, and effective workplace at MCDA, with a focus on equity, workforce stability, and employee well-being in a high-stress legal environment. The unit works alongside leadership and staff to strengthen organizational culture and support sustainable workforce practices.

The unit applies an equity lens to recruitment strategies, workforce data, and progress reviews to support retention and long-term workforce sustainability. It also develops and delivers training for employees and leaders, including trauma-informed cultural competency, equity tools, leadership development, and professional growth opportunities.

A key function of the Equity & Inclusion Unit is providing secondary trauma support for employees and grand jurors exposed to graphic evidence and emotionally difficult cases. Through facilitated conversations, education, and trauma-informed resources, the unit helps mitigate the impacts of vicarious trauma and supports staff resilience. The unit also partners with leadership to review policies and practices, supports equity-related data collection, and aligns efforts with the Multnomah County Workforce Equity Strategic Plan.

Equity Statement

The Equity & Inclusion Unit advances equity by promoting inclusive practices, reducing barriers to advancement, and supporting employee well-being through trauma-informed approaches. By aligning organizational policies with the County's Workforce Equity Strategic Plan and addressing disparities in representation, the unit helps build a workplace that reflects and serves the community.

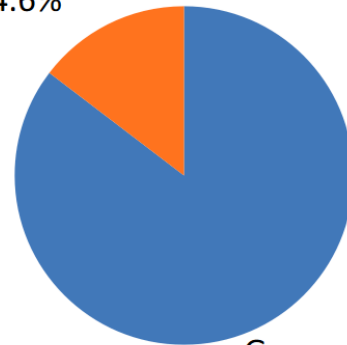

The FY 2027 budget establishes the Justice Integrity & Victim Services Division, which consolidates programs previously budgeted within the District Attorney Administration Division and the Investigations Division. This change aligns related functions, such as victim services, justice integrity work, investigations, discovery, and research and planning, under a single division. The reorganization does not expand or change scope but is intended to improve clarity in how core functions are organized. The division includes the following programs:

Justice Integrity Unit (JIU) (15021) handles all matters related to Senate Bill 819, an Oregon law that allows for resentencing. It also manages expungements, clemency, public records, pretrial arraignments, and promotes transparency and fairness in legal processes.

Victim Assistance Program (VAP) (15015) provides a critical bridge between prosecution work and victims of crime, families of victims, and the community at large. Expertly trained in cultural competence and trauma-informed service, members of the VAP guide crime victims through the complex court process while providing support, advocacy, and resource referrals.

Administrative Support Services (15001) provides core operational support, including front desk and reception services, mail delivery, conference room scheduling, witness subpoena processing and fee payments, and preparation of daily court calendars.

Records/Discovery (15004) fulfills the MCDA's statutory responsibility to provide case-specific discovery documents and provides file storage and retrieval for the entire office.

Research & Planning Unit (15013) provides data analysis, dashboard development, and research to inform evidence-based policies and prosecutorial decision-making.

Investigation Unit (15402) provides specialized investigative support across all MCDA divisions, working alongside prosecutors and law enforcement partners to gather evidence, locate and interview witnesses, serve subpoenas, and support victims through the court process.

Digital Evidence Management Unit (15403A/B) reviews, manages, and prepares digital evidence, including body-worn camera footage, surveillance video, and other digital media, for use in criminal prosecutions, ensuring evidence is accurately summarized, properly redacted, and disclosed in compliance with legal requirements.

Significant Division Changes

The Justice Integrity & Victim Services Division is new for FY 2027.

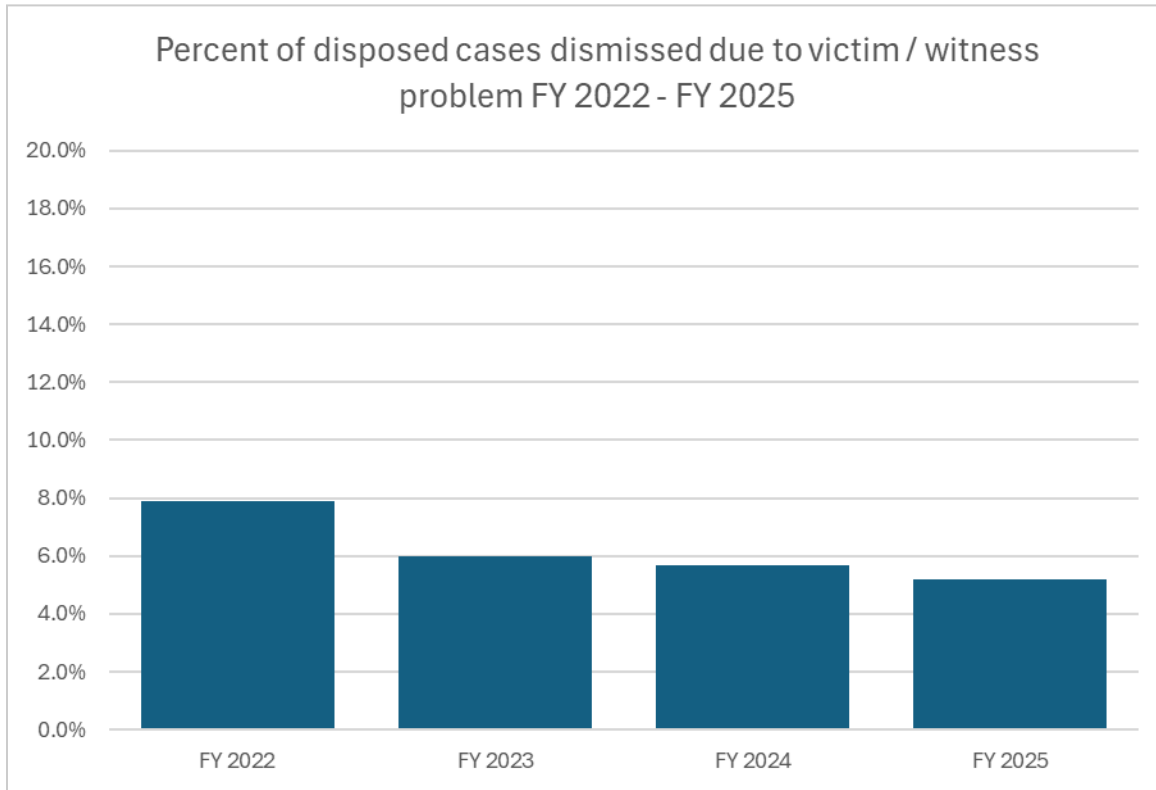
Justice Integrity & Victim Services Division Outcomes

1. Ensure crime victims receive appropriate support by assigning victim advocates to their cases, providing guidance, resources, and advocacy throughout the legal process.

When someone becomes a victim of crime, navigating the legal system can be overwhelming. MCDA's Victim Assistance Program ensures that victims have dedicated advocates to explain the process, connect them to resources, and make sure their voice is heard at every stage of prosecution.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 1.1: Percent of cases dismissed due to a problem with a critical victim or witness.

KPI 1.1 Description: Victim and witness participation in criminal prosecutions can be challenging and emotionally traumatic. MCDA's victim advocates play a critical role in ensuring that individuals impacted by crime receive the support, information, and resources necessary to navigate the prosecution and remain engaged through the resolution of their case.

KPI 1.1 Equity Considerations: Not all victims experience the justice system the same way. Language barriers, immigration status, and past experiences with law enforcement can all affect whether a victim feels safe engaging with prosecution. MCDA's Victim Assistance Program provides culturally responsive, trauma-informed support to reduce these barriers and ensure consistent access to advocacy regardless of background.

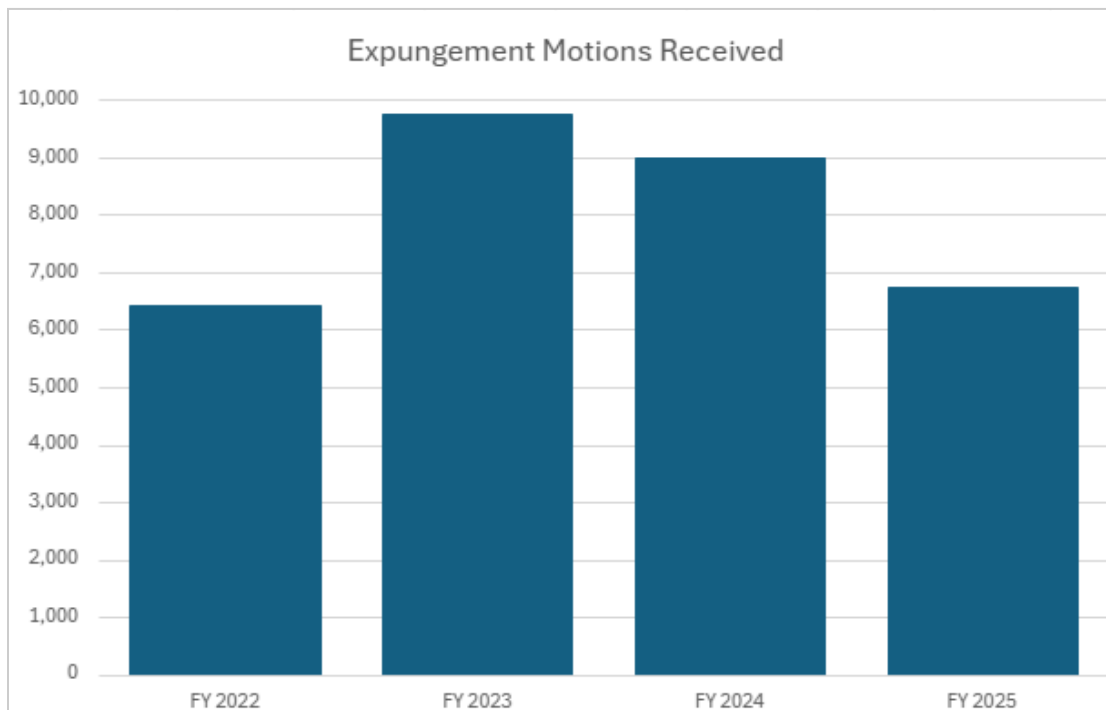

2. Provide present accountability for the past actions of this office by revisiting the ongoing justice, utility, and equity of criminal convictions while centering the individuals directly involved in the case.

Criminal convictions have direct and collateral consequences. Establishing and maintaining a smooth pathway to setting aside those convictions once the law allows that to happen ensures that members of our community can move forward. Careful, equitable review of those impacts, and a commitment to removing barriers where the law allows, is a core value of MCDA.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 2.1: Set aside (expungement) motions reviewed

KPI 2.1 Description: An expungement allows individuals who meet certain legal criteria to have a past conviction removed from their record, reducing barriers to employment, housing, and other opportunities. A 2021 change in Oregon law made more convictions eligible for expungement, creating a large backlog. The volume is now stabilizing as the office works through that backlog.

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Records / Discovery Unit fulfills MCDA’s statutory obligation to provide case-specific discovery materials to defense attorneys and individuals representing themselves. These materials include documents, photographs, video, and audio files, and are increasingly delivered through secure online systems to improve efficiency, accuracy, and access as digital evidence volumes grow.

The unit ensures timely and complete disclosure across all case types, including serious felony matters. Staff manage copying, uploading, redaction, and tracking of discovery materials, and process documentation related to victim restitution claims. The unit also supports daily court operations by preparing dockets, maintaining records and file retrieval systems, and managing archival processes for closed cases in compliance with state requirements.

By managing these critical functions, the Records / Discovery Unit supports due process, protects legal rights, and strengthens transparency and integrity throughout the justice process.

Equity Statement

The Records / Discovery Unit promotes equity by ensuring fair and timely access to case materials for all parties. Through secure online delivery and standardized redaction practices, the unit reduces barriers and supports a justice system that is accessible, consistent, and transparent.

Program Description

The Research & Planning Unit provides essential data analysis and research to help MCDA make informed, evidence-based decisions. This program evaluates trends and outcomes within Multnomah County’s criminal justice system, guiding policy development and resource allocation to maximize public safety and equity.

Key functions include analyzing programs such as the Multnomah County Justice Reinvestment Program (MCJRP) and Strategic Treatment and Engagement Program (STEP) Court, identifying high-volume system users for strategic prosecution, and producing research that informs smarter policy decisions. The unit also drives transparency by maintaining public-facing dashboards on gun violence, hate crimes, and prosecutorial performance indicators, making MCDA one of the most open district attorney’s offices in the nation.

Through partnerships with universities and collaboration with justice system stakeholders, the Research and Planning Unit ensures MCDA has the capacity to answer complex questions, measure effectiveness, and identify opportunities for improvement. This work strengthens accountability and supports a justice system that is fair, efficient, and responsive.

Program Description

The Victim Assistance Program (VAP) provides comprehensive, trauma-informed support to crime victims throughout the prosecution process, ensuring they are informed, supported, and able to exercise their rights. The program delivers fair and consistent assistance to all victims, regardless of background or status, using culturally responsive and victim-centered practices.

VAP connects victims to resources within MCDA and the broader community, helps them understand their legal rights, and provides guidance related to restitution. Victim Advocates serve as a primary point of contact between victims, prosecutors, law enforcement, and service providers, helping navigate complex legal processes, supporting safety planning, providing crisis intervention, and accompanying victims to court.

The program includes specialized advocacy to address complex needs such as housing instability and safety concerns, while program leadership oversees training, coordination, and grant compliance to strengthen service delivery. By centering victims in the justice process, VAP reduces barriers, builds trust, and supports meaningful participation at every stage of prosecution.

Equity Statement

The Victim Assistance Program advances equity by providing language access, reviewing U Visa certifications for immigrant victims, and supporting access to housing and safety resources. Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Justice Integrity Unit (JIU) promotes fairness, consistency, and transparency in the criminal justice process by managing key responsibilities at the outset of criminal cases and in post-conviction matters. JIU attorneys attend all criminal arraignments to present the State’s position on pretrial release, an essential function that affects defendants, victims, and community safety and is guided by principles of consistency and justice.

The unit also oversees post-conviction processes, including petitions for post-conviction relief, expungements, clemency reviews, parole and probation hearings, and resentencing petitions under Oregon law. In addition, JIU fulfills public accountability functions by responding to public records requests and conducting the required annual grand jury review of correctional facilities in Multnomah County.

Through this work, the Justice Integrity Unit safeguards due process, supports accountability, and helps ensure that prosecutorial practices remain fair, lawful, and responsive over time.

Equity Statement

The Justice Integrity Unit advances equity by managing arraignment decisions and post-conviction processes with attention to reducing harm from past inequitable policies. Program Description

The Investigations Unit provides specialized investigative support for criminal prosecutions across all divisions of MCDA. Staffed by experienced District Attorney Investigators, the unit works closely with prosecutors and local, state, and federal law enforcement partners to prepare cases for successful prosecution. This investigative work occurs after cases are referred for prosecution and is essential to fulfilling MCDA’s independent legal responsibilities related to charging decisions, discovery obligations, and trial preparation.

Investigators support cases by gathering and evaluating evidence, locating and interviewing victims and witnesses, supporting vulnerable witnesses through the court process, and providing courtroom testimony. The unit also assists with search warrants, digital evidence review, subpoenas, and other investigative functions that require specialized training and experience.

Through this work, the Investigations Unit plays a critical role in strengthening case outcomes, supporting victims and witnesses, and ensuring that prosecutions are thorough, reliable, and fair.

The Digital Evidence Management Unit manages, reviews, and prepares digital evidence for criminal prosecutions across MCDA, including body-worn camera footage, surveillance video, audio files, photographs, and other digital media. The unit ensures that digital evidence is accurately reviewed, securely handled, and made available for discovery in compliance with legal and constitutional requirements.

Unit staff review digital evidence to identify relevant facts, summarize footage for prosecutors, and flag potential legal or constitutional issues related to searches, seizures, statements, and officer conduct. The unit also prepares digital evidence for court by editing trial exhibits and redacting sensitive content as required to protect the privacy of victims, witnesses, and other vulnerable individuals.

Program Description

This program offer provides ongoing funding to sustain staffing and core technology that support MCDA's Digital Evidence Management function. The request continues funding for 2.75 FTE and the digital evidence management platform, which are necessary to meet MCDA's constitutional and ethical obligations in cases involving body-worn camera footage and other digital evidence. These positions and system costs were previously funded on a one-time basis and are now requested as ongoing to ensure operational continuity.

Body-worn camera footage and other digital evidence play a central role in modern prosecutions by providing objective documentation of crime scenes, witness interactions, and law enforcement conduct. Dedicated staffing ensures that this evidence is reviewed, summarized, redacted when required, and prepared for discovery in a timely and legally compliant manner, supporting informed charging decisions and trial readiness.

The technology platform enables MCDA to securely receive, manage, and disclose large volumes of digital evidence from law enforcement agencies, businesses, and victims and witnesses. Continued investment in this system allows prosecutors to access evidence efficiently, preserves the integrity of digital files through audit trails, and supports discovery practices that are reliable, transparent, and defensible.

Equity Statement

Sustained funding for Digital Evidence Management ensures that prosecutorial decisions are informed by complete and objective evidence, supporting fair and consistent outcomes across cases. By enabling thorough review and appropriate redaction of digital evidence, this investment promotes transparency, accountability, and equitable treatment while strengthening public trust in the justice system.

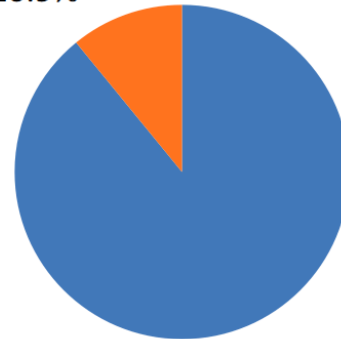

The Family Justice & Community Impact Division is responsible for prosecuting a wide range of felony and misdemeanor criminal cases, largely those involving juveniles, families, and children. The division includes the following programs:

Child Abuse Unit (15103) prosecutes serious child abuse cases, including sexual and physical assaults, exploitation, and the possession of sexually explicit images of children.

Domestic Violence Unit (15102) prosecutes crimes of domestic violence, including misdemeanors, violent felonies, and violation of restraining orders, while working collaboratively with community and system partners to secure services and safety for survivors and their families. The Domestic Violence Unit also runs a Survivor Centered Diversion Program, which seeks to identify domestic violence survivors who are charged with crimes and divert their cases away from the justice system.

Juvenile Unit (15101) prosecutes criminal conduct by juveniles ranging from misdemeanors to serious felonies, including homicide, and seeks restitution for victims. This unit strives to keep youth out of the adult criminal system through community supervision, diversion, and restorative justice.

Misdemeanor Trial Unit (MTU) (15105) prosecutes all misdemeanor crimes except those involving domestic violence. Common misdemeanor offenses are driving under the influence of intoxicants (DUI), resisting arrest, theft, trespass, and disorderly conduct. Cases handled by MTU are either diverted to a specialty court program or set for trial. New deputy district attorneys often begin in the MTU, creating significant training and mentorship responsibilities for unit management.

Significant Division Changes

In FY 2027, this division was renamed from Division I to Family Justice & Community Impact.

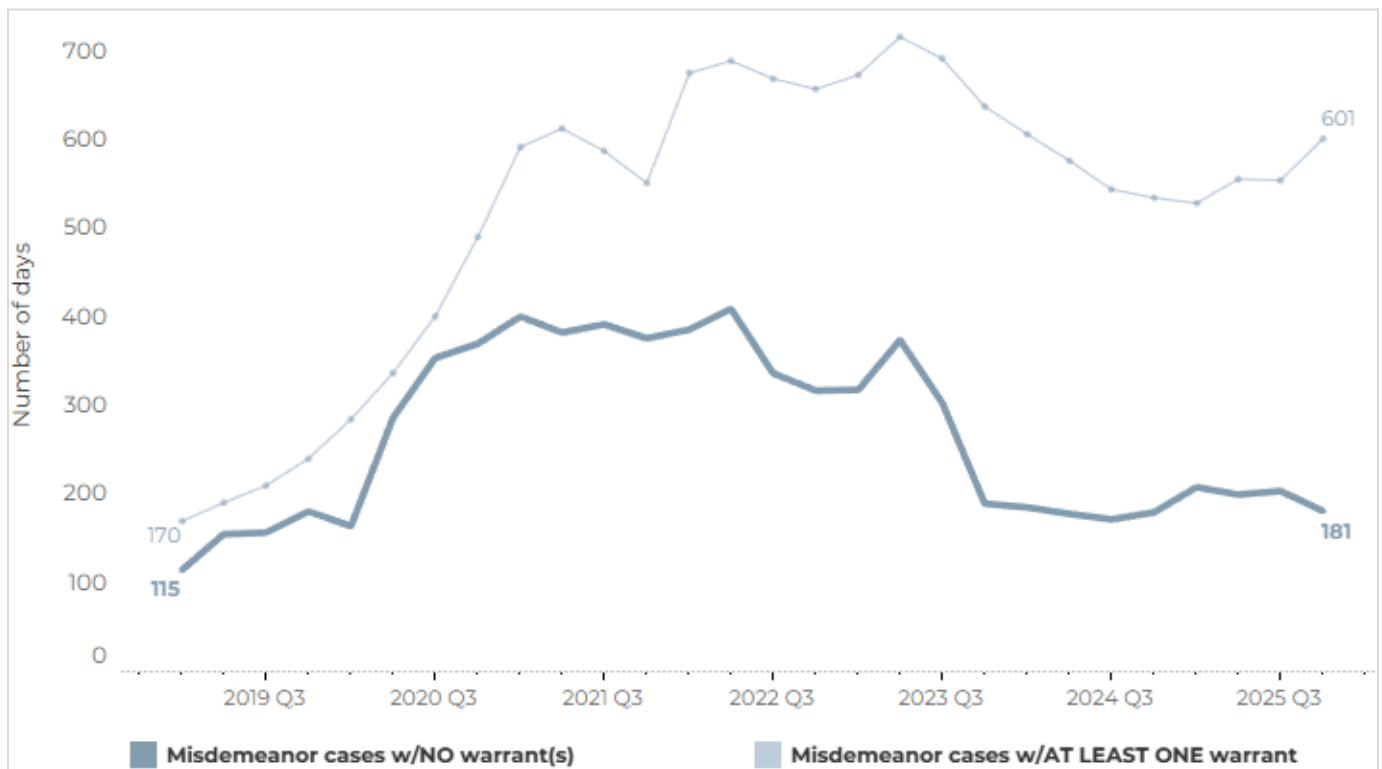

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

Family Justice & Community Impact Administration provides leadership and operational oversight for MCDA’s work in juvenile justice, domestic violence, child abuse, and misdemeanor prosecution. The division is led by a Chief Deputy District Attorney (CDDA), who sets strategic direction, ensures consistent legal standards, and manages day-to-day operations across units that address crimes with significant impacts on families and community stability.

Division leadership guides prosecutorial decision-making, resolves complex legal issues, and supports fair, consistent, and trauma-informed case outcomes. The CDDA provides supervision, policy implementation, and case consultation to support staff working in high-stakes and emotionally demanding practice areas, while maintaining accountability and victim safety.

Family Justice & Community Impact Administration also coordinates division-wide practices to promote consistency, strengthen victim-centered approaches, and support timely case resolution. Through alignment of supervision, training, and operational standards, division leadership helps ensure effective responses to crimes that disproportionately affect vulnerable individuals and families.

Division leadership plays a key role in coordination with courts, law enforcement, child welfare, advocacy organizations, and other system partners. Participation in multidisciplinary teams and interagency councils supports information sharing, aligned policies, and coordinated countywide responses to domestic violence, juvenile crime, and child abuse.

Equity Statement

Family Justice & Community Impact Administration supports equitable and consistent decision-making in cases involving youth, survivors of violence, and communities with higher levels of justice system involvement. Division leadership promotes trauma-informed practices, early intervention, diversion, and coordinated responses to reduce disparities while prioritizing safety, accountability, and family well-being.

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Juvenile Unit promotes community safety through a fair and developmentally appropriate response to crimes committed by youth under the age of 18. The unit handles cases ranging from low-level misdemeanors to serious felonies and homicides, with an emphasis on accountability that supports positive behavioral change and long-term public safety.

The unit works closely with the Department of Community Justice and other partners to resolve cases in ways that protect the community, hold youth accountable, and reduce the likelihood of future system involvement. A core goal of the Juvenile Unit is to limit unnecessary entry into the adult criminal justice system through early, proportional responses.

All referred cases are reviewed by Deputy District Attorneys to ensure legal sufficiency and appropriate use of formal charges. When appropriate, the unit supports diversion, informal handling, and restorative justice options that address harm while avoiding the lasting consequences of prosecution.

Through initiatives such as Transforming Juvenile Probation, the Juvenile Unit expands access to supervision and services without formal charges, allowing youth to receive accountability and support without a criminal record.

Equity Statement

The Juvenile Unit supports equitable treatment of youth through consistent legal screening, diversion, and restorative justice practices. By prioritizing developmentally appropriate responses and alternatives to prosecution, the unit works to reduce disparities and prevent long-term harm to youth and families.

Division: Family Justice & Community Impact Division

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Domestic Violence Unit prosecutes cases involving family and intimate partner violence, including physical and sexual assaults, strangulation, kidnapping, and violations of Family Abuse Prevention Act restraining orders. The unit’s primary focus is to protect survivors and ensure community safety while holding defendants accountable in ways that reduce future harm.

The unit works closely with law enforcement, the Department of Community Justice, and community-based domestic violence organizations to support coordinated, survivor-centered responses. Prosecutors collaborate with advocates and service providers to ensure survivors have access to safety planning, legal protections, and support services throughout the case process.

When appropriate, the unit supports alternatives to traditional prosecution, including deferred sentencing supervised intervention program for eligible first-time offenders. These approaches emphasize accountability, behavior change, and long-term safety for survivors and their families, while helping interrupt cycles of violence. The unit also works to identify justice involved survivors and divert their cases away from traditional prosecution through referral to services at our partner agency, Bradley Angle.

Equity Statement

The Domestic Violence Unit supports equitable access to justice for survivors who experience disproportionate impacts of domestic violence, including individuals from underserved and marginalized communities. Through trauma-informed prosecution, culturally responsive advocacy, and coordinated partnerships, the unit works to reduce barriers to safety, accountability, and long-term stability.

Division: Family Justice & Community Impact Division

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Child Abuse Unit prosecutes the most serious crimes against children, including homicide, severe physical and sexual abuse, and crimes involving the exploitation of children. The unit operates as part of a multidisciplinary team, working closely with system partners including law enforcement, medical providers, and the Department of Human Services child advocacy caseworkers to ensure coordinated responses that prioritize child safety and accountability.

Prosecutors in the unit provide specialized legal oversight in complex and high-risk cases, including responding to child fatalities and representing the State in dependency proceedings involving sexual and physical abuse and neglect. Through close collaboration with the Victim Assistance Program and system partners, the unit applies trauma-informed practices that seek to minimize further harm to children and support long-term safety and stability.

The Child Abuse Unit also supports prevention and system coordination by advising partner agencies, responding to emergent cases, and administering state funding that supports child abuse intervention and multidisciplinary collaboration across Multnomah County.

Equity Statement

The Child Abuse Unit supports equitable protection and access to justice for children who face heightened risk of abuse and systemic barriers to safety. Through trauma-informed prosecution, multidisciplinary collaboration, and fair application of legal standards, the unit works to reduce disparities while prioritizing child well-being and public trust.

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Misdemeanor Trial Unit (MTU) reviews and prosecutes all non-domestic violence misdemeanor cases referred to MCDA, determining whether prosecution is legally sufficient and appropriate. Unit attorneys manage cases from initial review through resolution, including trial preparation, court appearances, sentencing, and restitution, ensuring timely and consistent application of legal standards.

The MTU also staffs specialty dockets that provide alternatives to traditional prosecution, including Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants (DUII) diversion and conditional discharge options for eligible misdemeanor drug cases, including cases impacted by House Bill 4002. Through careful case screening, alternative dispositions, and consistent trial readiness, the unit supports accountability while reserving more intensive system responses for cases that pose greater public safety concerns.

Equity Statement

The Misdemeanor Trial Unit promotes equitable outcomes by applying consistent legal screening and expanding access to diversion and alternative resolutions for low-level offenses where appropriate. These practices help reduce the disproportionate impact of misdemeanor enforcement on communities of color while maintaining fairness and accountability.

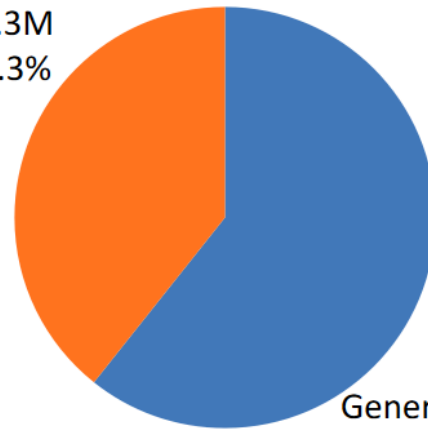

The Diversion & Strategic Prosecution Division is responsible for prosecuting felony property crimes, narcotics offenses, and felony Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants (DUI) cases, while operating all felony treatment courts and prison diversion programs. The division also enforces child support orders to promote family stability and economic security for children across Multnomah County. Diversion & Strategic Prosecution emphasizes public safety, rehabilitation, and alternatives to incarceration while seeking to reduce criminal recidivism and support defendants in long-term recovery. The division includes:

Property & Narcotics (formerly Unit A/B) (15203) targets felony property crimes and commercial narcotics offenses, including fentanyl distribution and overdose-related death investigations, and is the primary referral source for MCDA's treatment courts and the Multnomah County Justice Reinvestment Program (MCJRP).

Strategic Prosecution Unit (SPU) (15206) identifies and prosecutes high-volume system users, individuals whose repeated criminal activity has a disproportionate impact on community safety, using data-driven, individualized approaches that address root causes and emphasize alternatives to incarceration.

Treatment, Accountability, & Specialty Court Unit (TASC) (15209) consolidates specialty courts, civil commitments, and prison diversion programs to provide structured, treatment-focused alternatives to incarceration for individuals whose criminal behavior is driven by substance use, mental health needs, or other underlying factors.

Child Support Enforcement (15208) establishes, modifies, and enforces child support orders, connecting parents facing barriers to compliance with employment assistance, addiction evaluations, and mental health services to support long-term family stability.

Significant Division Changes

In FY 2027, Division II was renamed Diversion & Strategic Prosecution Division. The Multnomah Attorney Access Program (MAAP) (15207) from FY 2026 has been merged into the Strategic Prosecution Unit (15206). The Portland Police Bureau will not renew \$350,000 in funding for the Organized Retail Theft Task Force and Auto Theft Force that supported 3.00 FTE in FY 2027. In response, Multnomah County will also discontinue its funding for these partnerships. This eliminates a total of 5.00 FTE across the Investigations Unit (15402) and Strategic Prosecution Unit (15206). Limited-term grant funding will support 1.00 FTE Deputy District Attorney and 1.00 FTE DA Investigator to partially continue Organized Retail Theft work in FY 2027.

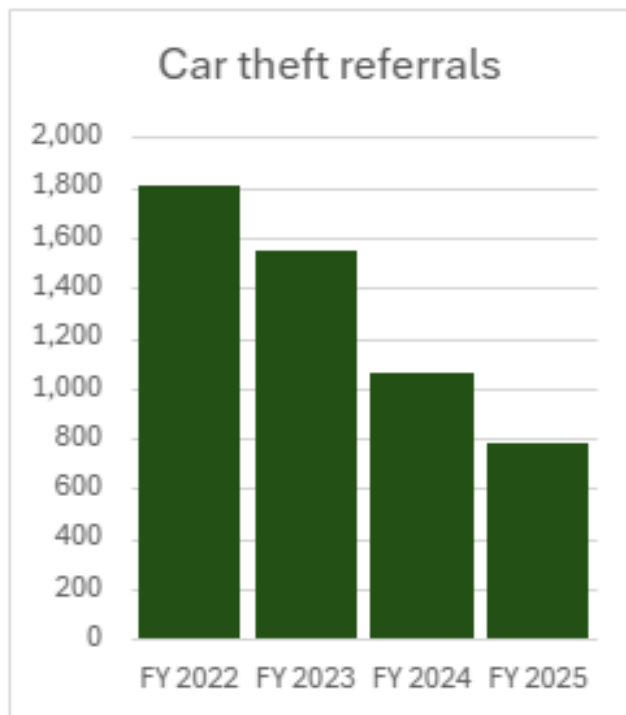
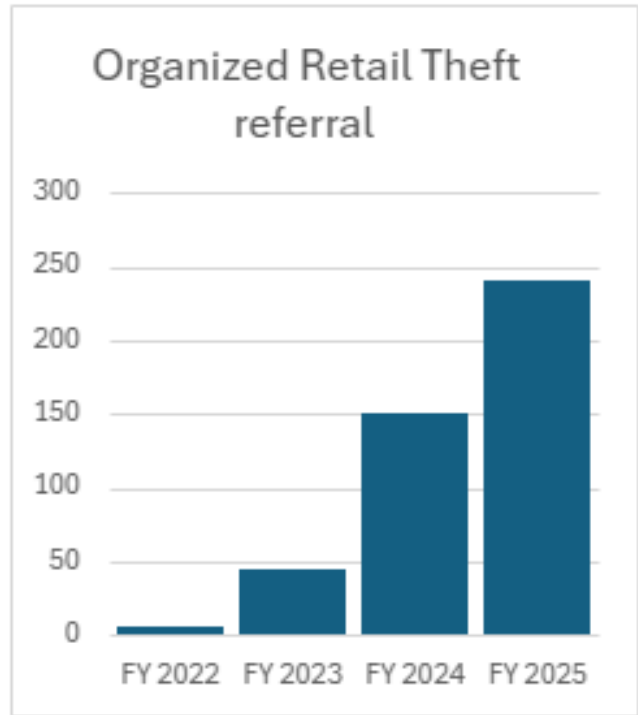
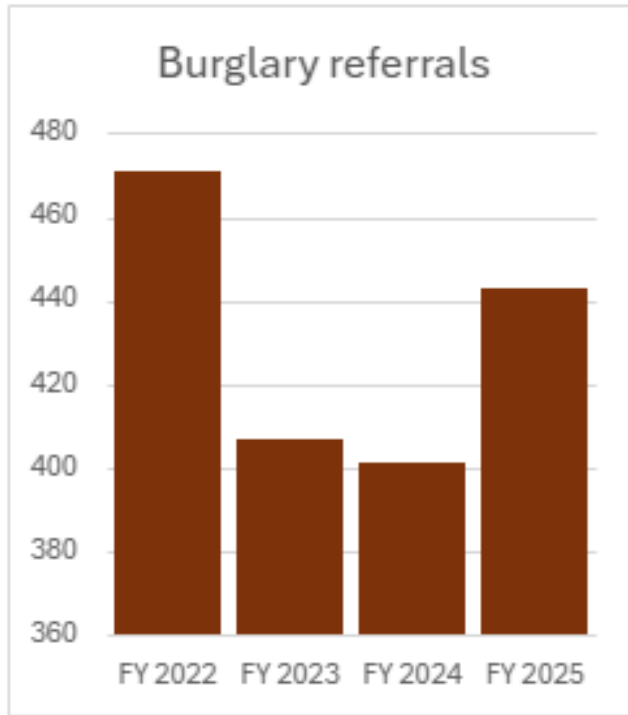

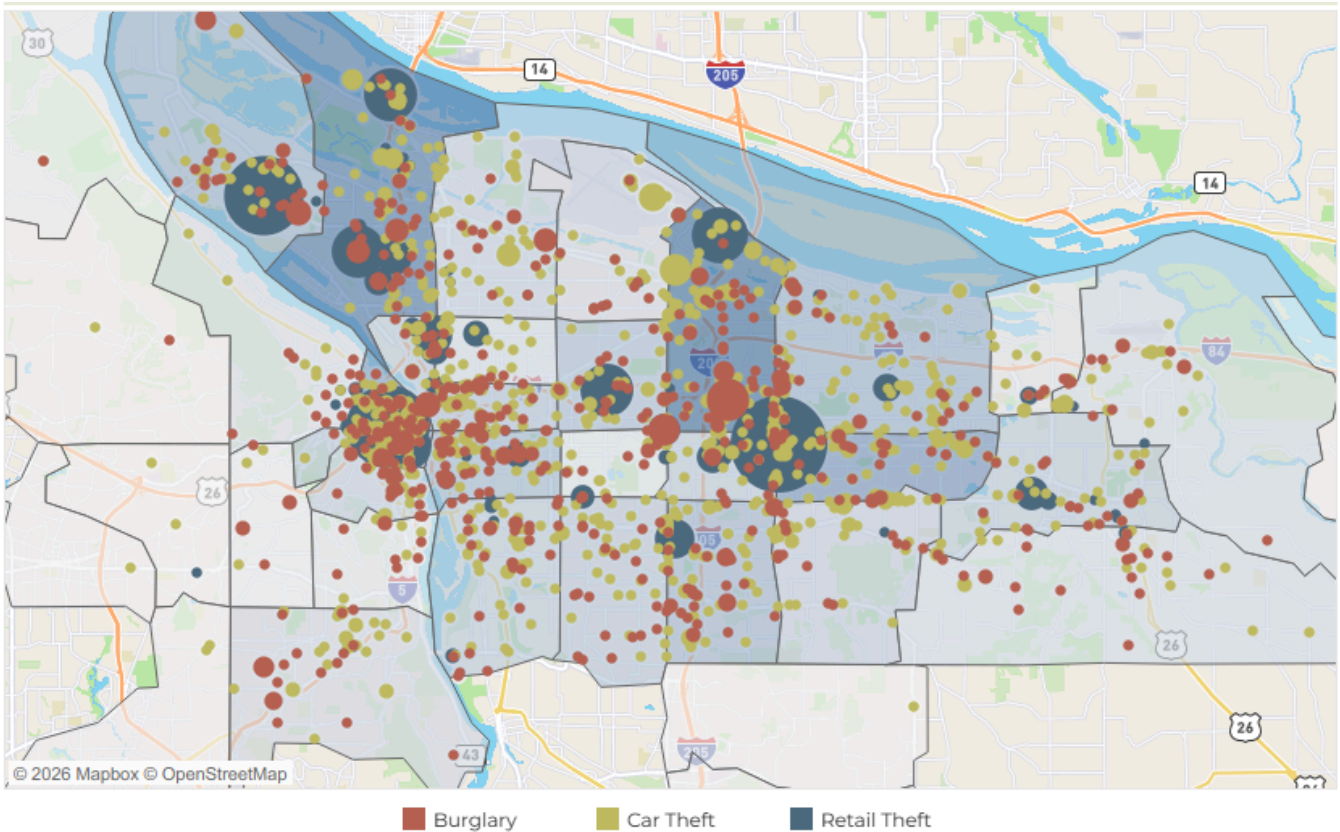

The availability of illicit drugs, particularly fentanyl, has had devastating consequences for individuals, families, and communities across Multnomah County. MCDA's Property & Narcotics Unit prosecutes drug distribution cases while prioritizing treatment-based alternatives that address the root causes of substance use and reduce the likelihood of reoffending.

KPI 2.1 Description: Tracks the percent of drug cases resolved through either traditional conviction or diversion to treatment. A higher resolution rate indicates that cases are moving efficiently through the system and that defendants are being connected to accountability and support.

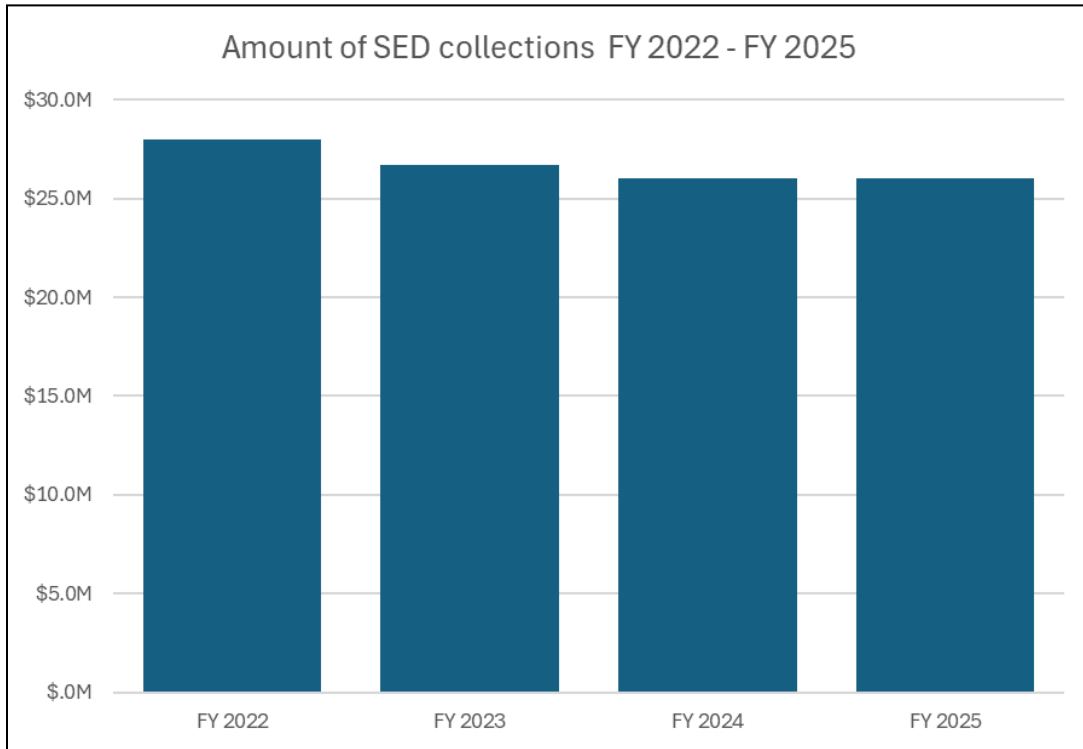

The long-term well-being of children depends in part on financial stability at home. MCDA's Child Support Enforcement Division (SED) establishes, modifies, and enforces child support orders, while connecting parents who face barriers to compliance with employment assistance, mental health services, and addiction support to help them meet their obligations over the long term.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 3.1: Amount of collections dollars gathered by SED

KPI 3.1 Description: Tracks the total dollars collected through child support enforcement annually. Higher collection totals reflect both the volume of cases actively managed and the unit's effectiveness in securing consistent financial support for children and families.

KPI 3.1 Equity Considerations: Financial instability disproportionately affects low-income families and communities of color. 4. Rehabilitate defendants and slow criminal recidivism through treatment plans, resource connections, and intensive supervision provided by treatment courts.

Treatment courts offer a structured alternative to incarceration for individuals whose criminal behavior is driven by substance use, mental health needs, or other underlying factors. MCDA's Treatment, Accountability & Specialty Courts Unit coordinates multiple specialty courts that connect participants to treatment, housing support, and intensive supervision, prioritizing long-term stability over short-term punishment.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 4.1: Entry to treatment court

KPI 4.1 Description: Tracks the number of defendants entering treatment court annually. Entry into treatment court represents a meaningful intervention point, connecting individuals to structured support before deeper justice system involvement and reducing the likelihood of reoffending.

Treatment court enrollment numbers for FY 2026 and FY 2027 reflect current program capacity rather than demand or eligibility. As in the case of FY 2025 data, actual entries may be higher than total capacity as participants exit the programs and new participants are enrolled. More individuals are eligible for and would benefit from treatment court participation than current capacity allows, but actual placements into these programs are a function of the amount of turnover.

Diversion & Strategic Prosecution Division Administration provides leadership and operational oversight for MCDA's felony prosecution, diversion, and child support enforcement functions. The division is led by a Chief Deputy District Attorney (CDDA), who sets strategic direction, ensures consistent legal standards, and manages day-to-day operations across units addressing serious criminal behavior and reducing future harm.

Division leadership guides prosecutorial decision-making, resolves complex legal issues, and supports fair, consistent, and evidence-informed case outcomes. The CDDA provides supervision, case consultation, and policy implementation for staff handling high-impact felony cases, including matters involving serious violence and mandatory sentencing considerations.

Diversion & Strategic Prosecution Division Administration coordinates division-wide practices that support early intervention, proportional accountability, and strategic use of prosecutorial resources. Through structured case review and collaboration with victim advocates and system partners, division leadership supports aligned responses to serious crime and violence prevention efforts across Multnomah County.

Equity Statement

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Property & Narcotics Unit prosecutes property crimes and commercial drug offenses, including the sale and distribution of controlled substances, overdose-related cases involving distributors, and felony-level Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants (DUII). The unit focuses on addressing offenses that significantly impact community safety, economic stability, and public health.

The unit plays a central role in supporting MCDA’s treatment courts, including programs that combine accountability with supervision, restitution, and substance use treatment. Through these courts and other case resolutions, prosecutors seek to reduce repeat offending while promoting recovery and long-term public safety.

Deputy District Attorneys in the unit work directly with victims of property crime to support restitution and case understanding, while applying evidence-based approaches to sentencing and supervision. When appropriate, the unit advances alternatives to incarceration, including mental health and substance use treatment, based on validated assessments and public safety considerations.

Equity Statement

The Property & Narcotics Unit supports equitable outcomes by addressing crimes that disproportionately harm low-income communities and communities of color, particularly through property loss and substance-related offenses. Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Strategic Prosecution Unit (SPU) is an evidence-informed program that addresses high-volume system users through focused, data-guided prosecution and intervention. The unit identifies individuals responsible for repeated criminal activity that disproportionately impacts community safety and works to interrupt cycles of harm.

Using objective criteria and structured case review, SPU prosecutors determine when traditional prosecution alone is unlikely to improve outcomes and, when appropriate, seek court-supervised mental health treatment, substance use treatment, and structured community supervision. The unit also incorporates the MCDA Access Attorney Program, applying a place-based prosecution model that embeds prosecutors in designated communities to address local safety concerns through coordinated, non-carceral interventions and focused accountability.

By combining strategic prosecution, community engagement, and access to services, the SPU model aims to reduce repeat offending, limit reliance on incarceration, and improve long-term community safety.

Equity Statement

The Strategic Prosecution Unit promotes equitable outcomes by using objective data, consistent legal standards, and community-informed decision-making for individuals with frequent justice system involvement. By expanding access to treatment, diversion, and survivor-centered services in communities most affected by crime and victimization, the unit works to reduce disparities while prioritizing safety, fairness, and accountability.

When appropriate, prosecutors work with the courts and community partners to connect parents to employment assistance, substance use treatment, and mental health services that support long-term compliance and family stability.

The Child Support Enforcement Unit also partners in Oregon’s Child Support Deferred Sentencing program, which uses a team-based approach to help parents achieve stability and maintain consistent support for their children. Through collaboration with courts, community organizations, and partner agencies, the unit supports durable outcomes that benefit children and families.

Program Description

The Treatment, Accountability & Specialty Courts Unit (TASC) coordinates MCDA's specialty courts to provide a consistent, team-based approach to cases where treatment and supervision are more effective than incarceration alone. By centralizing these courts within a single unit, MCDA ensures stable staffing, consistent training, and uniform application of evidence-informed practices.

The unit supports multiple specialty courts that address underlying drivers of criminal behavior, including substance use disorders, mental health needs, and other destabilizing factors. Prosecutors work closely with the courts, supervision agencies, and service providers to hold participants accountable while connecting them to treatment, housing, employment support, and intensive supervision.

Through these courts, the unit promotes public safety by reducing repeat offending, limiting unnecessary use of prison, and supporting long-term stability for participants whose cases are appropriate for structured, treatment-focused alternatives.

Equity Statement

The Treatment, Accountability & Specialty Courts Unit promotes equitable outcomes by expanding access to treatment-based alternatives to incarceration and ensuring consistent, trauma-informed practices across all specialty courts. 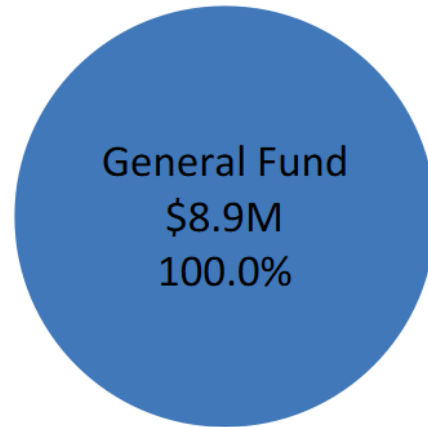

The Violent Crimes Division is responsible for prosecuting the County’s most serious felony crimes, including gun violence, homicides, sexual assaults, and violent property crimes. The division includes the following programs:

Robbery, Traffic, & Guns Unit (15302) handles major felony cases such as robberies, firearms offenses, gang-related crimes, vehicular homicides, arson, and felony animal abuse. Prosecutors work closely with law enforcement to target offenders and reduce violent crime while ensuring consistent and appropriate case resolutions. The unit also prosecutes felony firearms cases that can lead to both State and Federal charges.

Assault & Sex Crimes Unit (15304) prosecutes shootings, weapons assaults, attempted murder, kidnapping, and felony sexual assaults (over 100 felony sexual assaults are referred to MCDA each year). The unit works closely with sex crimes detectives and major crimes detectives to ensure people who commit violent and sexual crimes in our community are held accountable, and that the victims of these potentially life-altering crimes are supported and heard.

Homicide Unit (15305) was created in FY 2025 in response to a dramatic increase in the number of homicides in Multnomah County. The homicide rate in Portland alone increased by 178% between 2020 and 2024, going from a historical average of less than 30 per year to more than 75 per year. It consists of experienced prosecutors who focus exclusively on homicide cases, working closely with investigators from the initial call out to the crime scene.

Significant Division Changes

In FY 2027, Division III has been renamed to Violent Crimes Division, Unit C has been renamed to Robbery, Traffic, & Guns Unit, and Unit D has been renamed to Assault & Sex Crimes Unit.

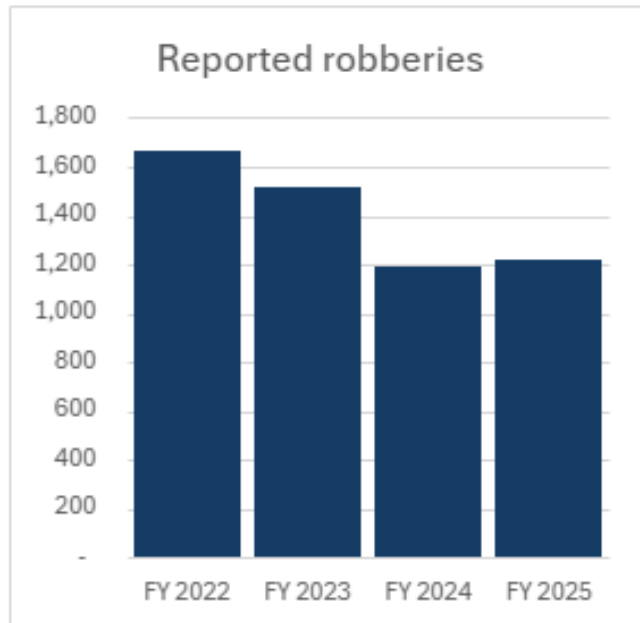
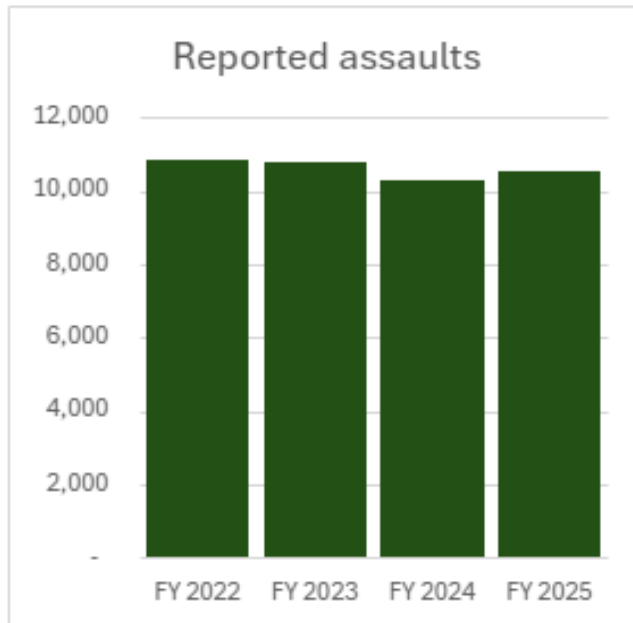
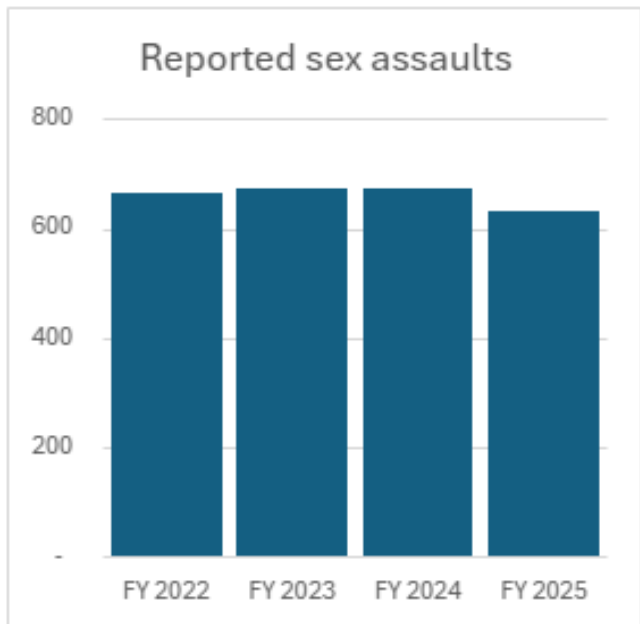
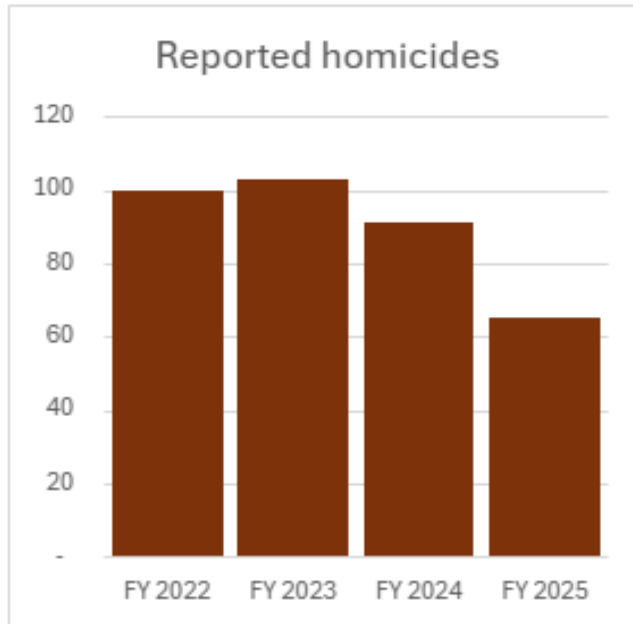
Violent Crimes Division Outcomes

Violent crime places an enormous burden on victims, families, and communities. MCDA's Violent Crimes Division dedicates specialized prosecutorial resources to homicide, sexual assault, robbery, firearms offenses, and other serious violent crimes, ensuring that cases involving the greatest harm receive focused, experienced attention.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 1.1: Downward trend in number of homicide, sex assault, assault, and robbery incidents reported to the Portland Police Bureau (PPB), the Gresham Police Department (GPD), and the Multnomah County Sheriff's Office (MCSO).

KPI 1.1 Description: Tracks trends in homicide, sexual assault, assault, and robbery incidents reported to law enforcement across Multnomah County. Monitoring these trends over time helps MCDA assess whether prosecutorial resources are being deployed where needed and whether violent crime rates are responding to targeted intervention.

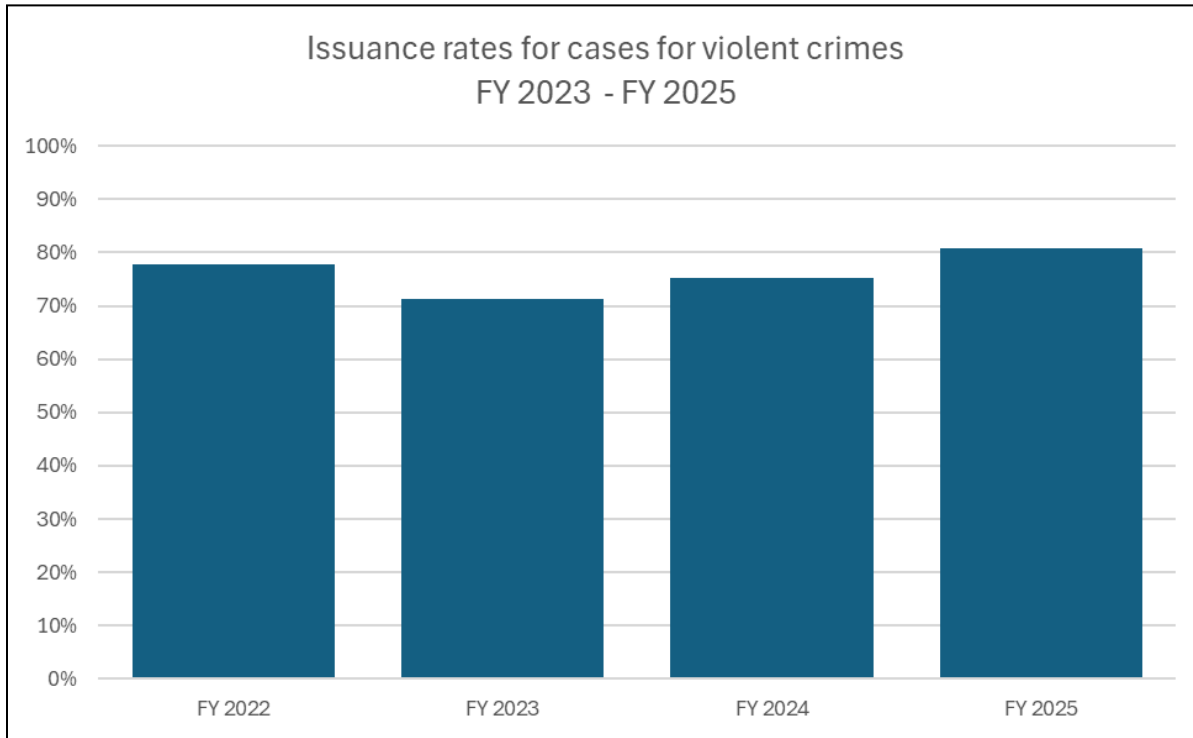

2. Work with system partners to ensure the successful prosecution of violent offenders, which results in accountability for offenders, deterrence of future violence, and justice for victims.

Prosecuting serious violent crime requires close coordination with law enforcement, victim advocates, and other justice system partners from the earliest stages of a case through final resolution. MCDA's Violent Crimes Division works to ensure that cases involving the greatest harm are thoroughly prepared and consistently handled, providing accountability for offenders and justice for victims and their families.

Key Performance Indicator (KPI) 2.1: Case issuance rate for cases with a violent crime.

KPI 2.1 Description: Percent of referred violent crime cases that were issued for prosecution (not rejected). A high issuance rate reflects the strength of cases referred to MCDA and the division's capacity to move serious violent cases forward effectively. "Violent crime" is defined as cases with at least one of the following charges referred: Murder in the first or second degree; attempted murder; manslaughter in the first or second degree; rape in the first degree; sodomy in the first degree; sex assault in the first degree; assault in the first or second degree; robbery in the first or second degree; unlawful use of a weapon.

Division: Violent Crimes Division

Program Characteristics:

Program Description

The Robbery, Traffic, & Guns Unit prosecutes serious felony crimes that pose a high risk to community safety, including robberies, firearms offenses, gang- and group-related crimes, arson, felony burglaries, and fatal or serious-injury traffic crimes. The unit focuses on cases involving significant violence or risk of harm, where consistent, coordinated prosecution is critical to public safety.

Prosecutors in the Robbery, Traffic, & Guns Unit work closely with victims using trauma-informed practices and apply consistent legal standards in charging and case resolution. The unit balances accountability with careful consideration of the broader impacts of prosecution, supporting fair outcomes while prioritizing victim safety and community trust.

The Robbery, Traffic, & Guns Unit collaborates closely with local, state, and federal law enforcement partners to address violent crime, illegal firearm use, and group-related violence. The unit also leads prosecution of felony vehicular crimes resulting in serious injury or death, ensuring timely, specialized responses to cases with significant community impact.

Program Description

The Assault & Sex Crimes Unit prosecutes serious felony crimes involving physical and sexual violence, including sexual assault and weapon-related assaults. The unit focuses on cases with significant harm to victims and high public safety risk, where careful, trauma-informed prosecution is essential.

Prosecutors in the Assault & Sex Crimes Unit apply consistent legal standards throughout case review, charging, resolution, and sentencing. Working closely with victim advocates, the unit supports survivor-centered practices while pursuing accountability that reflects the severity of harm and promotes long-term community safety.

When appropriate and consistent with public safety, the Assault & Sex Crimes Unit supports treatment-based alternatives to incarceration, including participation in specialty courts that provide structured supervision and services for eligible defendants. These approaches seek to reduce repeat harm while maintaining justice for victims and the community.

Equity Statement

The Assault & Sex Crimes Unit promotes equitable prosecution of serious violent offenses through consistent application of legal standards and trauma-informed engagement with survivors. By supporting fair decision-making and appropriate treatment-based interventions, the unit works to reduce disparities while prioritizing safety, accountability, and victim dignity.

The Homicide Unit prosecutes cases involving homicide, the most serious crimes handled by MCDA. The unit focuses exclusively on these cases, where careful legal analysis, early coordination with investigators, and consistent application of legal standards are essential to public safety and justice.

Deputy District Attorneys assigned to the Homicide Unit partner with law enforcement from the earliest stages of a case, including responding to homicide scenes and working closely with detectives throughout the investigation. This early and sustained involvement supports thorough case development, accountability for unlawful violence, and meaningful engagement with victims' families.

Through focused prosecution and close collaboration with investigative partners, the Homicide Unit seeks to resolve cases in a way that provides accountability, supports victims and families, and helps prevent further violence, strengthening public trust in the justice system.

The Homicide Unit promotes fair and unbiased prosecution by applying consistent legal standards and trauma-informed practices from the outset of each case through resolution. By emphasizing accountability, transparency, and respectful engagement with victims' families, the unit supports equitable treatment and helps build trust in communities most affected by lethal violence.
