Overview

- Effectiveness of immediate access to appropriate evidence-based treatment for individuals who suffer opioid and opiate overdoses
 - Four counties: Multnomah, Marion, Jackson and Coos
 - Linkages between emergency departments and treatment
 - MAT in emergency departments
 - Using peer specialists to facilitate the linkage between emergency rooms and treatment
 - Any other programming aimed at reducing deaths caused by overdoses


Implementation Success and Challenges

- Successes
 - Multidisciplinary support and collaboration
 - Critical review of response to opioid overdoses
 - Focus on prevention
 - Shared sense of urgency to immediately engage individuals who are released from correctional facilities
- Challenges
 - Existing bias about MAT within the peer support workforce
 - Training
 - Workforce availability
 - Time
 - Maintaining the scope of the project for success and evaluation

Multnomah County Pilot Project

- Proposed Two Phase Roll Out
 - Phase 1
 - OHSU & Adventist Emergency Department and in-patient
 - MCSO Corrections Release on Recognizance Population
 - Phase 2 Expansion
 - Legacy
 - Providence
- Expand peer services to hospital campus
 - Opioid overdoses are a small percentage
 - High volume of work responding to individuals needing medical attention due to the OUD

Funding and Partnerships

- Statewide, \$2 million over 2 years (January 2019-December 2020)
 - Anticipate \$660K to Multco HD over 2 years
- In Multnomah, jointly administered by Mental Health and Addictions and Public Health/Health Officer
- Partnerships with MCSO, Community Based Providers, Peer Navigators
- Evaluation to inform expansion to other jurisdictions
