


(at the request of Senator Floyd Prozanski)

(2)(a) The purpose of [this] **the** Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act of 2020 is to make **screening**, health assessment, treatment and recovery services for drug addiction available to all those who need and want access to those services and to adopt a health approach to drug addiction by removing criminal penalties for low-level drug possession.



# What the law does and doesn't do:

<p><b>Does</b> generate \$302 million in funding for critical addiction recovery and harm reduction services for this biennium.</p>	<p><b>Does not</b> impact behavioral health services previously funded through Oregon's marijuana tax.</p>
<p><b>Does</b> expand existing services offered by community providers whenever possible.</p>	<p><b>Does not</b> require the construction of new buildings for services.</p>
<p><b>Does</b> decriminalize possession of small amounts of drugs.</p>	<p><b>Does not</b> legalize drugs.</p>
<p><b>Does</b> treat people with Substance Use Disorder through a healthcare approach.</p>	<p><b>Does not</b> treat people with Substance Use Disorder through the criminal justice system.</p>

# Senate Bill 755 clarified and strengthened the law by...

## # 1

Establishing Behavioral Health Resource Networks in all 36 Oregon Counties, utilizing existing community organizations whenever possible. Services are meant to stabilize people on their path to recovery and empower them to be healthy.

---

## # 2

Directing the Oversight and Accountability Council to prioritize funding community-based organizations serving communities most impacted by the war on drugs.

---

## # 3

Specifically including the addition of the nine federally recognized Tribes and Tribal-affiliated organizations for funding.

# Senate Bill 755 clarified and strengthened the law by...

## # 4

Requiring that youth be referred to the juvenile system rather than to adult courts.

---

## # 5

Requiring that law enforcement provide information on how to obtain a screening when issuing Class E Violations to individuals in possession of small amounts of drugs.

---

## # 6

Establishing regular audits by the Secretary of State to oversee the new law and measure its success.

# Citations at a Glance: Feb. 1 – June 30

- **31 circuit courts have received citations**
- **1085 Class E violation cases**
  - 101 reduced from criminal charges filed before 2/1/21
  - 984 citations on or after the 2/1/21 effective date
  - 704 convictions (65%)
  - 304 in court
  - 400 failed to appear
  - 42 dismissed (4%)
  - 339 pending (31%)
  - 12 cases with juveniles
- **3 assessment/screening verifications received**
- **90 people have received multiple Class E citations, including 1 juvenile**
- **Most citations are for possession of meth (68%) or heroin (20%).**
- **81 citations were issued to non-Oregon residents.**

# **\$30+ Million in 110 Funding to Oregon Communities - By The Numbers**

- 70 Organizations funded with grants/amended contracts
- 26 Counties- 15 Rural, 5 Southern, 4 Central, 4 Eastern, 5 Metro, 3 Coast
- 33 Expanded access to treatment services, indigent, uninsured
- 52 Organizations hired peer support specialists
- 32 Service providers added recovery, supportive and transitional housing
- 30 Organizations Increased Harm Reduction Services


