Notes

Introductions were made and people shared their New Year's resolutions.

Recent Gun Violence Information Sharing

Sgt. Kenneth Duilio, PPB, shared the following information:

- This year, there has been one homicide, but 63 shootings investigated by the Gun Violence Reduction Team (GVRT).
- 17 people were injured, many of whom were bystanders.
- 500 casings around town.
- There have been more daytime shootings than is typical. Still mostly night time events.
- Non-gang shootings don't get enough attention.
- PPB has started using door hangers in areas where there was a shooting in order to inform and illicit community's help.
- Average age of victims is 31.
- What is needed: jobs, mentors, relationships.

Sgt. Aaron Schmutz acknowledged the police officer shortage. He also spoke to the goal of diverting youth from the justice system.

Dana Reimer noted PPS is working on exclusionary discipline policies.

MCDA's Glen Banfield stated how hard officers are working. A small percentage of shootings come

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into the DA's office because officers are constantly working. There was discussion around public education. Glen also noted the staff cuts that impact MCDA.

Youth Education Police (YEP)

Youth from YEP introduced themselves and gave a presentation around what YEP is doing. Their primary purpose is to educate the police bureau on how to interact with youth to decrease conflict and mistrust among youth and police. YEP's [website](#) and [presentation](#) has more information. YEP asks for help getting an in with law enforcement in East County. YEP can return to give updates and show a video at a future meeting.

Student Investment Account (SIA)

PPB's Shanice Clarke and Maria Hernandez presented information about the Student Success Act, which is a fund, created by a business tax, to help underserved student populations succeed. For information see the [presentation](#). [PPS Website](#) outlines the process. This is a collective impact. Discussion included the following:

- Are students equipped to be successful on a basic level?
- Learning about the criminal justice system is important and can help students stay away from and be able to change the system.
- Need to be intentional around LGBTQ students.

Announcements:

Abbey Stamp announced the county received another \$2 million from the MacArthur Safety & Justice Challenge to decrease incarceration and rethink jails. We are focusing on pretrial improvements.
