The current Charter is therefore outdated and limits the City's ability to borrow money and levy taxes to benefit the City and ensure its continued existence. In order to operate more efficiently, the City is proposing a new Charter, which has been drafted by the City Council and includes provisions to better protect citizens and to allow the City to serve the community to a fuller extent. This ballot measure must be voted on and passed by Maywood Park voters in order to allow the City to adopt the new Charter.
