Their most recent review found that "PP&R remains fiscally accountable to Portlanders," and is "tracking Parks Levy dollars in a transparent, auditable, and effective way." The oversight committee also confirmed that levy spending is aligned with the fifteen commitments in the 2020 ballot measure, "showing performance on promises made to voters."
