Bylaws & Charter	<ul> <li>Revisions to the bylaws and charter: no longer a chair or executive committee, changes to compensation (from \$30 to \$50)</li> <li>Nothing in the bylaws and charter about meeting facilitation; we could add details around this being a shared responsibility for all board members</li> <li>Meeting attendance; there is the expectation to attend 8 meetings in a calendar year</li> <li>Finance sub-committee: board members meet with our finance staff to then provide input on our budget process and how we're prioritizing funds as a division         <ul> <li>The hope is to have this again in the future; it was initiated at the end of 2019</li> <li>CBAC provides input for the entire department's budget; this sub-committee would be specific to Public Health</li> </ul> </li> <li>Board members can be appointed for 2 consecutive terms; this is the maximum (Nathan has reached out about 6 months in advance)</li> </ul>	Nathan Wickstrom	15 min 5:00 – 5:15
