

Scope of the Problem

In 2011—

- Nationwide, 60 percent of all arrests of youth were for nonviolent, minor, or status offenses.
- 18 percent of these arrests were for curfew violations.
- In Oregon, 67 percent of the 23,378 arrests
 were for nonviolent, minor, or status offenses.




Hallmarks of the Developmental Approach

- 1. Accountability without criminalization.
- 2. Use alternatives to justice system involvement.
- 3. Individualize response based on assessment of needs and risks.
- 4. Confine only when necessary for public safety.
- 5. Commit to fairness.
- 6. Be sensitive to disparate treatment.
- 7. Engage families.

NAS Recommendations



- 1. Develop systemwide juvenile justice planning and collaboration.
- 2. Reduce detention.
- 3. Improve conditions of confinement.
- 4. Close large institutions and reinvest in community-based programs.

NAS Recommendations (cont'd.)

- 5. Detain juveniles in juvenile justice systems—not with adults.
- 6. Use evidence-based programs that reduce recidivism.
- 7. Improve access to and quality of mental health services.
- 8. Provide quality defense attorney services.
- 9. Provide access to educational programs in detention and post-release.
- 10. Modify harsh sentencing laws for juveniles.
- 11.Build multisystem approaches in child welfare and juvenile justice.

OJJDP-CDC NatSCEV Study

- 60 percent of children in the U.S. were exposed to violence, crime, or abuse in their home, school, or community during the 1year study period.
- Almost 40 percent were direct victims of two or more violent acts during that period.

One in 10 were victims of violence 5 or more times in that year.
